THE following Addresses have been presented to the Queen, congratulating Her Majesty on the Glorious Victory obtain'd over the French near *Audenarde*, by the Forces of Her Majesty and Her Allies, commanded by His Grace the Duke of *Marlborough*.

The humble Address of the Mayor, the Right Honourable the Recorder, Deputy-Recorder, Aldermen, Bailiffs, and Burgeses of the Corporation of *Northampton*; presented to Her Majesty by *Francis Arundel*, Esq; one of their Representatives in Parliament.

The humble Address of the Mayor, Burgeses, and Commonalty of the City of *Bristol*, in Common-Council assembled; presented to Her Majesty by *Robert Eyre*, Esq; their Recorder.

The humble Address of the Constables and Inhabitants of the Borough of *Great Marlow*, in the County of *Bucks*, together with their Representatives in Parliament; presented to Her Majesty by *Jame Chase*, Esq; one of their Representatives in Parliament, introduced by the Rt. Hon. the Earl of *Bridgewater*, Lord-Lieutenant of the said County.

Which Addresses Her Majesty receiv'd very graciously.

Genoa, September 2. N. S. This State is raising new Levies with all possible Expedition, and has already above 7000 Men in Arms. Letters from Rome say, that the Marquis de *Pric*, Plenipotentiary from his Imperial Majesty, is suddenly expected there; and it is thought, upon the arrival of that Minister, some advances will be made towards an Accommodation between the Courts of *Vienna* and *Rome*. In the mean time, the Pope has reviewed his Troops, and, after having given them his Benediction, appear'd at the Head of them on Horse-back, and declared that he would take the Field with them as their Generalissimo.

Vienna, September 12. N. S. Two Days ago arrived here Prince *Emanuel* of *Seiffons*, with the News of the taking of *Fenestrelles*. He left the Duke of *Savoy's* Camp at *Balbotet* the last Day of August. We have Advice from *Transilvania*, by Letters of the 22d of the last Month, that General *Kriechbaum* having receiv'd Intelligence of Count *Caroli's* being posted between *Clausenburg* and *Bonzida*, with a Body of 9000 Malecontents, had sent 2000 German Horse against him; but upon the approach of the Germans, the Malecontents retired into the Neighbouring Mountains, and in their passage plundered two Towns, *Millenbach* and *Sasvaros*. In the first there was a Guard of 40 Germans, with a Lieutenant; and in the second an Ensign with 20 Men. Altho' the Emperor be Master of all the strong Towns in *Transilvania*, yet that Country is, at present, very much infested by the Malecontent Parties, which divide themselves into smaller and greater Bodies, from 20 to 2 or 300, and in that manner over-run the Country, pillaging and destroying wherever they come; and as soon as they are pursued by the Imperial Troops, take shelter in the Mountains. Count *Anthony Esterhafi* has rejected the Offers made him by *Marshall Heister*; but *Bezereci*, with several of his Under-Officers, having shewed a disposition to embrace the Emperor's Pardon, one of the Officers, who was privy to his Design, divulged it to the common Soldiers, and putting himself at the Head of 500 Men, marched into *Ghiriz*, and carried off *Bezereci*, with the other Officers, who intended to submit to the Emperor. *Marshall Heister* being informed of what had passed, sent immediately a Detachment in pursuit of the Malecontents; which, it is said, overtook them at *Keskemet*, for *Beze-*

redi with his Fellow-Prisoners at Liberty, and put most of the 500 Hungarians to the Sword. Count *Zintzendorf* is set out for *Poland*, with the Character of Envoy Extraordinary from this Court to King *Stanislaus*; he has Credentials for the Character of Ambassador, in case of a Diet of Pacification. He goes by the way of *Breslaw*, and carries with him the Resolutions of this Court, touching the points still in Debate about the Execution of the Treaty of *Alt-Ranfadt*.

Journal from the Camp before *Lille*.

