

With him into Flanders, for the Payment of the French Troops but Four Millions of Livres, though Nine were expected. Advices from Lille say, that there were so great Quantities of Corn in those Parts, that there was no doubt but they should suddenly have all manner of Provisions at a very cheap Rate. Those Advices add, that Stables were building for 2000 Horses which were to be sent thither. They write from Ghent, that the Enemy is very much alarmed at the great Preparations made by the Allies, and were taking all possible Measures for the Security of Ipres, Knocque, Furnes and Newport. They add, that they continued at Ghent to send great Numbers of Boats loaden with Corn to the Frontiers.

St. James's, March 25. This Day his Grace the Duke of Marlborough set out from hence, in order to embark for Holland.

Dartmouth, March 20. There remains in this Port, detained by contrary Winds, the Centurion-Galley, Capt. Clarke, from Leghorn; and in Torlay the Empress Galley, Capt. Andrews, from Viana; and the two Sisters of Dublin, Capt. Cunningham Commander, from Cadiz, all three loaden with Wine, bound for London.

Falmouth, March 21. On the 19th of this Month sailed her Majesty's Ship Dartmouth, Capt. Howard, with the two Dutch Men of War, with all the outward-bound Fleet and Virginia Ships for London. Yesterday came in the Gloucester-Gally, of and from Boston, Joseph Rouse Master, laden with Logwood and Sugar, bound for London. Here remain three Packet-Boats.

Plimouth, March 22. On the 19th Instant came in her Majesty's Ship the Salisbury from Cruising. The same Evening came in my Lord Durlly, with Her Majesty's Ships the Kent, Monk and Chester from cruising. At the same time came in Her Majesty's Ship Dartmouth, and two Dutch Men of War from Falmouth, and under their Convoy the Concord of London; Capt. Arnold; the Amazon of Amsterdam, Capt. Meyland, for the East Indies, about 30 Sail for Lisbon, &c. and 20 Sail from Virginia, Lisbon, Ireland, &c.

Portsmouth, March 24. On the 22d Instant, in the Afternoon, the outward-bound Merchantmen for Lisbon, East-Indies, Virginia, and other Places, sailed from Spithead, under Convoy of Her Majesty's Ships the Captain, Revenge, Bedford, Worcester, South-sea-Castle and Garland, with a fair Wind, being about 150 Sail. At the same time the Chatham and Exeter came up from cruising. Also sailed out of the Harbour to Spithead the Lancaster, Elizabeth and Orford.

Yarmouth, March 25. This Day failed out of our Road a Fleet of Light Colliers for Newcastle without Convoy.

Deal, March 26. Yesterday in the Afternoon came down her Majesty's Ship the Deptford. Last Night came in hither her Majesty's Ships the Norfolk, Lancaster, Orford and Warwick, and under their Convoy about 30 Sail of Coasters, with three or four homeward-bound Merchant Ships, but all left from Portsmouth.

The Dutch Mail of Friday last is not yet come in.
