**T**He 12th instant arrived here about 30 sail of Merchants ships, English and Dutch, laden, most of them with Wines, Brandy, and Vinegar from France, one French ship from Ireland bound for *Rouen*, and several English ships from *Boston* in *New England* laden with Tobacco bound for a Market. Several other English and Dutch vessels are put into *Silly*, the wind not serving them to make this Port.

*Legorn*, March 10. This week arrived here the *St. Antonio Abate*, a great ship of *Genoua* bound for *Smirna*, and *Constantinople*, and may this day put again to Sea.

The Dutch Convoy may also sayl in 10. days for *Smirna*.

From *Marseilles* we are told of the arrival there of several French Marines, who in consequence of the late peace made by the French with the *Corsairs of Algier*, were set at liberty and sent home. Six French men of war are sent to *Tunis* to renew the peace also with that people.

The 5th instant departed hence the *Saphire* Fregate, with the *Conclusion* and other ships, bound for *Venice*, and on the 8th, the *Portland* Fregat, with the *Hambourg* Merchant, *Florentine*, and several other ships bound for *England*.

The Great Duke with all his Court, are this week expected here from *Pisa*.

*Genoua*, March 12. Several small English Vessels are lately arrived from *Legorn* and *Marseilles* to lade Marbles. The Differences between the *Genouefs* and *Savoyards* upon the frontiers, seem to be still upon the Increase, which has occasioned frequent Consultations here, and Obliged our Governours, to send down some persons, to take an account of the true state of these affairs, and to make report accordingly. His most Christian Majesty has in behalf of the Duke of *Savoy*, sent hither the *Abbot de Servient* his Ambassador in that Court, to interpose in the said differences, who has had his Audience at the Colledg, and is honourably entertained upon the account of this Republick.

From *Turin* we are advised of the arrival there of 2. Captains and one Lieutenant with 53 Souldiers, the whole remainder of two Regiments, which were sent by the Duke to the assistance of the *Venetians* during the siege of *Candia*, 150 only survived the Surrender of the place, who on their return homewards, were cast away upon the Coasts of *Puglia*, where perished Colonel *Arborio*, and *Segnior de Cominges* many persons of Great Conduct and Valour; and all the rest above the number above mentioned, who presented to the Duke their Standard, which they preserved from the Wreck; who has somewhat repaired their losses at Sea, by a liberal distribution of Monies, Ordering them to be admitted, into his old standing Regiment of Guards, and the Officers to be placed in Commands Equivalent to what they were preferred to in the *Venetian* service.

*Hambourg*, Mart. 14. The Count de *Guldenew* arriving here from *England*, lodged the 7th instant at *Altenas* and from thence departed the next morning with all diligence for *Copenhagen*.

Some passengers who left *Copenhagen* the 8th instant inform, that about a week before, the seas were so much

frozen, that divers people had passed the *Sound* upon *Sleds*, but that 13 of those *Sleds* which were passing to *Schonen* upon the Ice, were lost, with all the people that were upon them.

Letters from *Stockholme* tell us, that their Majesties were returned from *Joachindal*, where they had been some time diverting themselves; and that the Chancellour and several of the Senators were also arrived at *Stockholme*, who all seem much satisfied with the Letter from his most Christian Majesty, referring his differences with *Spain*, about the limits in the *Neatherlands*, to the arbitration of His Majesty of *Great Britain*, and the Crown of *Sweden*, of which *Sweden* has accepted, and was Ordering their said acceptance to be signified to his most Christian Majesty.

From *Warsaw* we are told, that General *Sierko*, had fallen upon the party of *Tartars* (who so barbarously murdered the *Cossacks* Deputies returning from *Poland*) killing 300 of them upon the place, chasing the rest, and freeing above 1000. women and children from Captivity.

They farther write that the Polish Commissioners continue still upon the Confines of *Avucovy*, the *Czar* having only suspended the Conclusion of the Treaty with *Poland*, till he were fully informed how far the King of *Poland* was like to be allied to the House of *Austria*.

*Venice*, Mart. 15. Several ships lately arriving here from the *Levant* inform us, that *Segnior Cavalier Molino* was lately at *Candia* received and entertained by the Grand Visier with all the respects and civilities imaginable; mutual visits and actions of kindness also passing between him and most of the Turkish Ministers of that place.

They farther tell us, that the Visier, who was lastly reported to be embarked for the Grand *Segnions* Court, was preparing for that voyage, intending to take along with him the Cavalier *Molino*, and to introduce him to his Audience at *Salonich*, where the Emperour continues to divert himself with hunting and other recreations, intending not to remove from thence till the arrival of the Visier, by whose Presence and Councils he hopes with more ease to compose all the factions and disturbances at *Constantinople*, which have been principally occasion'd by his long absence.

The Visier has fired up all the Gallies which he had in the Port of *Candia*, obliging the people to contribute largely to the work, and has by the publication of a free Trade, and many immunities and priviledges to such persons as shall come to inhabit that City, prevailed in his design, and rendered the place very populous.

From *Dalmatia* we are informed, that the Turks with a party of about 200 Horse have lately made another incursion about *Zara*, and met with some booty, but the Countrey people taking the allarum, had stript them of all their plunder, and revenged this injury by a visit made to their territories, from whence they returned and brought away with them above 2000 head of Cattle.

