THE following Addressees have been presented to the Queen, congratulating Her Majesty on the Glorious Victory obtain'd over the French near Audenarde, by the Forces of Her Majesty and Her Allies, commanded by his Grace the Duke of Marlborough.

The humble Address of the Mayor, Aldermen and Burgesses of the Borough of Leeds in the County of York; presented to Her Majesty by his Grace the Duke of Somerset.

The humble Address of the High-Sheriff, Deputy-Lieutenants and Justices of the Peace of the County of Hereford; presented to Her Majesty by Jo. Price, Esq; one of their Representatives in Parliament, introduc'd by the Rt. Hon. Mr. Secretary Boyle, in the absence of the Rt. Hon. the Lord Chamberlain.

The humble Address of the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, Sheriffs, Citizens and Commonalty of the Ancient City of Lincoln; presented to Her Majesty by Sir Thomas Meers, one of their Representatives in Parliament.

The humble Address of the High-Sheriff, Deputy-Lieutenants, Justices of the Peace, and Militia Officers of the County of Montgomery; and of the Gentlemen and other Freeholders of the said County; presented to Her Majesty by the Earl of Cholmondeley, Lord-Lieutenant of the said County.

The humble Address of the Bishop, Dean and Chapter, Archdeacons, and Clergy of the Diocese of Exon; presented to Her Majesty by the Reverend Dr. Francis Atterbury, Dean of Carlisle, introduc'd by the Right Honourable the Vice-Chamberlain.

All which Addressees Her Majesty receiv'd very graciously.

Vienna, August 22. N. S. An Express, who left Barcelona the fourth Instant, has brought Advice to this Court of the safe arrival of the Queen of Spain, with the Troops embark'd in Italy. Her Catholick Majesty landed at Mataro on the 26th of July, and made her publick Entry into Barcelona on the 1st Instant, the King riding on Horseback under a Canopy, and the Queen being in a Coach, attended by the Ladies of her Court. They went directly to Church, and receiv'd a Blessing on their Marriage from the Hands of the Archbishop of Tarragona, assisted by several other Prelates; and afterwards supped in Publick, and were serv'd at Table by the chief Officers of their Court. The King upon the occasion of this Solemnity made four Grandees of Spain; Don Bernardo de Quiros, and Count Stampa, a Milanese, for their own Persons; the Duke of Tesla, and the Marquis of Moles, Grand-son to the Duke of Moles, for themselves and their Descendants. The Troops landed likewise at Mataro, were review'd by the King, and had receiv'd Orders to march towards Tarragona. A Courier dispatch'd from the Duke of Savoy's Camp at Chaumont the 13th Instant, brings Advice, that his Royal Highness had made Prisoners of War the Garrisons of Exilles, Perouse, and Fort Lewis, besides those of several little Redoubts in those Parts.

Berlin, August 25. N. S. His Majesty was Espoused to the Princess of Swerin on the 20th Instant, at Swerin. The Princess was Complimented with the Title of Prussian Majesty, and served at Table by one of the King's Chamberlains. The Marriage has been publish'd in all the Churches of this City. There was at the same time a triple Discharge of the Cannon. Monsieur the Chambellan Marschal was sent to the Court of Hanover, to notify this Marriage. The Prince of Anhalt-Dessau is expected here within few Days. Letters from Wilda, of the 20th Instant, say, That Prince Menzikow and General Kepsin are in Disgrace with his Czarish Majesty: They add, that the Czar intends to come to a second Engagement with the Swedes, and to command his Army in Person.

From the Camp at Peronne, September 3. N. S. On Friday, the 31st of August, we had Advice that the Enemy

were advanc'd between Antoin and Tournay; whereupon his Grace the Duke of Marlborough march'd with the Army under his Command from Helchin to Templeuve, from whence we continu'd our March the next Day; and having pass'd the Marque at Pont a Tressin, came and encamp'd with the Right at Antrouille, the Left at Anstain, and the head Quarters at Peronne on the Plains of Lisle. As soon as our Troops were come into their Camp, his Grace went to that of the Prince of Savoy before Lisle, and having dined with his Highness, and conferr'd with him and the other General Officers, he came in the Evening to his Quarters. Yesterday Morning Prince Eugene came hither, and rode out with his Grace to the Right of the Line, to view the Ground about Phalempin, and to mark out a Line for our Army to form in Battel, and to expect the Enemy in case they think fit to attempt the Relief of the Town. At two in the Afternoon they return'd to his Grace's Quarters, where King Augustus and the Landgrave of Hesse were arriv'd some time before from the Siege; his Grace had the Honour to entertain them at Dinner, with the Deputies of the States, the Hereditary Prince of Hesse, and several other General Officers; and in the Evening they went back to the Camp before Lisle. His Grace had an Account last Night that the Enemy's whole Army pass'd the Schelde in the Morning at Tournay, and were encamp'd with the Right at Blandain, and the Left at Willemeneau. This Morning we took a Spy of the Enemy's going into Lisle; who, upon Examination, owns he was sent last Night by the Duke of Burgundy to endeavour to get into the Town, and acquaint Monsieur de Boufflers their Army was on this side Tournay, and that he might depend upon being succour'd. The Enemy have continu'd their March this Day towards Orchies and the Source of the Marque, round which they must come if they attempt to raise the Siege.

From the Camp at Fretin, Sept. 6. N. S. On Tuesday the 4th Instant his Grace the Duke of Marlborough receiv'd advice, that the Enemy's Army were continuing their March towards the Ouverture, into the Plains of Lisle between the Marque and Phalempin; his Grace thereupon order'd the Army to march to the Ground mark'd out for them, and to form in Battel between Noielles and Peronne; they continu'd so 'till Noon, and then encamp'd on the same Ground. In the Evening, besides the Advice we had of the Enemy's Motions, we could hear by their Drums that they were advancing nearer to us; and they having given out they would immediately attempt the Relief of the Siege, his Grace drew out the Army again at break of Day, in order to give them Battel, being join'd by the Prince of Savoy with 72 Squadrons and 26 Battalions from the Siege, with which Troops came likewise King Augustus and the Landgrave of Hesse as Volunteers; but the Enemy having not thought fit to appear, tho' we purposely left all the Passes thro' which they were to come and form, open and unguarded, Prince Eugene after Dining with his Grace, together with the King and the Landgrave, return'd in the Evening with his Troops to the Siege; and our Army encamp'd again with the Right at Noielles, and the Left at Peronne; and the Enemy seeming chiefly to design the fatiguing our Troops by frequent Alarms, his Grace order'd 100 Men of a Battalion to be employ'd in throwing up a Retrenchment in our Front, which was finish'd this Day, and will both secure our Troops from any sudden surprize, and leave the Beliegers at liberty to carry on their Attacks without interruption. The 4th at Night a Quarter-Master and 25 of the Enemy's Dragoons fell in with one of our Outguards, and were all made Prisoners without firing a Shot. Yesterday General Fagel, who has for some time commanded a Corps in Flanders, having left sufficient Garrisons there, and in Brabant, join'd us with seven Battalions, and as many Squadrons; having left four Battalions and one Squadron to come forward with a Convoy
