Barnftable, Feb. 18.

His day arrived here the Bideford Merchant of this Port from Lisbonne, and the Royalty likewile of this Port from Cadis, being two vefiels employed hence upon the Fifthing Trade to Newfoundland.

Chefter, Feb. 19. The Rainbow of Leverpool bound for Dublin laden with Wooll and other Goods about a League from Leverpool (prang a Leak and foundred in the lea, the Mafter with Six men and two passengers happily eleaped in the boat, leaving his Brother with one of his fervants and 14 passengers in the ship, which in little time funk to the bottom.

Several thips are falely here arrived from Dublin.

Lyme, Feb. 19. The 17th Inftant arrived here the Margaret of this place, in three dayes from St. Malos, laden with Canvas; the Mafter and People aboard her confirm the arrival of the New-Spain Fleet at St. Lucars; and, that feveral French men of Warr are fitted up at Brelt, the Souldiers Railed, and Seamen Preft, and ready to be font on Board those Ships designed for Madagascar and the East-Indies.

Cadis, Ian. 25. We have this certain account of the proceeding of Sir Thomas Allon with the Fleet under his Command , that on the 31 paft he endured a great florm, but without any other damage then the fplitting of fome fails, and the 1st instant the wind being abated found all his Company even beyond expectation in view; the next day he plyed to the Westwards to meet and secure the Herring-Fleet. The 3d inftant fetcht up a French Tartan coming from Carthagena, who informed him of 47 Turks and Moors, which were there remaining out of above 200. whole thip had been forced on those by fome of Sir Thomas Allens squadron the 14th past off Cape Palos. The fixth inftant at night plying ftill to the Weftward he found the Herring Fleet, and with them Captain Holmes, with whom he joyned also the Portland to fecure their paffage to Legorn : the 11th inftant being by Easterly winds driven into Malaga Road, he took care for the dispolal of two prizes which were formerly put in there, and finding there feveral Fish ships and one other extraordinary rich Merchant thip, he ordered the Milford and Pearl to conduct them thence to Alacant; the 1 2th he failed from that Road, and met with the Mary, Briftol, Forefight and Spread-Eagle with a Convoy of 15 Merchants from Malaga: the 13th inftant he paft the Streights with many Merchants under his protection; and the next day came to an Anchor in this Bay, where he spent some days in taking in fresh provisions, the 19th instant he went out of this Bay, and the 21 having convoyed a Fleet of 30 Merchants as far as Cape St Marys, com-

mitted them to the protection of the Milford. Cadis, Ian. 30. The 22 inftant Sir Tho. Allen convoy'd the Merchant Fleet as far as the Cape St Vincent, and the 24th took leave of them; the next day anchored in Logos Bay, and took in a fupply of Wood for neceffary uless and the 29th came to an Anchor in the Bay of Cadiz, where he found the Ierfey and Centurion, with a Convoy of Merchants homewards bound; the Ierfey palfing by Iuica, faw neer that Itland a Fleet of 16 fail, which he judged to be French men of war.

The Emperour of Morocco has made good his word to his Excellency the Lord Howard, and cauled all the Eng*lifb* which were taken by the *sally* men fince the True^c made with him to be reftored to their liberty.

Warfaw, Feb. 2. All things are preparing for the in-tended Marriage of the King, who upon information that his Royal Spoule has left Vienna, intends the 8th instant to leave this place and begin his journey to Czenfachow, a confiderable part of his baggage being already parted ; the Emperours Refident, the Popes Nuncio, and Sir Peter Wich His Mojefty of Great Britains Envoye Extraordinary, are invited to be prefent at the folemnity of the Marriage, but the Nobless still continue to be diffatisfyed, and the Primate has written feveral Letters to the King and the Vice-Chaucellour of the Crown full of complaints and reproaches, that an affair of to great confequence as this is should be privately carried on without the confent and advice of the States ; the faid Primates the Bishop of Cracew, and the Bishop of Plosky, either of whole Office it is to Marry the King, have exculed themselves from the journey to Grenflochow, fo that tis believed the Ceremony will be performed by the Popes Nuncio: the Pomp and Magnificence of this Wedding is referved for this place, where Three Triumphal Arches are to be crefted, one towards the Arlenal, and two others in the great place of this City.

Most of the Dicties are ended with approbation of the Marriage, that of Sendomire is broken off by the peevishness of two or three perfons only, who protested against the proceedings of the rest, but those states have fent to define His Majestics Letters to empower them to meet the fecond time.

The Sieur Wifouski has received his difpatches and inftructions, and may in few days fet forwards on his Embafly to the Ottoman Court, according to the refolution taken in the laft Diet.

Ou: Treaty with the Mukovites is broken off, and our Commiffioners returning home, the divisions within this Kingdom giving that people too much reason to refule the furrender of *Kiovia*, and to believe they may farther make ule of this opportunity of raising an advantage to themfelves from our diforders. The Great Duke of *Musco*vy intends to marry again, and has taken a view of feveral Ladies, amongst whom he has taken patricular notice of two, who are perfors of great Beauty though but mean extraction.

