Journal from the Camp before Lifle.

S Eptember 24. N. S. The Trenches were reliev'd by Lieutenant-General Wilke, Major-General Zoutland, and Brigadier Keppel, with 5 Battalions on the Right, and 7 on the Left. This Night was employ'd in advancing the Sap towards the two Grand Breaches, and along the Ditches of the two Counterguards; the Miners also began 2 Mines in order to blow up the Traverses, behind which the Enemy continue in those Works. wife made some Progress in the Bridges, to pass the Ditch of the Horn-work on the Right, and continu'd the Lodgments before the Ravelin on the Right. Our Loss this Night was very inconfiderable. The 25th the Trenches were reliev'd by Lieutenant General Sparr, Major-General Soble, and Brigadier Boisser, with the usual Number of Battations on the Right and Left. The Sap was carried on before the Breaches, within 10 Paces of the Patrick. lifedoes, and along the Faces of the Ravelin on the Right. The Miners continu'd to work at two Mines before the Breach on he Left; as also at the Mines to blow up the Traveries of the Counterguards, with very little Lois. The 26th the Trenches were reliev'd by Lieutenant-General Arnan, Major-General Sacken, and Brigadier Temple, with the fame number of Battalions as formerly god Success, and little or no Loss. The 27th the Prince of Holitein-Beck reliev'd the Trenches with Major General Sobie, Brigadier Boisser, and the usual Number of Battalions. The Sap was confiderably advanced along the Face of the Rayelin and the Counterward on the Right: Face of the Ravelin and the Counterguard on the Right; on the Left the Saps were likewife continu'd, and fevetal Mines carried on in the Counterguards, and before the grand Breach. We had this Night near 50 Men kill'd and wounded; about break of Day the Enemy iprung a Mine before the Breach on the Right, which was fo far from doing us any Damage, that it may turn to our Advantage by fecuring our Lodgment there. The 28th the Trenches were relieved by Lieutenant-General Wilke, Major-General Collyer, and Brigadier Wassenser, with the former Number of Battalions; the Night was employ'd in working in the thursal Sane and Miles.

The Trenches were relieved by Baron Sparr, Lieutenant-General, Major-General Zoutland, and Brigadier Keppel, with 5 Battalions on the Right, and 7 on the Leit. About 6 in the Evening a signal was made by the Discharge of two Easteries of Mortars, and a Mine sprung at the same time under the Traverse of the Counterguard on the Less; the Mine had such Essect, that our Granadiers got over, and forced the Enemy into their Communication of Retreat; the Workmen followed and made a Lodgment on the Traverse. On the Right we made another Opening, in order to make a new Lodgment on the Counterguards which will take off the Fire the Enemy might make from thence to hinder the Passage of the Ditch towards the Ravelin, between the two Counterguards. We likewife advanced the Sap in three different Places, and mounted prices of Cancon, which foon destroy of the Communication of the Ravelin on the Right with the Horn-work. The 30th the Trenches were relieved by Lieutenant-General Wilke, Major-General Vickenback, and Brigadier Boisset, with the usual Number of Battalions for each The Night was employed in carrying on the Saps, and in railing a Work on the Right to look into the Cover'd-way before the Grand Breach. It is observed that the Enemy's Fire from the Town is very much abated, which we impute to the want of Fowder; and two Deferters, who came one of the Place Yesterday, fay, they are already torced to make use of the Magazine which was designed for the defence of the Cittadel.

From the Camp at Lannoy, Sept. 27. N. S. Six hundred Waggons being order'd fome Days fince from our Army, and that of the Siege, under a Guard of 1200 Horse and as many Foot; to bring a further Supply of Ammunition for the Sieges from Oitend; his Grace the Duke of Markorough has an Accounty that they palled the Canal of Newport the 24th at La finishen, and that our Troops had taken Post there. The same Day, upon Notice that beonficur ee la Motte was arrived at bruges with his Detachment, Brigadier Eliz was order'd to march with 6 Battalions to Mecricele on the other fide the Lys; and his Grace having turther. Advice, that the Duke of Berwick was gone with a Detachment into Floriders. Ma\_ jor-General Webb march'd yesterday with 12 Battasions more the same way, for the Security of that Convoy; and the Florie appointed for that Service is reinfored to the Number of 38 Squadrons: His Grace Liss order d a Camp to be mark'd, which extends with the Left near Menin; the Baggage is already fent thither, and it is intended the Army shall murch on Saturday. The Enemy continue in their former Situation between Augentique and Tournay, and we are fold are making Retrenchments along the scheid between those Towns; they have likewife transported a Train of Artificry from their Frontier Towns to Ghent.

From the Camp at Lannoy, Sept. 28, N. S. Major-General Cadogair fent his Grace an Account from Tour-hout this Morning, that the Convoy of Ammunition which came out of Oftend yefferday, had paft the Canal or Newport, and was on the March intwards Rouffmagr. tachment of 12 Companies of Granadiers, which he fent to policis thendelves of Cudenturgh, where they were to pats, arrived there at the immerise that 1000 Foot and 300 clorie came thither from the Dulie of Berwick's Army with the fame Intention; they attacked our Men, but after a pretty warm Dilpu e, wer equire ocar out of the Village, and retired towards Briges: They had a Lientenant-Colonel killed, and a great many private Men killed and wounded; on our five was a Captain killed, and another woundeds but we have loft-very few Men.
