Milan, January 10. N. S.

THE Chancellor and President of the Council of this State have set out from hence, in order to confer with Count Thaur at his Quarters in the Ecclesiastical Territories. Our last Advices from those Parts say, the Marechal de Thesé has been so urgent in his Applications to the Court of Rome against an Accommodation with the Emperor, that he has dejected the Pope's declaring himself on that Subject; but in the mean time Orders are sent to the Archbishop of Genoa, to send back two Vessels, which were arrived there with Soldiers from Avignon; and Orders were also sent to some Forces which were advanced as far as Brignole in Provence, to halt 'till they received further Instructions. There are also Letters which say, that the Difficulties which appeared the greatest are already conquered, and that the only Circumstance which delays the Execution of the Treaty at present, is, that the Court of Rome insists that his Imperial Majesty shall be engaged to protect the Ecclesiastical Territories from the Invasion of any other Prince; but the Marquis de Prié answers, that he is not empowered to do any thing against the Interests of the Duke of Modena. They write from Naples, that the Vessels laden with warlike Stores for the Garrisons in Tuscany, have set sail: They are very impatient in that City to hear what Resolutions the British and Dutch Fleet will take in the present Conjunction. The Troops which lie on the Frontiers of the Ecclesiastical State are ready to march; and 'tis said, that Count Thaur is resolved to march on, to support the Negotiations of the Imperial Minister.

Hamburg, January 25. N. S. The Imperial Minister residing here has transmitted to the Court of Vienna the Apology which Mr. Krumholtz delivered to him: Mr. Krumholtz endeavours, in that Memorial, to vindicate himself from the Aspersions he lies under, as the chief Agent of the disaffected Party in this City, and as one who has animat'd them to undertake all the Outrages which have been committed against Publick Authority. Our last Advices from Stockholm say, That they have been some time without Intelligence from his Swedish Majesty, and that they are in some fear the Courier which carried the News of the Death of the Dutchess Dowager of Holstein-Gottorp, may be taken by the Enemy. Letters from Poland reports that King Stanislaus and the Great Marechal of the Crown have made mutual Advances towards an Accommodation. 'Tis said also, that they have agreed upon certain Articles of a Treaty, of which the French King and the Pope are made Guarantees.

Hague, February 1. N. S. They write from Cologne, that notwithstanding the great Endeavours of the Nuncio residing there, to oppose the Conclusion of the Treaty to settle the Differences between the King of Prussia and that City, the Accommodation was made on the 16th of the last Month on the following Considerations; 1st. That a Deputation shall be sent to the King of Prussia, from the Magistracy of Cologne, to give his Majesty the most solemn Assurances, that the Governors of the Place were no way concerned in the Outrage committed by the Students upon the House of his Resident, and to desire his Majesty to restore that City to the Honour of his Friendship. 2^{dly}. That those Deputies shall be well received by that King, and admitted to kiss his hand. 3^{dly}. That the Magistrates shall repair the Damage done to the Resident-House, and punish the Authors of the Insult done to it. 4^{thly}. That the Resident shall at present make use of the Chapel allotted for the Garrison in the City, reserving to

himself the Right of having the Exercise of his Religion in his own Family, as he shall think fit, according to the Law of Nations. Lastly, That the Magistrates shall pay the Resident all the Honours due to his Character, in the same manner as they treat other Ministers; and that this Accommodation shall be signed and ratified by his Prussian Majesty, within the space of two Months, from the above-mentioned Day of the last Month. They write from Dresden of the 23^d past, That the Carnival is begun in that Place; and that, in the mean time, frequent Conferences are held upon the present Conjunction of Affairs, and the levying new Troops. Advices from the Upper Poland, and several Parts of Lithuania, repeat the Mention of a Battel between the Swedes and Muscovites, in which the latter had the Disadvantage.

Falmouth, January 22. Yesterday put in here the Nontuch of and from Leith; and this Day arrived two of our Tin-Vessels from Plymouth. This Day sailed the Diligence Pacquet, Capt. Hooper, and the Prince Pacquet, Capt. Cheuball, with four Mails for Lisbon, and have carried over 46 Soldiers Recruits for Spain: Sailed also the Pearl, Diana, Hercules, and Young Abraham, Privateers of Flushing, to Cruise.

Bristol, January 24. On the 21st Instant came in the Bridgewater Man of War, and under her Convoy the Ships following, viz. the Minerva of Glaskow, William Campion Master; the Mary-Galley of Dublin, Robert Crain-Master, both from Cadiz; the Margaret of Dublin from the Canaries; the Blossom of and from New-York, Henry York Master; the Katherine and Anne of and from Virginia, Henry Varr Master; the Success of Glaskow, John Haluran Master, from Cadiz; the Hope-well of Cork, John Farrill Master, from Barbadoes; and five Sail of Coasting Vessels from Cork: But they all came last out of Waterford on Monday last, and give an account that Her Majesty's Ship the Hastings had taken two Prizes, one bound to, and the other from Martinico, and carried them into Kingfale. This Day Her Majesty's Ship the Hastings came into Kingroad.

Portsmouth, January 30. On Friday last her Majesty's Ships the Leopard and Panther sailed from Spithead into the Harbour. Yesterday, about three of the Clock in the Afternoon, her Majesty's Ships the Norfolk, Burford and Va-leur sailed from Spithead, with about 60 Sail of Merchantmen and Coasters under their Convoy for the Downs. There are at Spithead her Majesty's Ships the Royal Oak, Crown and Lancaster.

Deal, January 30. Her Majesty's Ship the Tartar sailed this Morning to the Westward, in order to Cruise. Three Dutch Men of War

War and a Dutch Bomb-Vessel sailed also towards the River; but eleven of the Queen's Ships, and several outward-bound, are still here. Just now came down her Majesty's Ships Gosport and Queenborough.

Yarmouth, January 31. On the 29th sailed out of our Road to the Southward the Fleet of laden Colliers, &c. that came into our Road the Day before from Newcastle. Her Majesty's Ships the Folkstone and Advice Prize continue in our Road.
