Algier, Ian. 9. Rome, Keb. 22. Some days fince Don Augustino Chigi having placed a guard before hishoute in the night to prevent the ferting up of Libels and feandatous Papers ; fome Spanish foldiers pating by, refused to fland or to give a civil answer to she Sentinel, whereupon the Guard fired and killed Three or Four of the Spaniards ; whereupon Don Augustino fent immediately to excute the matter to the Spanish Ambassiador, who was willing to accept of any apology, that he might not by an unteasonable difgust dijoblige the faction of the Chigy, who have no fimall interest in the Conclave.

The Spanish Ambassidor has been lately of the into the Coclave, where he had long confewith the Caroinal de Medicis, and delivered him

with the Caroinal de Medicis, and delivered him fome Letters and dispatches from the Queen Regen, which he recommended to his ferious confideration.

The Count de Pletendorff, Envoye Extraordinary from His Imperial Majefty, has been also there to prefent a Letter directed to the Cardinals the chief of their Order, by which the fm erout laid before them the necessfity of a speedy Election, and the great inconveniencies which might happen by so long continuance of the Conclave.

Rome. March 1. On Tuelday laft in the afternoon, the French Ambaffadour the Duke de Chaulues, went with a numerous trayn of Coaches, with many of the Prelates and Nobility, to an Audience from the Colledg, where by the King his Mafters command, he acquainted them that his Yaid Majeffy, had referred his pretentions in the Neatherlands, to the Arbitration of their Majeffies of Great Brittain, and Swedeland.

The Survier which was seur-by the Conde de Prado, the Portugal Ambassiadour, to give the Prince Regent his Master an account of his Reception here, is lately reintend from Lisbonne, bringing Orders to the Sonde, to return home, as soon is he shall have finishe his Embassie of obedience s with a Bill of Exchange for a great sum of Monies. ces, with the French and spanifh Ambaffadours, to perfwade them to prefs the Colledge, to a speedy Election , and to make choyce of such a perion, as may give equal fatisfaction to both Crowns, but as yet without any fuccefs.

cefs. Yesterday Cardinal Ottobeni, having discovered the Cardinal de Medicie, had secretly pressided to advance Cardinal Carpegna to the Pontifical Dignity, so effectually applyed himself to the Squadra Volante, that upon the secret of furtheres appeared against him.

Seaven Cardinals are as present out of the Conclave, much indisposed in their healths, viz. Orsino, Acquaviua, Antonio Barbarino, Spada, Ludovisio, Bonellizand Pallavisino. Cardinal Nini is also falten ill of a Fesvor,

Vienna, Feb. 26. The Empreis being well recovered from her late Sickneis and Nilcarriage, has made confiderable Prefents to divers Churches and ordered publick that ksgiving for her recovery. The Emperour went in perfon in Lilgrintage to the Church of *Ferzingen*, a League diftant from this Ciry, in devotion, to give thanks to God for his own and the Emprefiles recovery.

The Burgrave of Bo'emia laidly took his leave of the Emperour, and yefterday departed on fismay for Frague.

The States of the Upper Auftr the Dorchies of Stan Carinthia; and Carniola are to be prefent in this Livy the 15th of March, to confut about the prefeat flate of their stairs.

The affairs of Hungary, have no pleafing afpect at the prefent, the States of that kindom intending at their affemility at Cafouia to propole and debate the feizing upon fuch Temples and other Spititual foundations as were taken from them formerly by the late Prince Ragoiaky : Officers are already named to Command the foldiers which they intend to employ in the fervice; Orders are also given for raising of forces. Where pon his Imperial Majefty has ordered Count Forgarz, and the Prefilent of the Chamber of Hungary, to haiten thither, and to ule their endeayours to diffiwade them from this defign; of which, the Emperour is the more apprehentive u, on an information given him, that the Grand Segnior had by fecond Orders commanded the Princes of Transplvania and Valachia tou draw their forces together, and if need be, to joyn with those of the Lower Hungary.

The Arch billiop of strigonium and the Crunt de Nadafti are to be employed also into Hungary as his Imperial MajeAies Plen potentiaries, to be prefere at their allembly of the States, and in the Emperours name to forbid all publick meetings of the Nobility of Hungary, and to command the Protestants there not to act any thing farther without the confert of the Emperour.

The differencess and difforders of that kingdom daily increating, His Imperial Majefty has I at away a Courier to G neral Montecusuit, who arrended the Queen of Poland toward Czenitochow, to require his speedy retu n to Vienna, and has ordered the Count de Schwarzenberg to go post towards Poland to attend the Entpress Dowager and the Arch-Dutchels to Vienna, as icon as they have taken their leaves of the Queen.

Vienna, Mart. 1. Our late Letters from Hungary inform us, that the Sieur Potsky who was thought to be the principal author and fomenter of all the troubles of that Kingdom, dyed fuddenlys by which twas Hoped, thole people might be with the more ease reduced to obedience, if no other turbulant fpirit role up in his room to head them.
