In the mean while Marshal Heister has paird the Danube with fome Regiments, to dislodge the Malecontents who had posted themselves in the Island of Raib, and to drive them out of all the other strong Holds they are possess of on this side the Danube; by which means he will deliver the Fronziers of Austria and Stiria from any further incusions of the Enemy. General Oskai, one of the Leaders of the Malecontents, has submitted himself and his whole Regiment to the Emperor; Count Palfi, Ban of Croaria, having procur'd him Table Eniperor's Pardon. He has likewife deliver'd up a were Masters of, and which continueds a Pass leaving to First of the Towns of Upper Hungary that lye among the Mountains.