Since this the Governours of both parties have had some meetings, for the prevention of the like disorders for the future, which they find to be a matter of great difficulty, considering the nature of the people upon the borders, and their great inclination to rapine and violence, in which Trade they have been always Educated.

Count *Constantin Ranieri* Commander of the forces formerly Employed by the Pope, for the assistance of this Republick against the Turks, has in *Dalmatia* receiv-

ved Orders from Rome, to return with his Regiment into the Ecclesiastical State, to which he intends to give Obedience upon the return of General *Barbaro*, who is now in progress, visiting the several places of importance under his Government, whose leave he is to desire, as well as his assistance for shipping to pass over his men.

The new presents which the publick were forced to prepare for the Turkish Court, upon the unhappy miscarriage of the former, are embarked upon the Gally *Bracciana*, which is Ordered to convey them to *Zans*, where other ships are to take the charge of them: This Gally lies ready to put to Sea, expecting only the opportunity of good weather.

On Wednesday last, the great Council made choyce of *Cavalier Molino* for their Bayly, or ordinary Minister to reside in the Turkish Court, which charge he is to enter upon, so soon as he shall have finish'd his Extraordinary Embassie.

On Thursday last the Great Duke of *Florence's* Resident, went with a great Train to his Audience at the Colledge.

Prince *Triivulzio*, who designed to have continued some months longer in this City, has lately received Orders to depart immediately for *Milan*, to attend the new Governour upon his arrival.

Prince *Ernest of Brunswick*, is expected here from *Rome* on his return homewards. The Prince *d' Holstein* Brother to the present King of *Denmark*, is here taking a View of the Curiosities of this place.

*Brussels, Mart. 25.* Yesterday went hence Count *Marcin* to take a view of the Citadel and Fortifications there. Immediately after was proclaimed by beat of Drum at the Court gate, and other places of this City, a Placart, commanding all Officers to repair to their several Quarters within the space of 24 hours, upon pain of death, a considerable force is intended to be drawn to *Ipres* for the defence of that place till the fortifications be completed.

From *Furnes* we are told, that the 16th instant by order from the French Intendant of those parts, great preparations are made of Corn, Hay, and Straw, for the supply of their horse which are to attend His most Christian Majesty in his visit intended to his late Conquests, and a like care is also taken in other places.

An express from *Arras* informs us of the arrival at a Village called *St Paul* within two Leagues of *Arras* of a great body of French Foot with a proportionable Train of Artillery.

The Courier arriving here on Friday last from *Spain*, acquaints us, that it has pleased the Queen Regent to confer the Charge of Lieutenant General of the Cavalry in the *Netherlands*, vacant by the removal of the Prince *de Ligne* to the Vice-royalty of *Sicily*, upon the Duke *de Villa Hermosa*, a person of high birth and extraordinary merit.

*Paris, Mart. 25.* His Majesty has thoughts of being present in Parliament before *Easter*, to pass several Edicts for the ease and benefit of the people, the better to oblige them to his service; as also to suppress the Receivers of the Revenues belonging to the City, reserving onely two of them, and to take away the Offices of Receivers of his *Tailles* as burdenson and useless, intending for the future to have all these Collections made by the Gentlemen of each respective Province, who shall have power given them for that purpose, and be obliged to give in their accounts to the Treasury.

His Majesty farther designs, to take care that justice may be done freely, and without Bribes or Rewards, and intends that all Presidents, Advocates, Procurators General, and Lieutenants Civil and Criminal, shall act by a new Power an Commission.

His Majesty frequently divers himself in taking the reviews of his forces: this last week were drawn up before

him his Musqueteers and several Companies of Foot designed for sea service.

The Turkish Minister may in little time take his leave in Order to his return for *Constantinople*, with whom it is to be sent a Minister from hence to reside in the Ottoman Court in the room of Monsieur *de la Hay*, who suddenly expects a dismissal from that employment, but as yet we have no certainty of the person.

The six ships which have been so long discoursed of for their intended voyage towards the Persian Gulf, are now Equipped at *Rochelle* to be sent under the Command of Monsieur *de Turrelle*, as Admiral, and Monsieur *de la Hay* lately Governour of *St Venant* as Viceadmiral, which later is to Command 4000 men which are ordered to be embarked upon the said men of war, to be employd, most of them at *Madagascar*, whereof the said *de la Hay* is to be Governour; aboard the said ships are also to be sent 400 men which are to be drawn out of the Marine Regiment, under the Command of Monsieur *de Lauardin*.

The Duke *de Longueville* is suddenly expected here from *Rome*, where he was some time since made Priest, and tis believed he intends to resign his Title of Duke to the Count *de St Paul* his Brother.

From *Rome* we are told, that there is as yet little probability of a speedy Election, but the Prince *Savelli*, Governour of the Conclave, has declared, that no more of the Cardinals shall upon any pretence of sickness or recovery, go out or enter into the Conclave, lest under a pretence of an indisposition, they may privately carry on a Negotiation with foreign Princes, which he justifies by a Bull of Pope *Pius* the V.

*Des, Mart. 18.* Yesterday arrived here a ship from *Virginia* with no other advice but what speaks the thriving and peaceable condition of those parts. This day, the wind being favourable, the five East India ships sailed out of the Downs.
