The Imperial Officers who command in the Towns situated in the Mountains of Upper Hungary, lately recovered out of the Hands of the Malecontents, complain of the great Scarcity of Provisions in those Party, and of all other thick provides the complain of the great Scarcity of Provisions in those Party, and of all other thick provides the contents. those Parts, and of all other things necessary for the Subfiftence of the Troops. The Malecontents, when they retired from those Mountains, carried away with them, or destroyed, all the Tools and Instruments necessary for working in the Mines; but Care is taken to provide all proper Materials, and to fet Miners at work, in order to reap the Fruits of this Conquest. The chief Nobility of those mountainous Parts, who are imployed by the Malecontents in Civil or Military Trusts, retired with Prince Ragorzi and Count Berezeni, abandoning their Estates; but a great many of the Gentlemen who are Inhabitants of that Country, have submitted themselves to the Emperor. Baron Tige, who was marching with Recruits to the Troops in Transilvania, is obliged to stop on the Frontiers of Sclavonia, Count Caroli having fecured the Passes into Transilvania with a Body of nine thousand Men. As the Imperialifts have recovered the Mountains of Upper Hungary, so the Malecontents have again made themselves Masters of the Mountains in Transilvania.

Berne, December 8. N. S. The Letters from Milan of the 1st Instant, fay, the Emperor had confirmed to the City of Bolonia its ancient Government and Privileges, granted to them by Charles the 5th; so that the Legat and Vice-Legat are excluded from having any part in the new States that the Imperialists have put Garrisons in Ravenna, Rimini, Imola and Faenza, and were marching towards Pesaro, Fano and Senigalia. Those from Genoa advise, that our Fleet had reduced Porto-Longone in the Absence of the Governor, who was gone to attack Orbitello. The Governor having failed in that Design, and being cut off from Porto-Longone by the English Squadron, was obliged to retire to Civita Vecchia, with two Gallies belonging to the Squadron commanded by the Duke of Turs. The great Snows have hindered the Couriers of Geneva and Italy from arriving here to Day.

Berlin, December 15. N. S. The Town of Cologn not having yet given the King Satisfaction for the Aff out offered, some time ago, to his Resident at that Place, his Majesty hath sent Orders to inquire into the Revenues of all the Cloysters and Convents belonging to the Roman Catholicks in his Dominions, and hath already begun to oblige those at Halberstadt to pay him the fourth part of their whole Income; which Demand will be probably made upon all other religious Houses of the Roman Catholick Persuasion within his Majesty's Territories, unless he receives an immediate Reparation of the Injury done to his Minister. Monsieur Umruth, who brought a Letter of Congratulation from King Stanislaus, appears at Court as a Gentleman of that King's Bed-chamber, and not as an Envoy. This Week the Opera and the Masquerade were both performed with great Magnificence. Letters from Wilda, of the 2d Instant, say, that the Czar had entred Smolensko in Triumph. 3000 Swedish Czar had entred Smolensko in Triumph. 3000 Swedin Prisoners, 84 Colours, with the Artillery and Ammuni-tion taken from the Swedes commanded by General Lewenhaupt, marching before him. The Palatine of Smo-lensko harangued the Czar at the Gate of the City. Those Letters add, that his Czarish Majesty had afterwards marched towards the Ukraine, in order to oppose the marched towards the Ukraine, in order to oppose the Swedes; and that Prince Repnin had forbid the Inhabitants to pay any Contributions to the Swedish Forces. They write from Lithuania, that King Stanislaus had sent Monsieur Jerusalki to the Palatine of Beltz, to treat of an Accommodation with him.

From the Camp at Meerlebeck, December 20, N. S. The Troops having taken the feveral Posts appointed for them, as well for blocking up, as for attacking Ghent, his Grace the Duke of Marlborough came this Day from Melle to Meerlebeck. Prince Eugene went on Tuesday to Brussels, whence he is expected back to Morrow, and designs to continue seme Days with his Grace. The Cannon and Ammunition which came up the Schelde from Holland, are unloading at Melle, and that from Meninbelow Deinse; and Ways are now making to draw them forward to the Batteries, as soon as every thing can be ready for it. The Commissaries, for the Exchange of Prisoners are now assembled at Lense, in order to put the Articleslately agreed on in Execution; in pursuance whereof such of our Men as were Prisoners at Tournay are already sent back.
