The humble Address of the High-Steward, Bailiffs, Recorder, Aldermen, Capital Burgesses, and Commonalty of her Majesty's Ancient Borough of Maldon; presented to her Majesty by Sir Richard Gild and Thomas Richmond, Esq; Representatives of the said Corporation, introduc'd by the Earl of Bindon.

The humble Address of the Mayor, Aldermen and Burgesses of her Majesty's Ancient Corporation of Portsmouth; presented to her Majesty by John Vining, Esq; Mayor, introduc'd by Admiral Cornhill.

The humble Address of the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen and Common-Council of the City and Corporation of Bath, and of their Representatives in Parliament; presented to her Majesty by the Members of Parliament for that City, introduc'd by the Rt. Hon. the Earl of Pembroke, Lord-Lieutenant of Ireland.

All which Addresses Her Majesty receiv'd very graciously.

Vienna, August 11. N. S. The Emperor has receiv'd

very insolent Letters from the Pope, renewing his Complaints against the pretended harsh Treatment he receives daily from this Court; notwithstanding the repeated Proofs which he says he has given them of his good Will and Affection to the House of Austria. He exhorts his Imperial Majesty to desist from such violent Courses, in which case his Holiness offers to forgive all past Injuries, and to embrace him as the First-born of the Church. But if he persists in his unjust Practices, as they are there call'd, he threatens to chastise him, as a disobedient and rebellious Son, both with the Spiritual and Temporal Rod, if there be occasion, let the Consequence be what it will. And he concludes with telling his Imperial Majesty, That if he does not repent of warring against the Church, and return to the Piety that is Hereditary to the House of Austria, and so particularly recommended to him by the Example of his deceas'd Father Leopold, a most devout Son of the Church, he may expect, that the same Providence which set him up, will pull him down. King Augustus has offer'd his Mediation for composing these Differences; and if it be accepted, it is thought the Prince of Furstenberg will be sent hither to negotiate that Affair. Marshal Neiter has sent hither the Colours and Standards he took from the Hungarians in the late Action near Trenchtin, and is march'd to besiege Neytra. The Hungari-

ans continue still to ravage the Country on this side the Danube, raising Contributions on the Frontiers of Lower Austria, and burning and pillaging where-ever they meet with Resistance. The Danish Troops are all march'd out of Bavaria; several of their Regiments have already pass'd by this Place in their way to Presburg, and the others continue to follow daily. Count Wackerbart, King Augustus's Envoy to this Court, accompanied by the Envoys of the other Princes of Saxony, receiv'd on the 9th Instant the Investiture of the Imperial Fiefs possess'd by that Family. On Thursday last Major-General Palmes set out from hence on his Journey to Turin.

Berne, August 15. N. S. Our Letters from Geneva of Yesterday say, The French had prevented his Royal Highness the Duke of Savoy from making himself Master of the Hills about Briançon, having got thither before him, tho' he had march'd with an extraordinary diligence to possess himself of them; whereupon seeing it was impossible to dislodge the French from thence, because Marshal Villars was marching with his whole Army to fortify all those Posts, his Royal Highness had quitted the Valley of Bardouache, where he was encamp'd the 5th, 6th and 7th, and was march'd to Phoenioux near Sefanne, in order to form with greater ease the Siege of Exilles, and afterwards that of Fenestrelles. They add, that Mr. de Villars was as strong in Foot as his Royal Highness; but not in Horse.

Copenhagen, August 18. N. S. By Letters which came the 16th Instant from Norway, we receiv'd an Account, that Bronhous, one of the wealthiest and most populous Cities of that Kingdom, was unfortunately reduc'd to Ashes, by a Fire broke out in the English Street; it began about 11 a Clock at Night, and was so quick and violent in its Progress, that by the next Morning the whole City was in Flames. His Danish Majesty had large Magazines there full of Warlike Stores and Ammunition, which were all consum'd. It is not yet known what Number of the Inhabitants are missing. Some Magazines belonging to the British and Dutch Merchants, which lay out of the Town towards the Sea-side, were out of the Reach of the Flames. The King left Yagersburg on Wednesday last, in order, to take the Diversion of Swan-Hunting; the Place appointed for that Sport this Year is about 8 Leagues distant from this City. His Majesty is expected here this Day, and intends to reside some time at Rosenburg, one of his Palaces in this City.

