It is generally believed in this Place, that the Courts of Vienna and Rome are come to an Accommodation. The particulars of which Treaty, 'tis said, will be published, as soon as Monsieur Piazza is returned to Rome from Vienna. That Minister is reported to have been sent to the Imperial Court, only to obtain an alteration of some Circumstances in the Emperor's Demand, the Substance of which was comply'd with by the Court of Rome before he was dispatched thither. The Duke of Lorraine, and the Duke of Guastalla, having both Pretensions to the Dutchy of Mantua, it is expected there will arise very great Difficulties in settling that Succession; and that the present conjuncture of Affairs will make the Emperor slow in declaring himself on that subject. The Duke of Escalona, late Viceroy of Naples, having attempted to escape from the Castle of Picighione, where he is a Prisoner of War, and has been treated with all the respect due to his Quality, with regard to his present Condition, Deputies are sent from hence to look into that Affair, and examine what Persons have been allowed to visit him since his Imprisonment. These Commissioners have also an Authority to make his Confinement more strict, open his Letters, and seize such Persons as they shall have reason to suspect for a Correspondence with him. Letters from Leghorn say, that the Fleet of the Allies set Sail on the 8th Instant for Catalonia, Sir Edward Whitaker having disembarked a great quantity of Provisions which he had received on Board, in order to be transported to Naples. We hear from Turin, that the 16 Squadrons and 6 Battalions which the French have detached from the Frontiers of Piedmont towards Flanders, are not thought sufficient; but that the Enemy have ordered another great Body of Troops to be in a readiness for marching the same way. The great quantity of Snow which has lately fallen, has made all passages into their Country, at present, impracticable. These Letters add, that his Royal Highness has drawn out a great Train of Artillery, which were to be fired for several Rounds on the Day appointed for publick Rejoicings for the Victories and Successes of the Allies this last Campaign in Flanders.

Copenhagen, December 29. N. S. On the 27th Instant a Courier passed by this place from Stockholm, with an Account, that the Dutchess Dowager of Holstein, Sister to his Swedish Majesty, departed this Life at Stockholm on the 22^d Instant. This Melancholy News he was dispatched with to the Court of Holstein-Gottorp. The Dutchess was so diligent in her Care of the young Duke, her Son, whom she constantly attended during his late Sickness of the Small Pox, that she her self was seized with, and died of that Distemper. The Swedish Envoy has desired an Audience of the Queen Consort, to notify the Death of this Princess, and an Envoy Extraordinary is suddenly expected from the Court of Gottorp on the same Occasion.

Falmouth, January 6. On the 4th put in here the Yuffrow Anna, of and for Rotterdam, from Namz, Jo. Groun Master. Yesterday came in her Majesty's Ships the Leopard and Fan her, with the Rochester from In-

dia that was forced into Foway, as well as the Falmouth Gally of and for this Place from Virginia, with one Transport and a Coaster. The Yuffow Anna is sailed, and this Day went out a Dogger, which came lately from Lisbon.

Bristol, January 8. This Day came in the Pelican of this Port, Edward Bird Commander, from Leghorn, who brought home with him the Commander of the Rain Galley of this Port, who was taken by five French Men of War off of Cape de Gatt, and carried into Carthage. Last Night came in l'Heureuse, a Prize, taken on the Banks of Newfoundland by the Mermaid of this Port. This Day came in the Blehaim Galley of this Port, George Butrico Master, from Alicant, but left from Coome.

Portsmouth, January 9. On Thursday last six Dutch Men of War arrived at Spithead. The same Day her Majesty's Ship Seafair sailed from thence to cruise. Yesterday seven Dutch Men of War arrived at Spithead, with about 60 Sail of English and Dutch Merchantmen under their Convoy from the Eastward. There are now there seven English Men of War, and seventeen Dutch.

Bristol, January 10. Yesterday came in the Betty Gally of this Port, Jo. Osburn Commander, from Majorca; but left, in 21 Days, from Gibraltar. This Day sailed the Uniona Frigot, Mathew Thomas Commander, for Jamaica; and the Freake Galley, John Cary Master, for Gibraltar.

Yarmouth, January 10. On the 8th came into our Road two of her Majesty's Ships from the Southward; and yesterday passed through divers Coasters to the Northward.

Deal, January 10. Yesterday came in the Prince George from Leghorn. Here are her Majesty's Ships the Nottingham, Saphir and Newport.
