Port Mahon, September 30. N. S. N the 14th Instant Major-General Stanhope landed here with 2600 Men, 1200 of whom were Brirish, including the Marines, 600 Portuguese, and the rest Spaniards. We have found great Difficulties in landing and transporting our heavy Artillery and Stores through a Country very Rocky, in which there are but few Beasts of Burthen: Yet with continual Labour we did in 12 Days bring up all our Artillery, confifting of 4: Picces of Cannon, and 15 Mortars, to the Flace near which we proposed to make use of them. On the 28th, at Break of Day, we mounted nine Pieces of Cannon in Battery against two Towers, which supported a Line the Enemy had made from Sea to Sea. Within few Hours we beat down those Towers, and made some Breaches in beat down those I owers, and made ione breaches ind the Line it felt, which Major-General Stanhope defigned to have attacked the next Day: But Brigadier Wade being posted on the Right with two Battalions at some distance from the Major-General, some of his Granadiers, without Orders, advanced to the Line, and got into it; whereupon the Brigadier marched, with what Men he could immediately get together, to support them. As soon as the Fire was heard, the Major-General himself took the ordinary Guard of the Battery, and advanced to that Part of the Line which was next to him. The Enemy were in so great a Consternanext to fith. The Energy worst are greater that this fudden Approach of our Troops, that they abandoned the two other Towers, which we could not otherwise have taken without Cannon. We ledged our therwise have taken without Cannon. felves the fame Evening at the Foot of the Glatis of the main Caille, and traced our main Pattery to play upon it. On the Morning following the Enemy beat a Parley, and at s of the Clock in the Afternoon the Capitulation was figned. This Morning the Major-General hash taken Policifion of one Gate, and of all the Outworks of the E-nemy. The Garrison confided of above 1000 Men under Arms, part of whom are to be trae ported in our Ships into France, and the others into Spain. We have not had 50 Men killed or wounded in the whole Siege. Among the former was Captain Stanhope, Drother to the Major-General, a young Gentleman of much Expediation, who had a great Share in the whole Progress of this Emerptine, as well as in the Execution of it. Fort Fornelle, which has before it an Harbour no left confidetable, though left noved, than Port Makon, has also febmitted to the Okedience of King Charles. This Sersubmitted to the Obedience of King Charles. vice is owing to Captain Butler and Captain Fairborne, who battered that Fort with the two Ships under their command, 'eill they obliged it to furrender. A Detachment of Foot, which was four by the Major-General to Chadella, the Capital of this Island, hath taken 100 Soldiers, which were in it, Prifoners or Wars by which means this whole Island is entirely in our Possession, to the genersi faristaction of the l'eople, who are unanimous in the Interest of King Charles. We have found in the Gar-rion 100 Cannon, 3000 Barrels of Powder, and allthings necessary for a good Defence. The Major General has appointed Brigadier Petit Governor of the Mand, in the Name of his Catholick Majefty, in confideration of his Eminem Services here, and at both Sieges of Harcelona.

Vienna, October 10. N. S. Some days ago died here Count Oettingen, Prefident of the Aulick Council. He was imployed by his Imperial Majefly at the Treaty of Carlowitz, as his first Plenipotentiary, and afterwords fent to the Port with the Character of Ambellidor. We have Letters here from the King of Sweden's Army, dated the 2d of September, N. S. from Zernikow on the River Sofla-The Swediffi Army arrived there the day before, and intended the fame day the Letters came away to pais the Soffe, the Mulcovites having reflect without breaking down the Bridges they had laid over that River. General Galtz, who was incamped there with 20000 Ruffian Dragoons, repassed the Sosia upon the approach of the Swedilli Army, and refried with his Body to Kruycow. The Char, who was intrenched with his Infantiv at Moki, had left that place, and was gone towards Myciflaw, there to pass the Sosia. The King of Sweden was Master of all the Country between the Nieper and the Sosia, which supplied his Army plent fully with Providious. The Mateovite Army was disperfed in feveral Potts, but their greatest Force was incamped on the other fide of the River Soffa; where, if they continued, the Swedish Leners make us expect foonthe News of a great Action. Their Letters add, I hat the Mulcovites expressed their tears of a Revolt in Ukrania, upon the approach of the Swedish Army. We have but very uncertain Advices of the Progress of the Siege of Neuhausel. From the King of Sweden's Quarters within the Frontiers of Muscovy, september 21. A. S. On the 10th Instant 40000 Muscovices attacked five of our Regiments; but were received with 10 much viguur, that they lost 3500 Men, including such as were killed in the Field of Battle, or sled out of it to the Morasses in which they were exposed to our Fire, without being capable of making a Resistance, or Escape. The Dahlecarlisms were cut to pieces, and denied Quarter. Two Muscovite Generals were killed in this Action; and on our side 226 Men, among whom was Colonel Rosentiern, and several Captains. On the 19th General Batt had formed a design to surprize the Baggage of our German Dragoons; but 2000 of his Men having advanced into an Interval of Marshy Ground between those Regiments, were cut off, without being able to advance or retire, and were shot by our Troops, who have taken all their Horses. Yesterday, when we were preparing to decamp, there appeared a Body of 20000 Muscovites, commanded by Prince Menzikoss, whom his Majesty attacked with 2000 Men, and put them to slight; the King has pursued them a League within their Territories, to the Ground on which we are at present encamped. His Majesty had an Horse killed under him in the Engagement, and lost two of his Aids de Camp. The Muscovites burn their Country as they retire.

