Vienna, August 22. N. S. An Express, who left Bircelona the fourth Instant, has brought Advice to this Court of the safe arrival of the Queen of Spain, with the Troops embark'd in Italy. The King upon the occasion of this Solemnity made four Grandees of Spain, Dan Bernardo de Ouiros, and Count Stampa. a Milanese. The Troops landed likewife at Mataro, were review'd by the King, and had receiv'd Orders to march towards Tarragona. From the Camp at Personne, September 3. N. S. On Friday, the 31st of August, we had Advice that the Enemy
