Madrid, Feb. 19 The Quten continues with extraordinary diligence and attention to be prefent at feveral Confutations for the mannagement of the molt important affairs of State. The King enjoys his health but has been for fome days obliged to keep his chamber for a paincrufed by the accidental falling of fomething into one of his eyes.

The concernment of the Crown alone in the Fleet lately arrived at St Lucar, being valued at above 500 thoufand pieces of Eight, besides Six M ions upon other accounts ; the Queen has thought fit to lend away Don Iuan de Barecco with Commission to receive the Customes due to his Majesty as well as his part of the Ca.go. Fhe ship which lost the company of the fest of the Fleet about the Islands Flamandes, is fince safely arrived at St Lucar, but that which they left about Vera Crug and Havana, is supposed to be turned back, and to expect the conveniency and fecurity of returning home with the Gallions, which are supposed to be neer the coafts; in which confidence the men of war which were fitted up at Cadis, and intended to have put to fea to have fecured the return of the before-mentioned New Spain Fleet, is ordered to fail to meet with the Gallions to furnifh them with neceffaries, and to fecure them against the Corfairs of Barbary.

As yet the Queen Regent has not made choice of any perfon to fucceed the Prince de Ligne in the vaceht charge of General of the Horfe in the Netherlands, the multiplicity of Competitors having occasion'd a difficulty in the choice.

Don Diego Spinsla who is preferred to the Command of a Territa in the Netherlands, has not yet began his journey futherwards, he defiring first to know the refolution of the Court about the Recruits which he expects to carry over with him.

Freih Letters are dispatcht to the Duke d'Offuna, to quicken him in his Journey to his New Government of Milan.

The Count de Fernando Nugnez; Nephew to the Ptefident of the Counfell of the Finances, is preparing for his fpeedy departures as Envoye Extraordinaty into Polands to Compliment the King upon His happy Eftablishment in that Crown, and His late Marrisge with the Emperours Sifter.

The Count de Luna, Son to the Count de Benevente, is lately decealed, as is alto the Countels de Carsfrilte ; and the Marquil's de Salivas fallen desperately ill, without hopes of recovery.

The Count de Molina, lately Ambassador in England, is to be sent into France with the same Charafter. The Arch-bisshop of Phoulose, formerly Bishop of Bessers, is daily expected here, his Lodgings having been long fince prepared for his Reception. The Sieur de Gourville having had his Au ience, and fince some Conferences with the Spanish Ministers about the Affairs of the Prince de Conde his Masser, has dispatch into France his Brother id La vythe Sieur de la Mosser ogive the Prince an account how fart he has proceeded in that Negotistions

Genousa, Mart. 5. This last week the Arthbishop of this City embarked upon one of our Gallies on his way for Rome, and at the fame time put to fea feveral Genouese and Dutch thips intending for Cadis, and the Dutch afterwards to proceed on their way homewards.

The 28th paft arrived here deveral thips belonging to the Holland Convoy bound for the Levant, bringing hither feveral Goods laden upon the account of divers Merchants of this place, they tell us that the Spanlards at Cadis expect the return of their Gallions about the end of March.

Here are lately arrived the Mary, the Succels, and the Friend/hip, laden with Pilchards, Pepper, and Ledd, and in their company 4 Durch thips. A finall veriel to merly made prize by the Turks, but fince retaken by the French, being on these coafts, difcovered two Turkish Caravels feifing upon a small Bark, which strok to grear z terror into them, that the seather beth their vessel and came in bither with their Soad

Even now arrived here the Louis from Marfeilles, and the Unicorn from Legarn to la e Marbles; the Portland daily expected for the 'Convoy of fuch Merchants ships as shall be in readiness to put to sea from this Port.

From Airin we are old that the French Ambasildor in that Court has had a particular Audience from the Duke of savoy, to inform him that it has pleafed the most Christian King his' Master to refer his preceditions in the Netherlands to the arbitration of their Majellies of Great Britain and Swedeland; they allo tell ns, that the Count de St Afgrand had taken that place on his way for Italy, having only fpent fo much time in that City as was necessary for the taking a view of the Curiofities of that place.

From Milan they write, that they are not a little difcourfing of the reafons why their new Governour, the Dake d' Offuna fo long defers his journey thithed \$ in the mean time, the old one, the Narquis de los Balbares Spinola with his accuftomed pruder ce, mansges all the publick affairs, and finding it of concernment to the Government to continue a good correspondency and underflanding with the Swils Cantons, has dispatch his Ordets to the Gount Caffart, the Spanish Minister in tholf parts to affaire them, that speedy care shall be taken for the discharge of all arrears of the bensions due to the Mi.

the difcharge of all arrears of the penfions due to them. Venice, Mars. 8. The S-nate have difmilled from their fervice all their fhips except Six onely, intending to form a Fleet out of their Gallies and Galleaffes for the guard of the lease an intend to imploy two great fhips lately built built in the Arlenal for the transportation of all necessaries for the supply of our Garrisons in the Isle of candia and other parts adjacent.

For the better husbandry of the publick Treature, they have ordered not only the Reforming of the Three Gemerals, but of all other forreign Commanders and Officers, and have amongft others, difinift the Count di Fontenach, Lieutenant General to Monfibeur de S. Andre Monibrun, but with the most obliging Language, acknowledging the many obligations he has laid upon the Republick by his many faithful and eminent fervices.

Republick by his many faithful and eminent fervices. The Senate continues to pay off the foldiers returned from their fervice in the Levant, recompending the Officers; with Gold Chains. Of the Three thousand Lunenburghars, only Five hundred returned hither, who are upon their match homewards with the body of the Count de Wallee their General, and of Two hundred German Horfe which were fent into Candia, 86 only matched thance with 12 Officers, but on their return, the flippin which they were embalked unhappily ran on ground neer Bifoglia, where Sixty of the number also peristed, only 26 of them escaping with the faid 12 Officers.