September 20. N. S. The Trenches were reliev'd by Lieutenant-General *d'Arnan*, and Major-General *Soble*, with 5 Battalions on the Right, and 7 on the Left. The Night was for the most part employ'd in calarging the Saps, both on the Right and Left, and in advancing the Gallery towards the Horn-work of the Right, part of which was burnt by the Enemy. Three Mines were finished on the Right before the Grand Breach, and a Gallery compleated towards the Counterguard of the Right. Two Mines were likewise ready to spring on the Left; but the Gallery towards the Counterguard of the Left could not be quite finished. The 21st the Trenches were relieved by Lieutenant-General *Wilke*, Major-General *Sacken*, and Sir *Richard Temple* Brigadier, with 5 Battalions on the Right, and 7 on the Left. The Disposition being made for attacking the Out-works between 6 and 7 in the Evening, the Signal was given by a general Discharge from the Batteries, both of Cannon and Mortars; the Mines both on the Right and Left were immediately sprung with good Success, the Granadiers thereupon mounting the Breach of the Counterguard on the Right, obliged the Enemy to retire into the Retrenchment of that Work, and made a very good Lodgment on the Breach. Our Men likewise beat out the Enemy, and made 2 Lodgments on the Counterscarp before the Grand Breach; but a great Number of fresh Troops coming out upon them, and the Officer who commanded the Troops appointed to sustain our Men being kill'd, they were obliged to quit those two Lodgments. The Attack of the Counterscarp of the Counterguard on the Left succeeded as well as could be desired, and our Men continued in their Lodgment there without any Disturbance. During these Actions the Prince of *Savoy* received a Wound from a small Shot in the Forehead, which has since been laid open, and his Highness is in no manner of Danger. The 22d the Trenches were relieved by Lieutenant-General *Spar*, Major-General *Soble*, and Brigadier *du Troffel*, with 5 Battalions on the Right, and 7 on the Left. The chief Work of this Night was to enlarge our Lodgment on the Counterguard, to advance the Gallery of the Horn-work on the Right, and to the Counterguard on the Left; as also to carry on and enlarge the Saps on the Right and Left in order to another Attack, for which 400 Granadiers were ordered from the Camp, commanded by his Grace the Duke of *Marlborough*, to join the Troops of the Siege appointed for that Service. Our Loss this Night was very inconsiderable.

From the Camp at *Lannoy*, Sept. 24. N. S. On Friday the 21st, Brigadier *Landsberg* was ordered to March with 6 Battalions of Foot, and 8 Squadrons of Horse, and encamp near *Courtray*, whither 11 Squadrons more were ordered at the same time from *Audenarde*, and five more have been sent thither since. The Prince of *Savoy* is in so fair a way of Recovery of the Wound he receiv'd in his Forehead on Friday Night last, that it is hoped he may be abroad again in a day or two. During his being obliged to stay at home, his Grace the Duke of *Marlborough* has been every Day at the Siege, and was last Night in the Trenches during the whole time of the Attack of the

Trench.

Tenaille on the Left; and part of the Counterscarp. 40 Grenadiers, and as many Fusiliers, were order'd for this Service, who in a short time were entire Masters of the Tenaille, and made a very good Lodgment there. However, the lateness of the Season, the slowness with which the Engineers have proceeded in their Approaches, and the great difficulty there will be, after the Consumption of so prodigious a quantity of Powder, to provide what will still be necessary in any reasonable time, give us some Apprehensions for the Success of the Siege, notwithstanding that the Enemy by their retiring seem'd to have given over all thoughts of relieving it. His Grace the Duke of Marlborough having an account from General Erle, that he arriv'd the 21st with the Troops under his Command at Ostend, has sent an Officer thither with Orders for their Landing. The Duke of Burgundy's Army continue in their former Camp between Audenarde and Tourney, and Monsieur de la Motte is march'd with his Detachment towards Bruges.

Hague, September 25. N. S. The Queen of Portugal, after having been on Board for some Days in Expectation of a fair Wind for England, is return'd from the Briel to Rotterdam. They write from the Upper Rhine that 7 Regiments of Horse had pass'd that River on the 17th Instant at Philippsburg, in order to join the Detachment under the Command of Count Mercei and Count de la Tour. Some Letters say, that the late Detachments made from the French Army are order'd to halt at a certain Place till they receive new Orders; but others say, that they continue their March into Flanders. By Letters from Turin of the 8th Instant we hear, the Duke of Savoy continued in his Camp near Fenestrelles, and the Marshal de Villars near Briançon. His Royal Highness has granted an Exemption from Taxes to the Valley of Pragelas for one Year, in Consideration of their Sufferings in the present War, and has allowed them the free Exercise of their Religion.

Whitehall, Sept. 19. Letters from Ostend which came in this Evening say, that Count la Motte, at the Head of 18000 Men, had attempted to intercept a Convoy which was marching from that Place towards the Confederate Army, but was engaged by a Detachment under the Command of Major-General Cadogan, and entirely Routed, after a Dispute of 3 hours. They write, that they were assured there was a great Slaughter of the Enemy in this Action, but that they had not received the Particulars of it. The Forces commanded by Lieutenant-General Erle are encamp'd at Lettingen on the Canal of Newport, in order to preserve the Communication with our Army, and cut off that of the Enemy between Bruges and France.