From the Lump at Rouffeiner, October 24. N. S. On Monday the 22d, at eight in the Evening, an Expedicame from the Prince of Savoy's Camp before Lale, to give his Grace the Duke of Mariborough an account that the Bat-

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tery raised for making new Breaches, consisting of near 50 Pieces of Cannon, and 25 Mortars, began to fire on Sunday Morning, and had done fo good Execution, that the next day, at four in the Afternoon, the Garrison beat the Chamade, and defired to Capitulate; whereupon Hostages were immediately exchanged, and accordingly yesterday one of the Gates was delivered to us. We have not yet the Articles, but we hear the Garrison is to retire into the Citadel, except the Horse which got in with the Chevalier de Luxembourg, who are to be Conducted to Douay. His Grace has an account from the Duke of Burgundy's Army, that they began to separate their Horse, the Guardes du Corps being order'd to Douay, the Gend'arms quartered in the Barracks of Tournay, and the Horse Granadiers Cantoned about Anthoin, and that Quarters are mark'd for the Princes and the Duke of Berwick in Tournay. The Duke of Vendosme is still at Bruges, and his Troops are encamp'd behind the Canal, where Provisions grow very scarce: We hear from thence, he has attack'd our Post at Leffinghan, and been beaten off with considerable Loss; but we have nothing of it from our own People, the Communication being entirely cut off. Monfieur Fagel continues with the Troops under his Command at Kortemarck, and Brigadier Evans with his Detachment at Kokelaer.

Kenfington, Octob. 18. This Day Sir Richard Temple, Brigadier of her Majesty's Armies, arrived here from his Grace the Duke of Marlborough, with an Account of the Surrender of the Town of Liste to the Allies, for which Marefehal Boufflers Capitulated with Prince Eugene of Savoy on the 23d Inftant, N. S. on which Day one Gare of the Town was delivered up to the Besiegers. The Brigadier was received with particular Distinction by the Queen, in regard to the confiderable part he had in that Service. The Hostages for the Enemy were Brigadier Mallebois, two Colonels, and a Major; in behalf of the Allies, Brigadier du Troussell, Colonel Lalo, Colonel Sekendorf, and a Major of the Hannoverian Troops. Articles of Capitulation are in Substance, That the Town thould be furrendered within three Days, including that of Capitulation. That the Horse who threw themselves into the Garrison with a Supply of Powder, under the Command of the Chevalier de Luxembourg, should be allowed to March out of the Town. That the Garrison which was in the Town, at the time when it was Invested, both Horse and Foot, should murch into the Citadel; it having been refused that the Cavalry should march out of the Town.

Darimenth, October 17. The West-India Ficet and Coasters, under the Convoy of the Southampton, Lizard and Hector, not being able to make Torbay, and the Wind being strong at N.E. were all forced yesterday to the Westward; and, we suppose, will put to Plimouth.

Plimouth, October 17. This Day came in from the Hallward, being forced by contrary Winds, the Southampton, Hector and Lizard, with the West-India Ships. Came in also a Swede with Stores for this Dock, and a French Privateer of 24 Guns, taken by the Worcester. There appear now off of this Harbour Sir John Leake, Sir John Norris, and Vice-Admiral Wallenger, with 5 English and 8 Dutch Men of War, and some Merchant Ships coming from the Streights.
