Copenhagen, January 26. N. S. The Muscovite Ambassador has had Audience of the Queen Consort, and of the Princess Royal, the King's Sister. The Audience was given after the same manner as is used to be observed towards all other Ladies of the same Character; though there is a particular Ceremonial settled by Agreement between this Court and that of Mosco, in regard to their respective Ambassadors, yet as at the time of making that Agreement there were no Ambassadors at either of the Courts, and scarce any Remembrance of there having been any, there was no Regulation made for the Reception of their Ladies. The last from Muscovy was therefore received upon the same foot as an Ambassador from France; and the same Ceremony has been observed towards the present Ambassador from Sweden. The Swedish Envoy has notified to the Queen-Mother the Death of the Dutchess Dowager of Holstein. He gave a Letter of Notification for the King to the Privy-Councillors. He had desired to wait upon the Queen-Consort for the same purpose, but her Majesty's Indisposition hindered the Performance of that Ceremony.

Berlin, February 2. N. S. Monsieur Gurkin received his Dispatches, and set out on the 29th of the last Month as Minister from this King to the Duke of Mecklenburg, to use his good Offices with the Duke, and to persuade his Highness to any reasonable Accommodation with the Nobility; from thence that Minister is to go to Hamburg, to hasten a Conclusion of the great Affair in Debate there, and to execute other Commissions from this Court. Count Dona Ferrassieza, who is in the Service of the States-General, came hither last Tuesday with his eldest Daughter, who is to be Maid of Honour to the Queen. Major-General Tettau, and several other General Officers, who served this last Campaign in the Low-Countries, are returned hither. The King has been pleased to appoint Mr. Bondely his Envoy to Switzerland, and to give him the Order of Generosity, with other Rewards, in consideration of his Eminent Services. We hear from Wilda of the 13th of the last Month, as also from Mohilow, Grodno and Riga, that the Swedes have gained a signal Victory over the Muscovites; that in the Action the Czar was wounded, Prince Menzikoff taken Prisoner, and Monsieur Czeremet killed. They add, that the General Czeremet, who endeavoured to make his Retreat with the Infantry, was pursued, and after a brave Resistance, obliged to surrender himself a Prisoner at Discretion.
