Falmouth, April 11.

O enemy hath disturbed our Coasts, till of late, from St. Ives we are advised, that on Thursday, Friday, and Saturday last, a French Sloop of about four Guns, came and rode very near under the Land, infomuch, as they provoked some Country people thereabouts, to get together, who with what Muskets they had, made some shor at them; which though an inconsiderable opposition, beat the Sloop from her station, and so she made

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Plymouth, April 13. Two days fince, the Dartmouth and Little Gift convoyed hither from the Coast of Ireland, three Ships of London bound home; one laden with Sack and Fruit from Malaga, another from Bilbox, the third with Sugars from the Barbadoes: The Convoys are gone into the Sound. We are told, that three or four French Privateers have of late elied about the Lands end, and have taken some small Vessels; But the Fregats taking the Sea again, will no doubt clear our Coaits.

Portsmouth, Apr. 14. On Thursday last the Glocester sailed for the Downs, well fitted and manned, to joyn with the Fleet. The same day came in hither four Vessels laden with Pipestaves from Hamburgh, for the use of the Navy, Three of them being Hamburghers, and one Swede: They tell us, that the Swedes lend a very ready affistance to our Merchants in the Elve, by putting Soldiers aboard them, which makes the Durch Men of War keep their distance, and the Hamburgh Skippers report, that the Swedes declare the English shall not fuffer any damage in the River to long as they have any power to defend them.

Madrid, March 13. We have received advice here, That His Excellency the Earl of Sandwich is arrived at the Groyne, in Gallicia, till whose coming to the Court, nothing certain can be known of the affairs in agitation: That the Portugal army is already in the field, and upon their march towards Alcantara, which place (it is thought) they have a defign to beliege. That Sir Feremy Smith remains in the Narrow off of Cadiz with his Fleet, commanding perfectly the Passage in and out of the Streights.

Genouz, April 7. Monsieur Poll is said to be parted from Thoulon with fifteen fayl of Men of War, and fourteen Gallies for Tunis, his greatest business is thought to be to redeem some French Captives, for which purpole he carries money Monsieur de Beaufort is to expect his return at Thoulan, but indeed cannot ftir for want of Seamen, which they hope Monsieur Poll will redeem for him. A Vessel arrived at Legorn reports, that the Marquels Villa hath taken Candia Nuova; which is too important to be so easily believed, and therefore we must expect a further confirmation.

Paris, April 20. The Count de le Feuillade, is to be fent specially to Bayonne, but his business not known.

On Friday last the Sieur dei Camp, having been, as we told you, condemned for Coyning, was beheaded at the Croix du Tirvir: his Execution occasioned the death of many of his spectators of both sexes, by the insolence of the Archeis the City Guard, who made to great disorder, that many persons, and some hories were troden to death, several Coaches broken, and a great number of people carried off hurt, with Swords and Mulquetoons.

The Chancellor who had very great kindness for the Sieur dei Camp, endeavou ed what was possible to fave his life, but could not incline the King to pardon him: upon the depolitions taken, the King has lent into Lower Normandy to seize several other Coyners, whereof he is informed, there are many in that Country, especially amongst the Gentry, who (it is said) first drewdel Camp into the

Madamoiselle d'Aumsle, the surure Queen of Portugal, taking her leave of the Queen, was entertained only in her present quality, as a Lady of Honor: she intended to begin her journey presently after Easter, but is now put off for 15 daies longer. The Marquis de Carossi with several persons of Quality are designed to attend her; amongst the rest, Monsieur Verjus formerly Secretary to Cardinal de Renz. who is to be with her in the same employment: she likewife takes with her 12 Capuchins, much defiring to Establish that Order in Portugal: but the Envoye who is by Commission to Espouse her, is not to perform that Ceremony, till she arrive in some part of that Country: Monsieur de Chaulnes journey as Ambassador to Rome is deserred, till the Pope agrees, and affents to some pretentions of his most Christian Majesty.

