Esterday Morning 30 Battalions and 40 Squadrons were ranged along the Causey, from the ontward Barrier of the Brussels Gate, to receive the French Garrison; about 102-Clock they be-General Officers at their Head, who faluted the Duke of Marlborough and Prince Eugene, as did likewise all the Mariborough and rrince Eugene, as and likewise all the Troops, which being very numerous, it was near feven at Night before they had all passed by. Monsieur de la Motte and the Baron de Capres were on Horseback with Motte and the Baron de Capres were on Horieback with his Grace and Prince Eugene the whole time, and then followed their Troops to Gavre in their way to Tournay, between nine and ten at Night. His Grace, after Supping with Prince Eugene, came into Townincognito; and gowith Prince Eugene, came into Townincognito; and gowith Morning to view our Attacks and the Outworks, at his return at Noon he was received at his entring the Green of St. Liven by the Magistrates, who, after making Gate of St. Liven by the Magistrates, who, after making their Compliment on this Occasion, presented his Grace with the Keys of the Town in a gilded Bason, which he returned, and was conducted by them through a Lane of the Burghers under Arms to the Town-house, where a splendid Entertainment was prepared for his Grace, the Generals, and other chief Officers of the Army. In the Evening there was an Illumination on the Tower of the Town-house, which is a Ceremony that has not been obferved for many Years past. The Burghers by their loud Acclamations express d their great Satisfaction at the Re-Acciamations expreis a their great Satisfaction at the Reduction of the Town, which was not a little augmented by the Enemies evacuating of Bruges, the Magiltrates of which Place came hither yelterday in the Evening, to acquaint his Grace that the French Garrison marched out in the Night, and to make their Salmission. The Camping being that heaviles and learns Consulting paign being thus brought to a happy Conclusion, most of the Troops begin their March to morrow towards their respective Garrisons. Prince Eugene went this Morning for Beautiful States. for Bruffels, where his Grace will join him to morrow, and the beginning of the next Week they defign to go together to the Hague, to concert with the States, before his Highness returns to Vienna, whither he will be going

Hague, Fanuary 4. N. S. The Recruits designed for the Palatine Troops in Catalonia are on their March from Grave, in order to go on Board the Squadron defigned for the Mediterranean, which lyes in the Texel. General Friesheim has orders to conduct them thither. The Mar-Friesheim has orders to conduct them thither. The Mar-shal de Boufflers is returned into Flanders, to secure the Frontier Places. Letters from Italy say, that the Accom-modation between the Courts of Vienna and Rome is not fo far advanced as has been reported. General Zumjungen, who was fent to Rome by General Thaun, is returned to the Army, much displeased with the Success of his Mesfage. It is faid the Germans intend to March very fuddenly to Rome; and that they are already passed Rimini. The Pope's Troops are at Peruggia, but plunder the Counwrite from Leipzig, that King Augustus arrived there on the 23d of the last Month; and that his Majesty designed the next Day to go to Dresden. Advices from Poland for that Canada Marchan Last Canada Marcha say, that General Mazeppa had formed a design to carry over to the Swedish Army the whole Bedy of Cossacks; but was not followed by above 1000 Men: The Chief of which number are returned to the Mulcovites. Letters add, that Prince Menzikoff, fince the Revolt of General Mazeppa, had feized the Town of Baturin, which was the Place of that General's Residence. Monsieur Skoropatsky is chosen in his stead General of the Cosfacks. The King of Sweden has entrenched his Army

between Starodub and Czernikow; and it is faid the Czar waits on the other fide of the Defna, 'till that River is frozen, in order to march over it, and attack the Swedes in their Camp. On the 2d Infant Monfieur Vicertman arrived here with the Capitulation of Ghent, which is in Substance as follows:

I. THAT the Roman Catholick Religion shall be preferved in its full and free Exercite, without Innonovation. Granted.

II. That the present Capitulation shall affect only the two Crowns; and that the Clergy and Mag stracy of Ghent shall distinctly treat for themselves. Granted.

III. That a Gate of the faid Town shall be d I vered to the Troops of the Allies on the 31st of this Instant December, at ten in the Morning; unless between this and that Day the Town shall be relieved. The Gate to be then delivered, shall be the Gate at the Attack of St. Pierre; as also the Port of Succeurs of the Citadel; at which shall be posted some Troops of the present Garrison, separated from those of the Allies by Barriers, in the middle of the Arch, under those Gates, in order to prevent the mixture of the Troops, and the Disorder which may probably happen thereupon. Granted.

