THE following Addresses have been presented to the Queen, congratulating Her Majesty on the Glorious Victory obtain'd over the French near Audenarde, by the Forces of Her Majesty and Her Allies, commanded by his Grace the Duke of Marlborough.

The humble Address of the Master, Pilots, and Seamen of the *Trinity House* in *Newcastle upon Tyne*; presented to Her Majesty by the Right Honourable the Earl of *Wharton*.

The humble Address of the High-Sheriff, Lord-Lieutenant, Noblemen, Deputy-Lieutenants, Justices of the Peace, Grand-Jury, Gentlemen, Clergy, and Freeholders of the County of *Leicester*, at the Assizes held at the Castle of *Leicester* for the said County, the 29th of *July*, 1708. Presented to Her Majesty by the Right Honourable the Lord *Sherard*.

The humble Address of the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, and Common-Council of the City of *Exon*; transmitted by the Earl of *Pawlet*, and presented to Her Majesty by the Right Honourable the Lord High Treasurer of *Great-Britain*.

The humble Address of *David Ross* of *Balmogoun*, and *Sir Robert Munro* of *Foulis*, in the Name and Behalf of themselves, their Kinsmen, Friends, and Followers in the Shire of *Ross*; presented to Her Majesty by the Rt. Hon. the Earl of *Sunderland*, Principal Secretary of State.

The humble Address of the Noblemen and Freeholders of the Shire of *Air*; transmitted by the Rt. Hon. the Earl of *Loudoun*, High-Sheriff of the said County, and presented to Her Majesty by the Rt. Hon. the Earl of *Mar*.

All which Addresses Her Majesty receiv'd very graciously.

*Vienna, September 1. N. S.* The Hungarian Garrison that was in *Neyra*, has been conducted to *Neuhausel*; which Place, 'tis thought, is by this time invested by the Imperial Army. In the mean while Marshal *Heister* has pass'd the *Danube* with some Regiments, to dislodge the Malecontents who had posted themselves in the Island of *Raab*, and to drive them out of all the other strong Holds they are possess'd of on this side the *Danube*; by which means he will deliver the Frontiers of *Austria* and *Sciria* from any further Incursions of the Enemy. General *Oskai*, one of the Leaders of the Malecontents, has submitted himself and his whole Regiment to the Emperor; Count *Palfi*, Ban of *Croaria*, having procur'd him the Emperor's Pardon. He has likewise deliver'd up a Castle belonging to Count *Palfi*, which the Hungarians were Masters of, and which commands a Pass leading to several of the Towns of Upper Hungary that lye among the Mountains. Our Advices from *Presburg* tell us, that *Anthony Esterhazy* and *Bezeredi*, two other Hungarian Leaders, are now actually treating with the Imperial Generals on Terms for themselves, and the Troops under their Command; and that the Conditions of the Treaty are in a manner settled, they being assur'd of the Emperor's Pardon, and of being constantly employ'd in the Imperial Army. Some Advices say, that Marshal *Heister* is march'd to *Papa*, to assure those Hungarian Generals of a punctual Performance of the Conditions stipulated by them, and to receive them and their Troops into the Emperor's Service. The Pope has written a Letter to one of the Bishops of Hungary, to be communicated to others of the same Order, wherein his Holiness tells him, that the Arms of the Confederate Princes, which have seem'd hitherto to be employ'd only about things

Temporal, are now visibly directed to the Destruction of the Roman Religion, and of the See of Rome; and therefore he requires the said Bishop, together with his Brethren, as true and faithful Sons of the Church, to consider seriously the present Juncture of Affairs, and consult about the most proper Means that may be suggest'd for the Safety and Preservation of it. We are inform'd that the Pope has made the same unjust Representations of his present Disputes with the Imperial Court in several Parts of Europe, as hoping by this Artifice to inflame the Romish Clergy; and alarm the Roman Catholick Princes with the Apprehensions of a Religious War.

*Brussels, Septemb. 13. N. S.* Lieutenant-General *Pascale* is return'd hither with his Detachment of the Garrison of this Place, having left the Convoy of Cannon and Ammunition, which set forward from hence on the 8th, near *Audenarde* on the 11th, under an Escorte of 30 Squadrons and 5 Battalions, commanded by the Earl of *Albemarle*. The Enemy had detach'd a like number of Squadrons, and all the Garrison of *Ghent*, with a design to intercept this Convoy; but though they appear'd on both sides of the Road during all the time of our March from *Grammont* to *Audenarde*, they did not think fit to attack us.

*From the Camp at Fretin, September 13. N. S.* On Tuesday the 11th in the Morning, his Grace the Duke of *Marlborough* received an account that the Enemy were marching nearer to us; and had further advice about Noon, that some of their Troops began to appear in the Plains before the Village of *Entiers*, near the Center of our Retrenchments, in which his Grace had order'd two Brigades of Foot to be posted, under the Command of Brigadier *Evans* and Brigadier *Wermuller*: Our Army was thereupon immediately order'd to their Arms, and the Prince of *Savoy* join'd us with the same number of Squadrons and Battalions that he brought the 5th from the Siege. About 4 in the Afternoon the Enemy began to fire from a Battery of Cannon they had rais'd against the said Village, which they continu'd till it was dark, and began again yesterday about 7 in the Morning. His Grace, Prince *Eugene*, and Monsieur d'*Auverquerque* continued in the Field all Night; and the Troops, which lay upon their Arms, were form'd again in order of Battel: The Enemies chief design seem'd to be to force that Village, for the Security of which such care had been taken, that their Fire of Tuesday, and greatest part of yesterday, has not at all prejudic'd the Works thrown up for its defence, and which were augmented last Night. We do not reckon above 40 or 50 Men kill'd or wounded: His Grace the Duke of *Marlborough* order'd the Army, towards the Evening, to encamp in such a manner, that we shall be immediately ready to receive the Enemy, if they make any further Attempt. They made a Movement last Night, and extended their Left to *Seclin*, and have their Right upon the *Marque*: They have not thought fit to give us any disturbance to day, either by their Motions or Cannon. The Earl of *Albemarle* join'd us yesterday Noon with his Detachment, having left the Convoy safe at *Menin*. We have an account from the French Army, that Monsieur *Chamillard* arriv'd there on Monday last, and, 'tis said, return'd back to Court yesterday. The Prince of *Savoy* went back this Morning with his Troops to the Siege.

*Hague, September 13. N. S.* This Morning the Queen of *Portugal* embark'd at *Rotterdam* on the *Peregrine* Yacht, in order to sail for *Portsmouth* if the Wind continues fair. We have Letters from France of the 10th, with Advice that the French Court had receiv'd Intelligence, that *Beneffelles* was surrender'd to the Duke of *Sa-*
