St. James's, January 23.

THIS Day Signior Cornaro, Ambassador in Ordinary from the Republick of Venice, had a private Audience of Her Majesty, to Condole the Death of his Royal Highness the Prince, and presented a Letter on that Occasion from the Senate; being introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl of Sunderland, Principal Secretary of State, and Conducted thereto by Sir Charles Cottrell, Master of the Ceremonies.

Don Louis d'Acunha, Envoy-Extraordinary from the King of Portugal, being introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl of Sunderland, Principal Secretary of State, and Conducted by Sir Charles Cottrell, Master of the Ceremonies, had also a private Audience of her Majesty, to Condole the Death of his Royal Highness the Prince, from the King his Master, who, as soon as he received the Notification, retired for 4 Days from Publick Business, and directed his Mourning to be as for a King of Great Britain.

St. James's, January 25. The three following Addresses have been presented to Her Majesty by his Excellency the Right Honourable the Earl of Wharton, Lord-Lieutenant of Ireland.

To the QUEEN's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Protestant Dissenters in the City of Dublin, and South of Ireland.

May it please your Majesty,

THE tender Regard which your Majesty has always expressed for the Welfare of your People lays us under the highest Obligations to Condole with your Majesty on so mournful an Occasion, as the Decease of his late Royal Highness Prince George of Denmark, a Prince whose illustrious Virtues will be ever remembered with all due Veneration.

We earnestly pray, That the Divine Consolations may be a firm Support to your Royal Mind, under so deep an Affliction; and that your invaluable Life may be long preserved for the happy Settlement of your own Dominions, and the Security of all Europe.

We esteem our selves highly indebted to your Majesty's great Goodness, that in the midst of your just Grief you intermit not your affectionate Care for the good of your Kingdom: and particularly this, for the Government whereof you have appointed a Person of such Consummate Abilities, and distinguishing Merit.

And with great Satisfaction we Congratulate your Majesty on the continued surprizing Progress of your Victorious Arm. Your brave Troops, with those of your Allies, under the Command of his Grace the Duke of Marlborough, have, by their many repeated Conquests, struck such a Terror into your Enemies, that they dare no longer look 'em in the Face upon equal Terms; but have tamely stood by, while they have seen one of their strongest and most important Fortresses fall into the Hands of the Confederates, and have shamefully fled before 'em from their own Intrenchments; Your Fleet with the like Courage have secured to themselves one of the best Harbours and Forts in the Mediterranean Sea, and thereby rendered your Naval Power formidable to all Italy. In the midst of these astonishing Successes Abroad, you Reign in the Hearts of all your Protestant Subjects at Home, and inspire even your Publick Councils themselves with such a Spirit of Unanimity and Vigour, as gives the fairest Prospect of seeing this expensive War brought to an honourable and happy Conclusion.

We cannot but esteem these distinguishing Favours of Divine Providence, as the Reward of your exemplary Piety and Moderation, your just and gracious Government, and

the truly charitable Care you extend to the Foreign Reformed Churches, even those in the more distant parts of Europe.

And that Almighty God may yet Honour your Majesty by making you the successful Instrument of asserting the Liberties of Europe, restoring and enlarging the Protestant Interest Abroad, and uniting all your Protestant Subjects at Home in Affection and Interest, that all of 'em may express as dutiful a Zeal for your Service, as you do a sincere Desire to make 'em every way happy; and that after all the unparalleled Glories of a prosperous Reign, you may late inherit an un fading and immortal Crown, are the most ardent and constant Wishes of, may it please your Majesty, your Majesty's most dutiful and obedient Subjects and Servants.

To the QUEEN's most excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Presbyterian Ministers, and those of their Perswasion, in the North of Ireland.

May it please your Majesty,

OUR dutiful Affection to your Majesty both engage us to a feeling and mournful Sense of your great Loss, in the Death of his Royal Highness Prince George of Denmark, and to join our earnest Desires that the God of all Comfort may support your Majesty with the best Blessings of Heaven under your just Grief on this Sorrowful Occasion; which we beg leave to Condole with all the tenderness becoming faithful Subjects. And we can't but with all grateful Acknowledgement observe your Majesty's singular Care of this poor Kingdom in the height of your Affliction, by appointing us a chief Governor of such an established Eminent Character.