From the Camp at Amougies, August 23. N. S. Last Night the Trenches were open'd before Lille, on each side of the lower Deule, with so good Success, that we lost only three Men; and all Advices agreeing, that as soon as this was done the Armies commanded by the Duke of Burgundy and the Duke of Berwick would endeavour to join, this Morning the Army commanded by his Grace the Duke of Marlborough pass'd the Schelde, and came to this Camp, as well to prevent their joining between the Schelde and the Dender, as to make their Meeting more difficult in Brabant, and to be near at hand to oppose any Attempt that they may offer to make on that side; where, according to all Appearances, they had form'd their Projects for making a Diversion during the Siege. Our Army is now encamp'd with the Left near this Place, and the Right at Pottes, where his Grace has order'd the Bridges we pass'd over this Morning to be continu'd, with a guard of six Regiments of Foot, in order to repair the Schelde, if the Enemy make any motion between that River and the Lys; but this Morning both their Armies were in their former Camps.

Hague, August 24. N. S. Our last French Letters speak of an Action near Sflanne, between two Detach-

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ments of the Armies of the Duke of Savoy, and the Marshal de Villars, in which the French pretend to have gain'd the Advantage; but at the same time acknowledge, that immediately after this Success his Royal Highness took Exiles, and made the Garrison Prisoners of War.

From on Board the Humber, in the Bay of la Hogue.
August 13. On the 5th Instant the Fleet set sail from the Bay of Estaples to that of Boulogne, where they arriv'd the next Morning, and anchor'd with Intention to have waited the coming up of the Transports with the Dragoons expected from Dover; but the Winds blowing very fresh at North-west, it was not thought safe to ride on that Coast, by reason of the Sands and Shoal Water. On the 7th in the Evening, being oblig'd to weigh, they stood over again to the Coast of England, and off of Dover. The next Night we receiv'd an Account, that the Dragoons were embark'd; but the Weather proving calm, the Transports could not come out 'till the Day following, when they all join'd the Fleet (which continu'd under Sail) in Doyer Road; but the Winds were so various that we could not make to the Bay of la Hogue, 'till the 11th in the Afternoon. The same Evening it was resolv'd, upon a Report made by Persons sent out to discover a proper Place for Landing, that the Men of War and Transports should stand in as near the Shoar as possible the next Day, to Land the Forces. And accordingly, upon the Signal made, at four of the Clock Yesterday Morning they were all under Sail; but a great Fog arising, and little or no Wind, the Transports could not all come up, nor the Launches and Boats of the Fleet, which were all employ'd to carry the first Detachment of 1200 Men, get nigh the Shoar 'till about 10 of the Clock; by which time the latter were all got to the Place of Rendezvous, when the Generals upon viewing the Coast, and the Forces that were by that time brought together to oppose any Descent (which were reckon'd to be 9 Battalions, and 14 Squadrons, regularly drawn up) found it impracticable to land the Men, as well as by reason of several Forts and Batteries which commanded the Shoar, and from whence they threw several Bombs into the Fleet. The Men were therefore order'd to return on Board again, there being no Possibility of effecting any thing on that Coast, without the apparent hazard of the first Detachment, which could not be follow'd by any from the Transports where they lay in less than two hours time, the Boats not being capable of carrying above 1200 Men at a time.

His Royal Highness Prince George of Denmark, &c. Lord High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland, &c. having ordered all the Foremast-Men belonging to her Majesty's Ship the Depford, to be remov'd into the Sunderland, to serve in her, and that they be paid the Wages due to them in the Depford, on Board the Sunderland, before she sails from the Bay of the North; his Royal Highness is therefore pleas'd so direct, that all the said Men do forthwith repair on Board the said Ship Sunderland, at Woolwich or in Longreach, otherwise they will not only lose the Wages due to them, but be taken up and punished as Deserters.