Here is lately arrived the Pearl, a fhip belonging to this Republick from Zante, telling us that His Excellency Captain General Morofini intended fuddenly to return home with many of his Officers, having fetled all our concernments in the Levant in a quiet pofture.

There lately came into Zante one of our fhips from Candia, which had fome time fince been hired at Canea for the transportation of fuch of the Tu kilh foldiers to Athens as were difmiffed the fervice by the G and Vifier; affirming that many other fhips had with confiderable advantage undertaken the fame employment; each Turkish foldier piying 13 Reals apiece out of their own Moneys for their paflage, but fuch foldiers as were not able to pay the fum, were obliged to repair to Candia, where they arg to be provided for, which is one of the methods used for the repeopling of that City.

From Dalmatia we are advised, that the Turks having done fome confiderable damage by an incursion lately made into fome parts under the Venetian jurifdiction; the Morlachs foon took the opportunity to rev nge it with an inroad into the Turkish quarters, and returned home with fome plunder and much Cattle : but that the Baffa of Boffina has fince cauled an inquiry to be msde into the authors of these diforders, and has hanged up three of the principal inftruments and promoters of the first inroad, and given fevere Command for the prevention of any future violencies.

The Republick having upon the addreffes of the Colfacks of *Perafio*, ordered them a lupply of Provisions for their neceffary sublistance, those of *Poffidaria* have petitioned also for a like relief, fince their neceffities seem to be altogether as prefing.

Hambourg, Mart. 11. The Duke d' Hanouer having been prefent at the folemn Baptisme of the young Princels his Daughter, is lately passed by this place on his way for Gopenhagen to compliment the Queen of Denmark his Sister upon the late death of the King her Husband. the Danish Commissioners which were here employd about the pretensions to the County of Oldenbourg are returned to Copenhagen, but are again expected after Easter with new Commissions and Instructions from the prefent King, who is in daily consultation with the ablest perfors of his Kingdom, and endeavours to oblige the people to his obedience by redreffing feveral grievances.

He has lent new Letters of Credence to his Prefident in the Court of Sweden, giving him the Character of his Extraordinary Envoye, and tis believed the King of Sweden will do the fame to the Heer Lelieukron his Re-Ident at Copenhagen.

Letters of the 28th of Ianuary from Moleow confirm the decease of the young Prince of Muscowy on the 27th, whole body was the next day buryed with little Ceremony according to the cultume of that place ; adding, that the people had to great an affection for his perfon, and confequently to great a fenfe of his folly, that they immediately that up their fliops, and gave themfelves up to forrow as upon fome general calamity. They farther fay that the Princels his Sifter is fallen ill of the fame diftemper of which he dyed, and is fuppoled incurable.

The Heer Heinfitt, Envoye Extraordinary from the States of the United Provinces is still at Moscow, but is not able to make any advance in the affair for which he was employed thither; the Muscovites being not inclined to hearken to any Mediation for composing the differences between them and the Swedes.

Fioni Riga and the Countreys adjacent, they tell us of extraordinary Tempest, with great Lhunders and Lightnings, and Earthquakes, which happened about the beginning of February, to the infinite terror of the people.

From Warfam they write of great preparations which are there making for the reception of their Majeflys after their Marriage at Czenfashow, in Order whereunto they have erected leveral Pageants or Triumphal Arches between the Gate by which they are to enter, and the Great place within the City.

That the Senators and other perfons who formerly much oppoled this alliance with the Empereur, begine now to be reconciled to it, and the people generally convinced, that all the oppolitions which has hitherto been made, has forung principally from the intrigues of a forreign power, whole Treasure has been as liberally as fubtilly employed to engage the Kingdom in fresh diforders.

The troubles threatened from *Ukraniu* are great, confidering the part the Turks take to themfelves, and the encouragement is given them to advance their Empire on that fide.

They confidently write, that the Tartars have Maffacted the Coffacks Ambaffadors with all their attendants, fulpecting them to have had an intention to have opposed the homage required by the Turks,

Dorofensko, however he pretends to own the Intereft of Poland, is believed to be far engaged to the Outoman Empire; the people continue generally their affection to the Crown of Poland, which they feem ready to demonfirste whynloever any of the Polish forces shall be fent among them for their encouragement.

Paris, Mart 21. The time of his Majesties departure with his Court to visit the places of his late Conquests in the Netherlands is yet uncertain? the Queen Regent of Spain having been informed of his Majesties intentions to visit those parts, has been pleased to fend him a Passport for his peaceable passing rhrough those parts of the Spanish Territories which lye in his way, that so there may be no occasion given for any disturbances

His Najefty intends within few days to take a view of his Regiments of, French and Swils Guards in the Plain de Houilles, where are also to be drawn up all the Horfe of his Houihold.

The Prince de Ligne is fuddenly expected here incognito on his way to his Viceroyalty of sicily.

The King has lately couled a new Court to be erected, confifting of 12 Masters of Requests, who are to fit in the Hostel de Luynes, lately purchast by his Majesty for that purpose, where are to be examined all causes belonging to his Domain.

The laft week the Kings Lottery was opened, where the Three principal Lots of 10 thoufand Liures apiece were drawn, One by Msdam de Pienes of Piedmont, another by the Chevalier de Beuvron, and the young de Farengeville, and the third by the Duke d' Aumont, and Monfieur Picon, a Gentleman of Languedoc.

The 18th Instant the Nuncio had an Audience from his Majefty at St. Germains, and the fame day the Sieur Gahet the Danifh Refisent, communicated to his Majefty the King of Dazemarks death, for which, their Majeftics, and the Court are fince entred into Mourning.

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
