

At the Court at Buckingham Palace, the 10th day of February 1969.

PRESENT,

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council

Whereas the Minister of Housing and Local Government, after giving to the Incumbent and Churchwardens of the Parish of Gosforth, in the County of Northumberland, ten days' previous notice of his intention in that behalf, has, under the provisions of the Burial Act 1853, as amended by subsequent enactments, made a Representation to Her Majesty in Council that, for the protection of the Public Health, burials should be discontinued forthwith and entirely in St. Nicholas' Churchyard, in the said Parish, shown hatched on the plan annexed hereto.

Provided that the burial may be allowed at their decease of the bodies of Anne Rawling Batey, Joseph Nicholson Buglass, Grace Freda Feggetter, James Feggetter, Mary Shipley Henderson, Jane Hindmarsh,

Annie Mary Kilroe, Annie Stevenson, Lionel Stevenson and Elizabeth Wardle, subject to the condition that each coffin buried in a vault or walled grave be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented and that no part of a coffin buried in an earthen grave shall be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give Notice of such Representation and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Privy Council on the 17th day of April next.

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the *London Gazette*, and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the Churches or Chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the Parish affected by such Representation one month before the said 17th day of April.
