A PROCLAMATION, For a PUBLICK THANKSGIVING.

ANNE R.

WE most Devoutly and Thankfully acknowledge the Great Goodness and Mercy of Almighty God, who has Continued to Us His Protection and Assistance, in the just and Necessary War, in which We are now Engaged for the Common Safety of Our Realms, and the Liberties of Europe, and hath Disappointed the Ambitious Designs of France, and hath Wonderful Success He has given to Our Councils and Forces, against the Insolent Attempt to invade this Our Kingdom of Great Britain, and by giving to Our Arms, in Conjunction with those of Our Allies, under the Command of John Duke of Marlborough, Captain-General of Our said Forces, a Signal and Glorious Victory near Audenarde in Flanders: And therefore duly considering, That such Great and Publick Blessings do Call for a Publick and Solemn Acknowledgment, We have thought fit, by the Advice of Our Privy-Council, to Issue forth this Our Royal Proclamation, hereby Appointing and Commanding, That a General Thanksgiving to Almighty God for these His Mercies be Observed throughout England, Wales, and Town of Berwick upon Tweed, upon Thursday the Nineteenth of August next ensuing. And for the better, more devout and orderly Solemnizing the same, We have given Directions to Our Arch-bishops and Bishops, to Compose a Form of Prayer suitable to these Occasions, to be Used in all Churches and Chappels, and other Places of Publick Worship, within their respective Dioceses, and to take Care for the timely Dispersing thereof. And We do likewise Direct and Command, That the said Publick Day of Thanksgiving be Religiously Observed by all Our Loving Subjects, as they tender the Favour of Almighty God, and upon pain of Suffering such Punishment, as We may justly inflict on all such as shall Contemn or Neglect the Performance of so Religious and Necessary a Duty.

Given at Our Court at Windsor the Eighteenth Day of July, in the Seventh Year of Our Reign.

A PROCLAMATION, For a GENERAL THANKSGIVING.

WE most Devoutly and Thankfully Acknowledge the Great Goodness and Mercy of Almighty God, who has continued to Us His Protection and Assistance, in the just and Necessary War, in which We are now Engaged for the Common Safety of Our Realms, and the Liberties of Europe, and hath Disappointed the Ambitious Designs of France, by the late Wonderful Success He has given to Our Councils and Forces, against the Insolent Attempt to invade this Our Kingdom of Great Britain, and by giving to Our Arms, in Conjunction with those of Our Allies, under the Command of John Duke of Marlborough, Captain-General of Our said Forces, a Signal and Glorious Victory near Audenarde in Flanders: And therefore duly considering, That such Great and Publick Blessings do Call for a Publick and Solemn Acknowledgment, We have thought fit, by the Advice of Our Privy-Council, to Issue forth this Our Royal Proclamation, hereby Appointing and Commanding,

That a General Thanksgiving to Almighty God for these His Mercies be Observed throughout that Part of Our Kingdom of Great Britain called Scotland, upon Thursday the Twentieth sixth Day of August next to come. And We expect that all Our Loving Subjects there will be ready to Observe the said Day of Thanksgiving in such manner as has been usual there upon the like Occasion: The Commissioners appointed by the late General Assembly to attend Us here, having Applied to Us to this effect: Wherefore We do hereby Direct and Command, That the said Day of Publick Thanksgiving be Religiously Observed by all Our Loving Subjects, in Scotland, as they tender the Favour of Almighty God, and upon pain of Suffering such Punishment as We may justly inflict on all such as shall Contemn or Neglect the Performance of so Religious and Necessary a Duty. Our Will is therefore, and We Charge that incontinent, this Our Proclamation seen, ye Pass to the Mercat Cross of Edinburgh, and all other Places needful, and there in Our Name and Authority, make Publication hereof, that none pretend Ignorance; And Orains Our Solicitor to cause send Printed Copies thereof to the Sheriff of the several Shires, Stewards of the Steweries, and Bailies of Regalities, and their Clerks, whom We Ordain to see the same Published, and Appoints them to send Doubles hereof to the several Paroch Kirks within their Bounds; That upon the Lord's Day immediately preceding the said Day above-mention'd, the same may be Publish'd and Read from the Pulpits immediately after Divine Service.

Vicna, July 11 N. S. On Monday last the Marriage of the King of Portugal with Mary-Ann, Arch-Dutchess of Austria, was solemniz'd at Cloyster-Neuburg, the Emperor standing Proxy for his Portugueze Majesty, and Cardinal Saxe-Zeitz, assisted by four Prelates, performing the Office of Matrimony. The Ceremony was, in all respects, the same with that observed in the late Marriage of the King of Spain with the Princess of Wolfenbuttel. The Queen of Portugal took Leave of the Imperial Court at the Church-Door, and went and lay that Night at Horneburg, a Bridge having been laid over the Danube on purpous for her Passage. She continu'd there Yesterday the whole Day, to receive the Visits of the Imperial Court, and the Compliments of the foreign Ministers, and others. Count Traun, Marshal of Lower Austria, at the head of the States of the Country, waited on her Majesty with a Compliment of Congratulation, and a Purse of 4000 Ducars, as is usual. The Emperor and Empress returned last Night to the Favourite; but this Morning the Emperor went Post to take Leave of his Sister before she set out on her Journey. The Empress Dowager, with the two Arch-Dutchesses her Daughters, go part of the Journey, to Day, with the Queen of Portugal, and return thither to Morrow. Count Paar, Post-Master of the Hereditary Countries, goes with her Portugueze Majesty as far as Holland; and the Countess of Thurn accompanies her Majesty to Lisbon.