Madam de Turenne dyed the 13th Instant of a Dropsy, and the Duke de la Force her Father, lies dangerously ill, with an hurt in his Head, by the overturning of his Coach, in his journey from Normandy to this place, whither he was

coming to visit his Daughter.

The Abbot of Coastin has at the last received his Bulls, for the Bishoprick of Orleans, which the facred Colledge has freely conferred on him upon the desire of Cardinal de Retz, who informed them that he was an Officer of the Kings House.

The Marquis de Guitry is returned out of Turkey, and is not heard to extell much his and our Ambassadors treatment at Constantinople.

Letters from Rome tell us, that the Cardinal urfin is every day expected, and that an Apartement is appointed him in the Palace Farnese, where he is to continue so long as he shall exercise the charge of Protector of the Assaires of Porsugal. He carries it seems, power with him to Treat

with the Pope, about the nomination of Bishops, which His Majesty of Portugal presses afresh for, that he may fill up the vacancies in his Kingdom. The King at his parting hence, is said to have presented him with a Cross of Diamonds, valued at Twenty thousand Crowns.

Cleve, April 16. It is whispered here, That the Tresty with the Bishop is wholly off. The great point insisted on by Van Beuninghen, in the Treaty of Accommodation was, That the Bishop should forthwith disarm all but 1 400 Men, and quit Borclo, at least, as to the propriety and possession, though they be willing to allow him the Soveraignty and Dominion of it.

To the first, the Deputies of the Neighbor Princes, who are not sewer then forty in number, generally excepted, and said, That they might not prescribe to a free Prince what force he should entertain; besides they knew not; but the forces disbanded might sall into worse hands. And therefore they disagreed wholly to that point, and in the other they were not very forward.

Hague, April 16. The Dukes of Lunenburgh have written a very peremptory Letter to the States, complaining of the delay of the two Moneths pay for their forces, and preffing for a speedy and punctual compliance with the Treaty of Sac-

corsin that point.

The States have ordered four Regiments to Rammekins, two to Helvoet-Slaye, and forty Companies of Foot, and twenty Troops of Horse to Guard the Maritine Coasts. Their Ambassador at Madrid hath made very high complaints against the Marquets ac Castel Rodrigo, and befides, bath Printed the States Letter concerning him, with a Memorial of his own given to the Queen, with an account how things have gone upon the Frontiers, by the Marquets his giving passage to the Bishops men, reckoning up the several spells and tobberies committed by Soldiers that went under the name of the Bishops men; and in the conclusion threatning, that unless fatisfaction were given, they should be obliged to take it.

Stadt, April 1. Upon a complaint made to the Felt Here Wrangle, that the two Holland Fregats which lay before Gluckstadt had searched an Hamburgh Bottom coming up the Elve for English Passengers; He is resolved in person to pass to Gluckstadt, to expositulate the business, offering for the tecurity of the English Merchants, if it be necessary, to thow up a work upon the Bank of the River, and to plant it with Cannon, to defend them from the attempts, either of Hollanders or Dancs.

Rome, March 21. The first Sunday in Lent his Holine's attended by the Sacred Colledge, came to the Chappel at the Quirinal, where he heard a Sermon. The same day the Sieur Gio. Baptista Sada, Eishop of Cavaillon was confectuted in the Church of St. Lorengo and Damaso, by the Cordinal Francis Barberin, who had for his assistants, the Bishops of Larini and Vaison.

The fifteenth his Holiness held a Consistory in the same Palace; where likewise, he performed the Ceremony of Opening the Mouths of the new Cardinals, to whom he gave their several Titles; to wit, to Cardinal Corfini, that of St. Nercus and Achilles; to Cardinal Paluzzi, that of St. Eusebius; to Cardinal Rasponi, that of St. Folm de la Porta Latina; to Cardinal Nini, that of Santa Maria de la Pace; and to Cardinal Conti, that of Santa Maria In Transpontina. To which last Cardinal, he hath given the Archbishoprick of Ancona, of 5000 Crowns per annum; to Cardinal Paluzzi, the Bishoprick of Montisascone, of 6000 Crowns per annum; and to the other Carcinals, Benefices of equal value.