Our inviolable Respect to your Sacred Majesty's Person and Government, and Zeal for the Protestant Succession by Law established, do oblige us to Congratulate your Majesty upon the glorious Successes wherewithal it hath pleased God to bless your Majesty's Forces under the Renowned Conduct and Bravery of his Grace the Duke of Marlborough, in conjunction with those of your Allies, particularly in this extraordinary Campaign: And upon the many other surprizing Effects of the Wisdom of your Councils, Power of your Arms, and Royal Care for uniting and strengthening the Protestant Interest by the moderation of your Government, the extensive Influences wherof reach to the Relief of the Reformed even Abroad, whereby the growing Brittishness of your great and auspicious Reign, and the Happiness of your People are daily advanced.

That Almighty God may bless your Majesty with a long and prosperous Reign, make you the happy Instrument of restoring the Peace of Europe, relieving oppressed Protestants, and accomplishing all the other valuable ends of Government, and afterwards Crown you with immortal Glory, is the earnest Prayer of us, who in our own, and in the Name of those we represent, subscribe our selves, may it please your Majesty, your Majesty's most obedient, dutiful and loyal Subjects.

...till such delivery as aforesaid: And if there be more than one concerned in the bringing in any Person to be Listed, and there arise any dispute concerning the Distribution of the aforesaid Allowances, the Majority of the Commissioners then present are to order the Distribution. And for the Encouragement of the Inhabitants of every Parish and Township to aid and assist this Service, and to enable them to provide for the poor Relations of such Persons as shall be so Listed (if any such be) it is Enacted, That any three or more of the said Commissioners, who shall be present at the Listing of any person, shall issue a Warrant in like manner as aforesaid, for paying out of the Land-Tax Money the Sum of 3*l.* to the Church-Wardens and Overseers of the Poor of such Parish and Township for the use of such Parish or Township, for every Man that shall be Raised there; and all such Rewards and Encouragements are to be satisfied by such Receivers or Collectors as aforesaid; to whom such Warrant shall be directed, without any Abatement for Fees, Gratuities, Charges, Postage, or any other pretence whatsoever; and the said Receivers and their Deputies and Collectors, upon Summons given them by the said Commissioners or any three of them, are to give Attendance at the said Meeting for receiving Volunteers or Listing Soldiers as aforesaid, and duly pay the said Rewards and Encouragements; And when any Person shall be so Listed, the Commissioners shall cause the 14th and 23d Articles of War against Mutiny and Desertion to be read to such New-raised Men, and shall forthwith cause an Entry to be made in some Book for this purpose to be prepared, of the Name of the Person so Listed, and of the Parish and Place of his last Abode, and of the Time and Place when and where such New-raised Man is delivered over to the Persons appointed to receive him, and for what Regiment he is so received, and the Names of the persons who receive him, and the Sums for which Warrants shall be issued as aforesaid, and the Names of the Receivers and Collectors to whom such Warrants shall be directed, and Duplicates of such Entries signed by three or more of the Commissioners within 30 Days after delivery of such Listed Man, shall be transmitted to the Office of Secretary at War; and the Pay of such Listed Man is to commence from the time of his being taken and secured. And it is thereby likewise Enacted, That from and after such delivery and reading the said Articles of War, every person so raised shall be deemed as a listed Soldier, and shall be subject to the Discipline of War; but no person so listed or entering himself as a Volunteer upon the said Act, shall be liable to be taken out of her Majesty's Service by any Process other than for some Criminal Matter. And if any Parish or Town-Officer shall be guilty of any wilful neglect or default in the Execution of any Warrant or Order to him directed, he may be Fined for such Offence by any three or more of the said Commissioners, in any Sum not exceeding 10*l.* to be levied by Distress and Sale of the Offender's Goods, the one Moiety of which Fine is to be paid to the Informer, the other to the Church Wardens and Overseers of the Poor, for the use of the Poor of the said Parish where such Offence shall be committed; and every other person who shall wilfully obstruct the Execution of the said Act shall be punished in like manner, and all such Offences shall be inquired of, heard, and finally determined by any two or more of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace dwelling in or near the place where such Offence shall be committed, who have power to Levy the said Penalties upon the Offender's Goods (if he has any,) if he has not sufficient to answer the said Penalties, then to commit him or her to the County Goal or House of Correction for the space of three Months without Bail or Mainprize: But it is thereby provided, That no person who has a Vote in any Election of any Member to serve in Parliament shall be taken and listed for a Soldier, neither shall any Military Officer, other than in the Militia, put in Execution any Power given by the said Act. And it is thereby further Enacted, That from and after the 10th Day of February next ensuing, no private Soldier, who hath Entered himself or been Listed into Her Majesty's Service, shall, during the time such Soldier shall remain in Great Britain, be Discharged without the Consent of the Colonel, or, in his Absence, the Field-Officer commanding in Chief the Regiment, first had and obtained in Writing under their Hands and Seals, in which Writing the Cause of his Discharge shall be expressed; and a Copy of every such Discharge shall be forthwith transmitted to the Secretary at War; and any Officer that shall presume to Discharge any Soldier in any other manner is to be Cashiered;