IV. That all Perfons in the Service of the two Crowns, of what Charaster or Condition soever, without Exception, whether named or not in this Capitulation, shall go out of this Town on the second of January, 1709, at nine of the Clock in the Morning, at the Gate of Courtray, with Arms, Equipage, Drums beating, Ball in Mouth, Match lighted on both Ends, with Ammunition for 20 Charges, Colours slying, and 10 pieces of Cannon lately, brought from France; four Patterero's, with their Carriages, and Ammunition for 12 Charges of each Piece, for Tournay, by the nearest Way, in four or sive Days, marching or halting at the Choice of the Besieged, without being obliged, on any Pretence whatsoever, to a quicker March than the Besieged shall approve of, with regard to the Scason, and the Roads; and that the Besiegers shall allow them a sufficient Convoy, for the Safety both of the Garrison and their Equipage. Granted, except that there shall be allowed but 12 Charges for the Garrison, and six Pieces of the Cannon lately come from France, with Ammunition for 12 Charges.

V. That for the Transportation of the said 10 Pieces of Cannon, Patterero's, Ammunition and Equipage, as well as of the Sick and Wounded to Tournay, the Allies shall are of the Sick and Wounded to Tournay, the Allies shall be roused a sufficient number of Boats and Boatmen: To which Boats there shall be a sufficient Guard allowed by the Allies, for the safety of the Sick. In case the River Schelde shall not be Navigable, a sufficient number of Land Carriages shall be ready on the 31st Instant, that the Besieged may have time to lead the said Carriages, so as to march out with the whole Garrison, and arrive at Tournay at the same time. Granted for the Arullery mentional in the precedent Article, as also for the Equipage, at the Charge of the Besieged, and as for a sufficient number of Boats, the Besieged may immediately have enough of them in the Town of Ghent.

VI. That the Sick and Wounded, who are in the Town and Castle of Ghent, and shall be in a condition to bear being removed, shall be furnished in the same manner with Boats, Boatmen and Carriages, sufficient to convey them to Tournay by the nearest way, at the Expence of the Allies. Granted at the Expence of the Besieged.

VII. That the Sick and Wounded who cannot be revented at the time of the reach of the Transaction shall be

That the Sick and Wounded who cannot be removed at the time of the march of the Troops, shall be allowed to remain in Ghen; and be supply'd with proper allowed to remain and Medicine, at the Charge of the Allies, Food, Lodging and Medicine, at the Charge of the Allies, according to the manner in which they are taken care of according to the manner in which they are taken care of

in the Hospitals of his Most Christian Majesty. And when they shall be able to bear Travelling. Boats with Paiiports shall be provided for them, in order to their being transported to Tournay by the nearest Way. in the same manner with the Precedent Article. Granted

VIII. That no Effects, Papers or Equipage belonging to any Perfons what loever employed in the Service of the two Kings, shall be seized on any pretence whatsoever; but that on the contrary, sufficient Carriages shall be provided for the Essets and Families of such Persons, at the Charge of the Allies, to transport them to Tournay by the nearest way. Provided, that the Sieur de Bonnot, Commissary of War, and the Sieur de Messely, Pay-master of the Troops of his Most Christian Majesty, shall remain in Ghent as Holleges for the payment of all Debts justly contracted, during the Siege, for the Service of the two Kings, till those Debts are wholly discharged. Granted, Provided that the same Hostages shall be responsible for all Debts contracted fince the French have had the Possession of

IX. That the Allies shall surply the Besieged with ten covered Waggons, which shall march out at the same time with the Carrison, without being examined upon any Pretence whatsoever. Granted, for 6 covered Waggons.

X. That there shall be no Satisfaction expected.

XIV. That the Garrison shall carry out of Ghent Forage and necessary Provisions sufficient for their Subsi-

stance for five Days. Granted.

XV. That the Hostages, on each side, for the Execution of this Capiculation, shall be fet at Liberty as soon as these Articles are performed, and the Garrison is arrived

at Tournay. Granul.

XVI. That all the Women. Children, and Families of any belonging to the Troops of the two Crowns, shall be petmitted to retire to Tournay with their Effects. Granted, at their own Charge.

XVII. All the Inhabitants of Ghent fhall have Liberty to retire with their Effects into the Dominions of the two owns. Granted, provided they go within three Months. XVIII. That the Allies shall allow the Wives of the Crowns.

Soldiers, who are in the Town, fix Months time to re-tire of it; and after the Expiration of that Term, to go to fuch Places in the Territories of the two Crowns as they shall think fit. Granted as in the foregoing Artir.e.

The Besiegers shall send Commissaries to Morrow, the 31st, into the Town of Ghent, to whom all Keys of Stores of Pro-Tylins and Ammunition, as well as exact Accounts of Forage, fouil be faithfully delivered under necessary Guards, suat nothing may be lost. Granted.