Heidleburgh, April 7. We continue still treating with those of Mentz, having an eye to what is doing at Worms in the point of Arbitration, not willing to precipitate Matters. It is talked, as if France (who is concerned in the Arbitrement) had already named Mensieur de la Barde, and another ancient person well-versed in assairs of that nature; and that the King of Swedeland had nominated Monsieur Mevius, a very eminent person, to meet and determine something in relation to this business of Weldsang now in question among us.

Hamburgh, March 31. Count Coning Smark having ma-

nifested his high respects to Fieldt Here Urangle, and several other Persons of great Quality at Gottenburg, was preparing for his journey into France, where he is to be received as Ambassador Extraordinary, but is unexpectedly slope for some time by an accident which befol his brother, who had the ill luck to put his leg out of joynt.

Paris, April 23. There came lately forthern Order from the Council Above, which gives power to the respective Intendants of Provinces, to enquite into all Parents and Titles of Nobility, enjoyning them to lend up Copies hither of all such as admit of any dispute, that Order may be taken for proceeding with them according to Justice: Upon which, the Court of Ayds pretending that this Commission Entrenches upon their Jurisdiction, have made their Remonstrances to the King about it.

Dover, April 11. We are told, that a Shallop from Dunkirk with forty Men, and four Gaus, feiled open the Pacquer-Bort, in its pallage from Nemport, the eighth inflant, plundering the Paffengers, and taking away fome Letters.

Pool, April 14. Yesterday we discovere a sleet of ships bound, as we judge them, for the West and East-Indies, sayling by, under the Convey of several of His Majesties ships, the wind at N. N. East.

Downs, April 15. The Fountain Freque, Captain Legate Commander, crusing upon the Coast of France on Tresday last, perceived amonest several small Vessels, one French ship which he chased at shore, all her sayls stancing 5 asserwances upon the same Coast, he discovered a billander deeply laden, which he chased also on there; the French Hosse and Food appearing in their defence upon the Land, but could not secure either of them from a weak. He again couling met a Vessel belonging to Newfort, which come from St. Martins, which he tearched, and found only two English Scamen aboard which had been prisoners in France, who complete much of their severe usage, their allowance to the English prisoners being burton Deniets a day, very linke above three of our Farthings.

Yesterday he met with three sail mote, one a pretended Swede, and two Lubechers; one of the Lubechers empty and bound for Rockel, the other leden with Pipe staves for London, as the Matter would have perswared him, which he brought into the Downs.

Groyne, March 11. We have lately built lere a small nimble Vessel, with Sayls and Ones, for expedition, and for the tiyal of het; yesterdry we a howeved a sayl which we supposed a Dunkirker off the Fort; towards whom this new Vessel was immediately employed with eighteen Fire-locks, and about twenty Scamen; without either Compass, Bread, Drink, or any other accellany 5 she gain'd ground very much, and before she get out of our sight, was very near the Vessel she pushed : The Young Lyon which hay near the Fort, sayled after them: what their success was, we know not, but this morning we saw them with several other Vessels at an Anchor.

Portsmouth, April 17. Yesterdry came in histera French Vessel with Linner Cloth from Morlain, with a pass for his security. God be presided the Insection doth not Encicate in this place, none having ayed of late.

Britchal, April 18. Yesterday Sir Gillert Talbos, His Majesties Envoyé Exmaordinary to the King of Fermark arrived here, and was graciously received by His Majesty, having, as you have formerly heard, been transported from the Elve in a Swedista Man of Way, which Green Wrangle would need some lemont him with, for the greater convenience and security of his Passege.