Copenhagen, July 24. N. S. Upon the Death of Count Aklfeldt, who commanded the Body of Danish Troops in Bavaria, Major General Gerckorf is made Lieutenant-General, and is to command those Forces in Chief; Baron Wedel, Son of the Veidt-Marschal, succeeds Monsieur Gerckorf as Major-General. The Imperial Resident sent lack, on Wednesday last, the Courier he receiv'd lately from Vicna, with an Answer to the Demand he made concerning the March of the Danish Troops out of Bavaria; the Substance of the Answer was, That this Court, to shew how willing they were to maintain a good Intelligence with that

that of Vienna, would consent to the March of those Troops on some particular Conditions: The Conditions are not thought to be such as the Emperor will refuse; so that we take it for granted, the Troops will immediately March towards Hungary.

Hague, July 27. N. S. The Saxon and Hessian Troops of the Army of Prince Eugene are encamp'd near Fort Mourerri, in the Neighbourhood of Brussel. On the 20th Instant there were a great Number of Boats, laden with Artillery and Stores of War, sent from Delit to Antwerp. The great Ordnance which is at Sas-van Ghent is also to be convey'd to Antwerp, from whence it will be brought to Brussel. The whole Train is to be drawn by Horses from that City, to the Grand Army of the Allies. The Commanders in Chief at Sas-van-Ghent and Hulst have desir'd Leave to lay the Country around those Places under Water, which has been consented to. The Governors of the other Frontier Towns have taken the same Measures, as well to distress the Enemy in the Conveyance of Provisions, as to make a Retreat from their present Camp less practicable. Letters of Yesterday from the Duke of Marlborough's Camp inform us, That there were 44 Standards, 42 Colours, and 10 Kettel-Drums, brought in thither, which were taken in the late Battel near Audenarde. There were several others taken by the Prussian Troops, which are to be sent to Berlin. They write from Genoa, That Sir John Leake, with her Catholick Majesty, and the Troops on Board, set Sail from Vado on the 16th Instant. A Convooy from Rotterdam sail'd Yesterday for the Thames. This Day the Envoy of Portugal left this Place, in order to meet the Queen of Portugal at Wesel; as will the Minister of his Imperial Majesty next Week. Two Battalions of the Regiment of Usel are march'd from hence towards Flanders, being reliev'd by two Swiss Companies which lay at the Brill.

Offend, July 28. N. S. Letters from Ghent of the 25th Instant, say, That the Enemy labour Day and Night to strengthen their Intrenchments behind the Canal of that Place, tho' they begin to be in want of Provisions, especially Forage. On the 22^d Instant the Duke of Berwick came thither. Upon his Arrival there was held a great Council of War; and the next Day the Duke return'd, by the way of Furnes, to Lille. We hear from Paris, that there have been frequent Councils held at Court, since they receiv'd Advice that the Allies have level'd the Lines near Ypres, and sent Detachments into Artois, to raise Contributions. They write from Brussel, that the great Train of Artillery which lay at the Sas-van-Ghent, arriv'd there on the 25th Instant, in order to be sent to the Grand Army at Werwick.

Cows, July 19. Yesterday about one of the Clock the Forces began to embark, and before Noon this Day they were all on Board.

Portsmouth, July 20. On Sunday last the Camp in the Isle of Wight march'd. Yesterday Sir George Ling struck his Flag on Board the Triumph, and set out with General Earle for Windsor. The same Day my Lord Dursley hoisted his Flag on Board the Orford. Yesterday Morning the Earl of Essex's Regiment of Dragoons was review'd by General Earle.

Windsor, July 18. This Day his Excellency Andrew de Marceff, Privy-Councillor and Governor of the Principality of Jaroslavy, and Ambassador Extraordinary from his Imperial Majesty the Czar of Muscovy, had his private Audience of Leave of Her Majesty; being introduc'd by the Rt. Hon. Mr. Secretary Boyle, and afterwards of his Royal Highness the Prince; and was conducted to both by Sir Charles Cotrell, Master of the Ceremonies.

The same Day the Baron le Begues, Envoy Extraordinary from the Duke of Lorraine, had his first private Audience of her Majesty, introduc'd by the Rt. Hon. the Earl of Sunderland; and afterwards of his Royal Highness; and was conducted to both by Sir Charles Cotrell, Master of the Ceremonies.
