IN Pursuance of Her Majesty's Pleasure signified unto the Council, It is this Day Ordered by their Lordships, That in *The Form of Prayer with Thanksgiving to Almighty God, to be Used in all Churches and Chapels within this Realm, every Year upon the Eighth Day of March, (being the Day on which Her Majesty began Her Happy Reign)* In the Prayer at the Communion-Service, immediately before the Reading of the Epistle, for the Queen as Supreme Governor of this Church, these Words following be left out, *And that these Blessings may be continued to After-ages, make the Queen, we pray thee, an happy Mother of Children, who being Educated in thy true Faith and Fear, may happily succeed Her in the Government of these Kingdoms.* And it is further Ordered by their Lordships in Council, That no Edition of the Book of Common Prayer, with the above-mentioned Form of Prayer and Thanksgiving, be from henceforth Printed, but with this Amendment; and that in the mean time, till Copies of such Edition may be had, all Parsons, Vicars, and Curates within this Realm, do (for the preventing of Mistakes) with the Pen Correct and Amend that Prayer in their Church-Books, according to the foregoing Direction, and for the better Notice hereof, that this Order be forthwith Printed and Published, and sent to the several Parishes; and that the Right Reverend the Bishops take Care that Obedience be paid to the same accordingly within their respective Dioceses.

Espremos, December 27. N. S. After the Marquis de Bay had received several Orders to detach a considerable Body of Troops from the Frontiers towards Catalonia, and a positive Command was sent to him to follow his Instructions without further Delay; he went himself to Court, and desired Leave to lay down his Commission, if any part of the Forces were to be drawn out of his Province: Upon which, it is said, he has prevailed that the French and Irish shall have their Winter-Quarters in Old Castile, in Pigneranda, Alva, Medina, and Arevallos; and that the Detachment of Spanish Horse and Foot shall immediately halt in the Mancha.

Vienna, January 16. N. S. Since the Protonotary Tolvay returned from Hungary, several Conferences have been held here, to consider of the Conditions proposed by the Hungarians for a Cessation of Arms, and to settle the Limits for the Troops of both Parties, on this and the other side of the Danube. While the Councils here are taken up with the thoughts of Peace, Marshal Heister continues to extend his Conquests in Upper Hungary, as far as he can. And in order to reinforce the Imperial Army in Hungary next Campaign, the Court has been

treating with Prince Lubomirski for a Body of 2000 Men, which he offers to raise for the Emperor's Service, in the Lands which he has in the County of Cepusium, or Zips, bordering on Poland. This County is a part of the Kingdom of Hungary, but one half of it, with about 14 Castles and small Towns, was mortgaged to the Crown of Poland by the Emperor Sigismund, in the Year 1434, and Prince Lubomirski having purchased the Mortgage from the Crown of Poland, is now in Possession of that part of the County; the other half remaining still under the Jurisdiction of the Crown of Hungary. The Emperor has named Count Kuffstein, to carry his Compliments of Condolance to her Majesty of Great Britain, upon the Death of his Royal Highness Prince George of Denmark.

Berlin, January 19. N. S. Yesterday being the Anniversary of the King's Coronation, was observed with the usual Ceremonies; all the foreign Ministers, the Ministers of State, and the several Colleges, congratulated his Majesty upon that Occasion; the Court having put off their Mourning for two Days, appeared in great Magnificence. The Te Deum was sung in the King's Chapel; during which, all the Cannon were thrice discharged round the Town: And this Day the usual Solemnities were performed upon the Installation of three Knights of the Prussian Order. The Persons who received that Honour were the Duke of Holstein-Beck General of the Prussian Horse, Count Walrade the Great Bailiff of Prussia, and Count Dohna Lieutenant-General. After the Ceremonies of the Installation in the Chappel, the King, and all the Knights of the Order, dined in the Great Hall. The Prince of Anhalt-Dessau, who is of the Order, came hither two days ago, to assist at this Ceremony, and designs to return to Dessau next Week. The Margrave Philip and his Lady leave this Place on Monday next. The Deputies of the several Provinces, which came hither upon the King's Marriage, are likewise preparing to return to their respective Places of Abode. The frequent Returns of the King's Indisposition have occasioned his Majesty's Resolution of going to Carlsbad this next Summer. Yesterday passed through this Town an Aid-de-Camp of Prince Mensicoff, in his Return from Leipsick, who reports that the Muscovites have gained a second Advantage over the King of Sweden's Army. They write from Wilda, of the 6th Instant, that the Swedes demanded vast Contributions from the Neighbouring Palatinates; his Swedish Majesty was encamped with General Mazepa at Knotopa, and that they were preparing to attack the Muscovites.

Hague, January 29. N. S. The States General are in daily consultation upon the proper Methods to open the next Campaign with greater Forces in the Field than they had the last Year. Part of the blue Guards of Horse marched in here on the 26th; and the Troop of Guards the next Day, with all the Colours and Standards taken from the Enemy. Two Battalions of the blue Foot Guards are expected here, and at Delft, this Night. The Troop of Saxe Heilbourg, which lay here, has orders to March to Breda, and remain there till further Orders. Count Wackerbart, General of King Augustus's Forces, has left this Place, in order to return to Dresden by the way of Hanover. They write from Cologne, that the Difference between his Prussian Majesty and the Magistracy of that Place, is brought to an amicable Conclusion. The City obliges it felt to repair the House of the Prussian Minister which was damaged by the Tumult, and will send a Deputation to Berlin, to represent to the King of Prussia their Innocence of what was committed against his Minister. The Resident thinks fit to make use of the Protestant Church which is allowed there in favour of such
