Vienna, December 1. N. S.

Count Maximilian of Staremberg, Lieutenant-General of his Imperial Majesty's Forces, who some Months ago was surprized by a Party of Hungarians, having found Means to make his Escape out of his Confinement, arrived here yesterday. Advices from Hungary say, that a Body of Malecontents having appeared before Fankkirchen, summoned the Garrison to surrender; and upon their Refusal, threw in some Bombs into the Town; but those having had no Effect, the Malecontents retired. Yesterday being St. Andrew's Day, the Anniversary Feast of the Knights of the Golden Fleeces, all the Knights of the Order appeared at Court in their Collars, and attended their Imperial Majesties to Chappel. The Marquis of Obizzi, who was given over to other Day by his Physicians, and was in so low a Condition that the Report was spread Abroad of his being actually dead, begins now to give some hopes of his Recovery. Count Schonborn, Vice-Chancellor of the Empire, sets out to Day on his Journey to Bamberg, to assist at the ensuing Election of a Coadjutor for that Bishoprick, for which he stands Candidate.

From the Camp at Melle, December 13. N. S. On the 11th Instant the Duke of Marlborough marched with the Army under his Command from Beirleghem, and encamped with the Right at Melle, and the Left at Meerlebeck. Orders were immediately given for laying Bridges over the Upper and Lower Schelde, as well as over the Lys, for the Communication with the several Bodies of Troops employed in the Attack of Ghent. Though the hard Frost we have had for some days past proves no small hindrance to us, a great quantity of Artillery and Ammunition is coming from Holland by Antwerp to Dendermond. The Garrison of the Citadel of Lisle marched out the 11th Instant, with 6 pieces of Cannon, and the other Marks of Honour usually granted on the like Occasion, to be conducted to Doway. Orders are given for repairing such of the Works as have been damaged by our Attacks, and a sufficient Garrison is appointed for the Place. Part of the Artillery which was employed in the Siege was embarked Yesterday, and is to be brought down the Lys to Deynse, under the Guard of two Battalions of Foot, if the River be not frozen. Prince Eugene marches this Day from Lisle, and is to take Post with his Army between the Upper and Lower Schelde.

Hague, December 14. N. S. On the 12th Instant Monsieur van Thilau, Adjutant-General to the Prince of Nassau, arrived here Express from that Prince to their High Mightinesses, with the Capitulation of the Citadel of Lisle, which was Sign'd on the 9th Instant, and is in Substance, as follows:

I. That the Royal Gate shall be delivered into the Possession of the Allies on the 9th, two hours after the signing the Capitulation, and a Barrier shall be put at the further end of the Arch of the said Gate, to prevent the Troops of the Allies and the Garrison mixing one with another.

II. That the Chappel of the Citadel shall be preserved for the Use of the Roman Catholics.

III. That Marschal Boufflers, and the whole Garrison, whether belonging to the Town or Citadel, shall march out the 10th with all the usual Marks of Honour, with such 10 Charges of Powder and Ball, six Pieces of Cannon, three of them 12 Pounders, and the other three 3 Pounders, and 4 Mortars, and shall be conducted to Doway; but that the Sieurs Tournin, Maillebois, and St. Martin, shall be detained to secure the Payment of such Debts as have been contracted in the Town of Lisle, for the French King's Service.

IV. That the Allies shall furnish the necessary Boats for Transporting the Artillery granted to the Garrison; as also for their Sick and Wounded Men, and Baggage.

V. That as to the Transporting the Sick and Wounded, who were left in the City at the time of the Surrender of it, and are able to go out with the Garrison of the Citadel, it shall be done in the manner agreed upon by the Capitulation for the City.

VI. That the Sick and Wounded, who are now in the Citadel, and not in a condition to march out with the Garrison, shall have Lodgings assigned them in the Town till their Recovery; that they shall be taken care of at the Expence of the Besieged; and when recovered, shall be safely conducted by the Canal of Lisse to Doway.

VII. That the Beds and other Furniture of the Hospitals that have been made use of for the Sick and Wounded, during the Siege of the Citadel, shall be restored to the Magistrates of Lisse, or to the Undertakers to whom they belonged.

VIII. That the Commissaries, the Pay-master, Chaplains, Director and Surgeons of the Hospitals, and in general all Workmen, and other Persons living in the Citadel, shall be conducted to Doway, except the Sieurs Tournin, Maillebois and St. Martin, as above-mentioned.

IX. That the same Hostages shall be answerable for the private Debts of Officers, or others belonging to the Garrison.

X. That the Marschal de Boufflers's Goods shall be sent with a Pass, and a Guard to Doway; and in case they cannot be transported at the time that the Garrison marches out, sufficient time shall be allowed for that Purpose, and Boats or other Carriages shall be furnished at his Expence.

XI. That the Officers and others of the Garrison, who cannot now carry away their Goods for want of Carriages, shall have time allowed them, and Passes for that purpose.

XII. That the Garrison shall be allowed to carry out with them two covered Waggoas, which shall not be visited under any Pretence whatsoever.

XIII. That the Besieged shall not be obliged to pay for any Horses they have taken, or for any Houses about the Citadel that have been demolished, or Boats ruined, during the Siege.

XIV. That the Prisoners taken on either side shall be Released.

XV. That no Body shall be stopped or molested; but that the whole Garrison, and all belonging to it, shall be carried to Doway the shortest way, as is above-mentioned in the Third and Eighth Articles.

XVI. That the Deserters, who may be found among the Besieged, shall be restored to the Allies, and may be taken out of their Ranks in their March.

XVII. That two Days Provision may be taken out of the City for the Garrison, to be computed from the Day of their Marching out.

XVIII. That the Hostages given by either side, for the due Execution of this Capitulation, shall be restored after its being fulfilled, and the Garrison's arrival at Doway.

The following Articles were added by the Allies, and agreed upon as part of the Capitulation.

I. THAT the Besiegers shall on the 9th send their Commissaries into the Citadel, to whom the Magazines shall be delivered up; and if it be discovered that any of the Stores are Destroyed upon this Occasion, the Garrison shall make them good.

II. That all Debts contracted by the Garrison, both on Account of the Publick, and Private Persons, shall be discharged;