and every Soldier who under colour or pretence of any Discharge (other than as aforesaid) shall quit the Service, shall be punished as a Deserter; but whatever Soldier shall Enter himself as a Volunteer upon the said Act, and shall continue three Years in Her Majesty's Service, shall be at Liberty, if he thinks fit, to Demand his Discharge from the Colonel of the Regiment to which he shall belong: And in regard it may be necessary for the Commissioners at their first General Meeting to appoint Clerks to attend them at the subsequent Meetings, it is enacted, That the Clerks which shall be so appointed shall be paid by the Pay-Master of the Forces, such Rewards as the Lord High Treasurer, upon Consideration of the List of the Names of the Persons listed, returned by the said Clerks, shall judge they may deserve; and the said Commissioners intrusted with the Execution of the said Act are thereby directed to use their best Endeavours, that the Soldiers they shall receive as Volunteers, or which they shall List for Her Majesty's Land-Forces or Marines, be such as are fit to serve Her Majesty, and are not under the Statute of Five Foot and Five Inches; And every Commissioner within England, Wales, and Berwick upon Tweed, who did not qualify himself to act as a Commissioner for the Land-Tax Act, passed in the Sixth Year of Her Majesty's Reign, is required to take the Oaths appointed to be taken by the Statute of the First of William and Mary, and by the Statute Intituled, An Act for the further Security of His Majesty's Person, and the Succession of the Crown in the Protestant Line, and for extinguishing the Hopes of the pretended Prince of Wales, and all other Pretenders, and their open and secret Abettors, under the Penalty of forfeiting 200*l.* if not so qualified when he shall act. And every Commissioner in Scotland, except such as duly Qualified themselves according to the Laws in Scotland for executing the Land-Tax Act which passed in the said Sixth Year of Her Majesty's Reign, must qualify himself according to the Laws in Scotland for that purpose, under the Penalty of Forfeiting 50*l.* for acting in Scotland not being qualified. And it is thereby further enacted, That in case there be not a sufficient Number of Commissioners in any City, Borough, Town, Port or Place, to put the said Act in Execution, the Commissioners appointed to act in the Counties, Shires and Stewartries at large; may be capable of acting within such Cities, Boroughs, Towns, Ports and Places, as lie within such respective Counties, Shires or Stewartries, or near the same, provided every such Commissioner for Counties and Ridings in Yorkshire, by himself or his Tenants, was Taxed or did Pay in such County or Riding to the value of 100*l.* per Ann. or more of his own Estate; by Vertue of the said Land-Tax Act, passed in the Sixth Year of Her Majesty's Reign; or unless such Person at the time of Execution of the said Act for Recruiting Her Majesty's Forces, by himself, his Tenants, or Trustees, shall enjoy an Estate, of Lands or Hereditaments of the said value of 100*l.* per Ann. within the said County or Riding. But any Person qualified to act as a Commissioner in any part of Great Britain, may act within any City, Borough, Cinque-Port, or Town-Corporate, whereof he shall be an Inhabitant at the time of the Execution of the said Act, and Mayors, Bailiffs and other chief Magistrates of Cities, Boroughs, Towns-Corporate, and Cinque-Ports, for which Commissioners are specially appointed, may act in the said Cities, Boroughs, Towns-Corporate, and Cinque-Ports. And to avoid Inconveniencies, which may happen by pressing Men during Harvest, it is enacted, That from the First of June next until the Fifteenth of October following, all Persons working at Harvest, shall not be Imprest, as being free and exempted therefrom; But Bailiff's Followers and Assistants shall not be deemed exempt from Pressing, upon account of their following such Calling and Employment, as in and by the said Act among other things therein contain'd, may more fully appear. Her Majesty duly considering how necessary it is that the said Act should effectually and speedily be put in Execution, hath thought fit to give as early Notice of the Purposes of the said Act as may be. That all Her Subjects in all Parts of Great Britain may be truly informed of their respective Duties in relation to the Premise; and for that end doth Publish this Her Royal Proclamation (by and with the Advice of Her Privy Council) hereby strictly Charging and Commanding all Officers and Magistrates whatsoever, who are Authorized to put the said Act in Execution, That they use their utmost Diligence to answer the Ends and Designs of the said Act; And she does Enjoy and Require all Her Loving