The Tartars of Bialogrod are retired out of Ukranis, where they made great (poil, but were forced by General Sobiesky (who attended them with a ftrong party) to leave a confiderable part of their booty behind them s tisubelieved that the occasion of their Retreat might be the news of the dea h of the Balla of Silifiria.

Madrid, Feb. 5, The Queen Regent employs most of her time in publick affiits, but has not yet nominated any perfon to succeed the Prince de Ligne in his Gharge of the Cavalry in Flanders, but tis believed Her Majesty is much inclined to confer it on some eminent perion of that Countrey, the having expressed her felf very fensible of the many services done by them to the Crown of Spain during the late wars,

The Arrival of the New-Spain Fleet the first Inflant at Sc. Lucar, gives no fmall fatisfaction to this Court, an well as to the Merchants ; it confisted of 22 Ships, why besides other Rich Lading, bring with them a large proportion of Silver upon His Majesties Account. The Gallions may be expected about the end of this Moneth. Rome, Feb. 8. The Affairs of the Conclave remain fill doubtful and perplext; and, as yet, little appearance of any speedy Agreement, as to an Election.

On Monday last Cardinal Antonia went fick out of the Conclave, but is fince fornewhat recover'd, and may in few dayes return again. The fame day in the afteraoon Cardinal Spada went out allo, much tortured with a fit of the Gout ; and, about the fame time Cardinal Chigy was Lee Blood for a Feavonrith Diftemper. The Cardinal do St. Croix went yesterday out of the Conclave much indifoofed. The Cardinals Caraffa, and Corfini are alto much diftemper'd, but will not leave the Conclave no more then Chigy, least their abfence might give the opposite party too great an advantage.

The Spanish Ambailador has lately received Letters by two Courriers from Madrid, and immediately dispatched an Express to Father Nithard at Tivoli, to affure him, That he had still a Place in the Queens Favour ; who, would not fail to procure his Advantages as any occasis should offer it felf: The said Father Nithard has since endeavoured all he is able to 4 romote the Spanish Interest in the El sti n of a Pope, by sending his Letters to sevral Members of the Conclave, Courting the Governour of it; and making his Applications with much earness the Queen Christina, who is supposed to have no small interest amongs the Cardinals.

The Spanish Ambassador has solicited the Cardinals of that Faction to preis for a speedy Election : Cardinal Barbarini has. proposed the Cardinals Carpegna, Fachimetti, and Brancaccio ; and Chigi three others, viz. Elei, Celf, and Bonvis, all of them perions eminently qualified for the Supream Dignity. A Courier lately arrived from France has brought leveral dispatches from His most Christian Majesty for the Ambassador the Duke de Chaulnes and the other French Cardinals, and seems to have an inclination for Catdinal d' Elei.

Hague, Feb. 24. Seven Clerks belonging to the States of Holland have been committed to prifon, and are under a fevere examination upon a suspition of holding private correspondencies with forreign Ministers to the prejudice of the State, and four others have retired themfelves to avoid the like inquisition

The King of *Poland* has lately written a very obliging Letter to the States to give them an account of his intended Mariage with the Emperours Sifter, and tis believed this will occasion the Heer *ds Wit* of *Dordrett* to haften his doparture on his Embaffy to his faid Majefty.

Here is lately arrived the Baron de Guldenlew's Secretary from Copenhagen on his way for England, carrying with him the Ratification of the Treaty of Commetce concluded on in London between England and Denmark.

From Berlin we are adviled, that his Electoral Highnels of Brandenbourg intends at the beginning of this Spring to remove with his whole Court to Cleves, where he intends to pass his time all the next Summer.

Hambourgh, Feb. 25. Letters of the 21 inftant from Caffel inform us, that the Count of Hanaw has lately changed his Religion, and made profeffion of the Roman Catholick, that he has appointed the Prince of Homberg Governour of his Lands and Forts, and confluended a Lorrain Collonel one Iormaers Governour of Hanaw with 400 Foot under his Command, and caufed the Protestant Church there to be flut up, whereupon the people of that place have made their complaints to the Houles of Heffe, Caffel, and Darmstar, who immediately gave order for the marching out of 500 Foot from Rinkelen, under the Command of Monfieur Zebel a Lieutenant Collonel, and 800 out of Caffel, Commanded by Collonel Mat; 400 from Zeigenbeim, Commanded by Collonel Hoff; and 3 or 400 trom Marbsurg under Collonel Proces, with Seven Troops of Horfe, Four pieces of Canon and two Mortar-pieces, with a confiderable party from Darmftat to march away for that place, to the affistance of the Townsmen.

We have here a Report, That the Prince Regent of Portugal is fallen dangercusily ill, occasion'd principally by a fall from his Horle.

A very Confiderable Summ of Moneys is faid to be fent to Rome, to be there expended for the Interest of his Majefly in the Election, to encourage fuch of the Cardinals as have testified their affection to this Crown.
