THIS Night, at 10 of the Clock, the Proceſſion to the private Interment of his Royal Highneſs Prince George of Denmark, from the Painted Chamber within the Palace of Weſtmiſter, to the Place of Burial in the Abbey-Church, was performed in the following manner.

Her Maſteſty's Foot-Guards lined the Way between the Stairs leading from the Painted-Chamber to the Door of the Abbey.

The Yeomen of the Guard closed the Proceſſion.

At the Door of the Abbey the Dean and Prebends met the Body, and proceeded before it, ſinging an Anthem, to King Henry the Seventh's Chappel, where it was depoſited during Divine Service, the Canopy being held over it, the Supporters of the Pall ſtanding by it, the Chief Mourner and his two Supporters reſting themſelves in Chairs at the Head of it, while the Nobility proceeded to their Stalls.

After Divine Service, the Body was conveyed to the Vault, preceded by the four white Staff Officers to his Royal Highneſs, and followed by the Chief Mourner, de Garter going before them.

The Secular Office of Burial being performed after an Anthem ſung, Garter King of Arms proclaimed his Royal Highneſs's Stile, and the white Staff Officers broke their Staves, and threw them into the Vault.

Genoa, November 4. N. S. Sir Edward Whitaker, with the Squadron under his Command, arrived laſt Week at Leghorn, where he deſigns to take in freſh Proviſions, and ſail from thence to Naples. He has already diſpatched Advices to Cardinal Grimani, to deſire that all things may be ready, upon his Arrival, for the immediate Embarkation of the Troops which are deſigned for Spain. Two Ships are expected here this Week, to take on Board the Regiment of Oſnabrug; and, at the ſame time, convey a Battalion of Griſons. This Reinforcement will be in a Condition to embark for Barcelona within fix days.

Vienna, November 7. N. S. On the laſt Day of October the Malecontents of Hungary, under the Command of Count Anthony Eſterhaſi, to the number of 8000, paſſed the Muhr in three Places, and pillaged the Town of Luthenberg, with ſeveral Villages in the Neighbourhood, drove away great numbers of Cattle, and carried off all ſorts of Goods and Proviſions. When the Letters came away they continued to deſtroy all that Tract of Land between the Muhr, and the Drave from Rackelſperg down to the joining of the two Rivers; and no Troops were near at hand to oppoſe them. They had inveſted Czachenthurn, and were battering it with five Pieces of Cannon. While the Hungarians are thus powerful on this ſide the Danube, we are told they have met with a conſiderable check in Upper Hungary, in a rencounter with the Imperial Cavalry. Count Berezeni's Son is ſaid to have been made Priſoner in the Action; and Count Ozkai, who lately abandoned the Party of the Malecontents, to be killed; but hitherto we have no certain Account of the Particulars, the Court having received no direct advice of this Affair from Marſhal Heiſter. On the 4th Inſtant Prince Maurice of Savoy arrived here, with the News of the Surrender of the Town of Liſie.

From the Camp at Rouſſelaer, November 14. N. S. On Friday the 9th Inſtant, the Earl of Stairs attacked a Force that covers Dixmuyde, which he carried after a very ſhort Reſiſtance, and made the Garriſon, conſiſting of 200 Grenadiers, commanded by a Lieutenant-Colonel, Priſoners of War. On the 10th Brigadier Evans marched from Langhemarq, and join'd the Earl of Stairs with five Battalions of Foot, and ſix Squadrons of Horſe more. Prince d'Auvergne has been encamped ſome days at Annay, with thirty four Squadrons, and has ſent from thence conſiderable quantities of Corn to the Prince of Savoy's Army, though the Enemy had detached above 40 Squadrons into thoſe Parts to prevent it. On the 12th Major-General Cadogan went, together with Brigadier Cronſrom, to Turcoin; where they were met by the Commiſſioners appointed by the Court of France to treat with them about the Exchange of Priſoners, and his Grace the Duke of Marlborough has an Account that they make a good Progreſs in that Affair. The Earl of Stairs writes from Loo, near Dixmuyde, that the Country thereabouts bring in their Corn, Cattle, and other Proviſions, at the Price he offers, in greater Abundance than could be expected.

expected; which will be forwarded, as fast as Carriages can be provided, to the Army. Upon Advice that part of the Enemy's Troops are in motion towards Newport, his Grace has ordered a further Reinforcement of Horse and Foot to join the Earl of Stairs.

Brussels, November 19. N. S. On the 15th Instant the Besiegers were lodged upon and in the first Counter-scarp of the Citadel of Lille, and were advanced within 60 Paces of the second; the Ditch of the former being drained, and Bridges built over it. The Batteries were not to begin to play 'till the Outworks were reduced; and it being judged from the small Fire the Enemy made that they began to want Ammunition; 'twas not doubted but they would soon surrender. Major-General Cadogan, and the Prince d'Auvergne, were detached on the 7th towards Artois; whence they have brought a great quantity of Corn to Lille. From thence the Major-General went to Turcoin, the Place appointed to confer upon an Exchange of Prisoners, where the Treaty is concluded; and it is agreed, That the private Men and Officers shall be exchanged against others of the same Character, as far as they go, and the rest to remain Prisoners. There are Letters of the 15th from the Army at Rouffelaer, advising, That a Body of the Enemy had surprized and made Prisoners a small part of the Detachment sent towards Furnes.

Hague, November 20. N. S. Letters from Lille of the 14th Instant say, that the Besiegers were on that Day Masters of all the first Cover'd-way, except two places of Arms on the Left, from which they did not doubt but they should drive the Enemy, on the Day following. They had erected two Batteries on the Counter-scarp of that Work, but did not design to play their Artillery from thence 'till they should have lodged themselves on the second Counter-scarp. They continued to drain the Ditch, and had made several Openings into it, to facilitate their Passage when it is dry. Prince Eugene coming into the Trenches, had an Aid-de-Camp killed by his Side. They write from Rouffelaer of the 15th, that they had received great quantities of Corn from the Neighbourhood of Furnes, for the Subsistence of the Army. The Duke of Vendosme was ill of the Gout at Salsouin. The State of the War for the ensuing Year is already settled, and to morrow the Council of State is to present it to the States General, to be transmitted to the several Provinces.

Offend, November 21. N. S. Our Army is still encamped at Rouffelaer. We have received Advice, that two Prussian Regiments, and two Squadrons of Horse belonging to the Detachment commanded by the Earl of Stairs at Dixmuyde, who were detached to a little Village near that Place, were surrounded and attacked by a great Body of the Enemy, from the Carrions of Bruges and Newport; and, after a Dispute of half an hour, made Prisoners of War. The Officers and Soldiers, who were taken Prisoners at Lessinghen, are exchanged, and are to come back hither.