Whitehall, January 29. Her Majesty having been Graciously pleas'd, upon the arrival of two young Muscovite Princes, to distinguish them as near Relations to his Czars Majesty, by giving order for their being received and entertained at her Charge, and attended by her Officers. The said Princes, to show the grateful Sense they have of her Majesty's particular Favours to them, desired to be admitted to an Audience, to which they were accordingly introduc'd by the Right Honourable Mr. Secretary Boyle, on Sunday the 23d Instant. They each of them made their Compliments to her Majesty in Latin, expressing, with great Respect, the true and humble Sense of Gratitude with which they acknowledged and should always have the Satisfaction to remember the singular Marks of Kindness, which her Majesty was pleas'd abundantly to heap upon them: And at the same time that they Congratulated her Majesty upon the signal Success of her Victorious Arms, they wish'd her a long and prosperous continuation of the same. To which her Majesty made Answer in a most Gracious manner, That she had so much Esteem and Friendship for his Czars Majesty, that she could not but be very well pleas'd to see any so nearly Related to him in her Kingdoms, and have an Opportunity of showing her Kindness and Distinction to them. Her Majesty thanked them for their Congratulations and good Wishes, and was pleas'd to say she would endeavour to make their Stay here as agreeable to them as she could.

Copenhagen, January 22. N. S. A great Fleet of Merchant Ships, which lay for some time in our Road, have contracted with the Officers of his Majesty's Customs

to open their way into the great Basin of this City. The Ice was so very thick that it seem'd at first Impracticable to break a Canal through it for their passage, but a great Progress is made in that Work by the continual Labour of 1100 Men in the space of three Weeks, and it is hop'd that within 14 Days it will be finished, and the Vessels form'd into a Line to pass through into the Basin. The Passage which they have made is above 4 British Miles in Length. The Cold has been so severe that numbers of poor People have been frozen to Death, and several Centinels found dead when the Officers have visit'd the Posts on the Ramparts. The 10th Instant having been the Day appointed for pronouncing a Funeal Oration on the Death of his Royal Highness Prince George, that mournful Office was performed by Monsieur Winding the Greek Professor, by Order of the Rector Magnificus of this University, Prince Charles, the Privy-Councillors, and all the Great Officers of the Court, appear'd in the Audience. Mr. Pulteney, the British Envoy, having received an Invitation in the name of the Rector and the University, was also present. The Gentleman who perform'd this Ceremony receiv'd the Thanks of all Persons of Distinction, for the Justice he has done to the Remains of a Prince so highly esteem'd by the Court, and beloved by the whole People of Denmark.

Frankfort, January 22. N. S. Letters from Ratisbone say, That the Diet had re-assum'd their Debates concerning the present State of War, and have had under Consideration what Troops will be necessary for the ensuing Campaign, in order to proportion their Train of Artillery, and the quantity of other Stores and Provisions to the number of their Forces. It is said, that a Sum of Money will be forthwith sent hither for hiring Troops into the Service of the Empire. The Minister of the Elector of Mayence, Director of the Diet, has laid before them a Proposal for reinforcing the Imperial Army. The several Princes of the Empire are to send in the following Proportions: the Elector of Mayence 2000, Elector of Treves 800, the Elector Palatine and the Upper Palatinate 6000, the City of Cologne 1000, the other part of that Electorate 300, the Circle of Bohemia 3000, the Upper Circle of Saxony 6000, Austria is to bring in 10000, Franconia 9000, the Circle of Suabia 10000, that of the Upper Rhine, including the Quota of the Landgrave of Hesse-Cassel, 6000; Westphalia 10000, the Lower Saxony 10000, and Bavaria 6000.
