The Britry of the Queen is like to be magnificent, but the adverse party is not yet reconciled to the Matrige. The Cossickshave sent to the King, declaring their readinels to submit themselves to him upon condition they trisy be declared a free people, and enjoy the same pri-viledges with the Poles, and be Governed by their own

Count Schaffgorz, Ambalfador Extraordinary from the Emperour is arrived here incognito, and intends in few days to make his publick Entry with extraordinary splen-

Rome, March 8. The Factions in the Conclave have hitherto gained so little advantages of one another, that the Election feems a matter of as great, if not greater difficulty now, then at the first meeting of the Cardinals in the Conclave. Cardinal Chigy with the Creatures of Alexander the VII. feem resolved if not fworn , never to quit the interest they have ; and to use their utmost Endeavours, to raise a person of their own Faction to the Papacy.

The Duke de Chaulnes the French Ambaliadour, leems much displeased at the Cardinals of the Squadron; that fince he had upon their accounts and desires, Excluded Cardinal d' Elcy, they not only refused to concur with him for the Election of Cardinal Esnviff, but possitively declared their inability to ferve him , yet it was beelieved he would have prevayled, the Sanish Cardinals Inclining to favour him, but the Consideration of the Opposition he was like to meet with from the Respigliosi, and Berbarini . so much discouraged him , that he thought it not fit to attempt the Scrutiny.

Cardinal Chigy who leaves no stone unturned for the advantage of his faction, sent lately some dispatches to the Great Duke of Tuscany at Pisa, desi ing the Duke to endeavour by his Letters to procute from his most Christian Majesty a revocation of the exclusion of Cardinal d' Elcy, and is using the best methods likewise to parswade the Duke of Chaulnes to favour him-

The Ambaffadors from the two Crowns of France and Spain, endeavor the promotion of their particular interest, and dispatch away frequently their Couriers to give an account of h procee i gs of the Conclave. Their two Ministe s I ely meeting, the French Ambassador was pleased to ask the other, why he had not yet made a Pope, who answered, that his concernment in the choice semed the greater, fince he came Post for that purpose ; to which the Duke replyed, that if his Master had so many Subjects in the Conclave es Spain, he would quickly bring them to a resolution; to which the Spanish Ambassador rejoyned, that Spain knew no other method, then by defiring them to halten the Election of fuch a Pope as would best fuit with the inweest of the Universal Church.

Cologne, Mars. 14. The Disputes amongst the Counts of Hanau, are like to be peaceably composed, by vertue of the Commission sent by the Emperour to the Prince Elector valatin, and the Dukes of Wirtemberg: and the Landgrave of Hessen, has been perswaded to withdraw his forces, which for some time had taken up their

posts near the City of Hanau.

The Treaty between the Prince Elector of Cologn, and that City, is broken off, without that good fuccels which was defired, so that tis feared, the Elector will proceed to tharper Methods.

Dantzig, Mart 15. The 4th instant the King of Poland arrived in post at Warfaw from Czenstochow, to be present at the opening of the Det, which b gan the next day, and on the 7th concluded the Election of their Marthat or Speaker, confirming the Honour upon one Kirkey of Lythuania.

During his Majesties continuance at Czenstochow, the Archbishop of Gnefae sent his brother the Pala ine of Plotthe to compliment his Majesty, and to excuse him from a personal at endance; the Mareshal Sobiesky filed also the same Ceremony, which gives the Court some reason to hope that they are in great measure reconciled to the Marriage.

About the same time His Majesty received Letters from Derofensko, humbly defiring that His Majeffy would pleafe to nominate Commissioners for the composure of all diffe+ rences, wherein himfelf or those under his Command could

any ways be concerned. The next day after the Martiage, His Majesties Stables at Gzenstachow took fire, in which were burnt many horles, amongit the reft, a fett of horses of great value, which were presented by the Emperours Ambassador to his Ma-

jefty, which lofs was afterwards repaired by a like Prefent made to his Majesty by soveral Noble persons of Austria. The Joth instant her Majesty intended to make a solema Entry in Warfam, with extraordinary Magnificence,

From the frontiers it is adviled, that four Ballas are passed over the Danube with their forces, and are marching on towards Ukrania; and that the Tartars are again in the field, a party of whom had met with the Deputics from the Cossacks lately returning from Peland, and cut them in pieces, upon suspicion that they were endeavouring to withdraw themselves from the protection of the Turks.

Vienna, Mart. 15. His Imperial Mojefils Leavies are carried on with much diligence for the rectults of the old Regiments, whose Companies are like to be in little time complexed; great numbers of old foldiers offering them-Selves to the service ! besides the Foot, Order is given for the railing a Regiment of Horse to be Commanded by Collonel Pelching for the Emperors Guard.

The Emperous has dispatche the Count de Frantson ed Ratisbonne, upon the receipt of the news from thence, that the Deputies of the Empire were concluded upon the point of railing 36 thousand men for the security of the

Empire ; and had allotted each Prince and State of the Empire their proportion of the faid Leavy, and their rate at which they are chargeable for their quota's, for ammu-

nition, Provision, and Artillery.

The Archbishop of Strigonium, the Count Forgatz, and the Baron de Zitsky, President of the Chamber of Hungary, are departed stom Vienna to be present at the Astembly of the States of that kingdom at Neufol, where its believed the Emperour will receive full satisfaction of the good intentions of the Protestants; and that all their defigns tended only to preserve themselves in their just liberties, and to desend themselves against the violencies of the Turks.

The Emperours forces which were formerly quartered in and neer Vienna, are ordered to march to Gaurine, Comorra, and Leopala, for the security of the peace of that

kıngdom.

The Visier of Buda has made great complaints against the Hussians, and amongst other discourses he had with the Emperours Interpreter, was pleased to tell him, that unless greater care were taken to prevent their incustions upon the Ottoman territories, the Grand Segnitor would suddenly be obliged to require them by sorce of Arms.

The Grand Segnior has sent his Commands to the Bassis of Asia, Africa, and Egypt, to give him in a List of what forces they are able to draw out into the field for his service, but for what employment he intends them, is not

yet discovered.

The Empress Dowager is returned home from Poland. Hambourg, Mart. 21. The Count do Hanau has lately removed several of his Counsellors, and pur others in their room, and changed the Governour of the place, but the affairs of the Count in relation to the neighbor Princes continue in the same posture as formerly; all persons concinue in the same posture as formerly; all persons commission, which is to be opened at Spire. In the mean while the forces of the Landgrave of Hessen Cassellare continued about Naumbourg, and the Electors of Mentz upon the stontiers near Hanau.

Brussels, Mart. 28. Hague, Mars. 28. The States of Holland may continue their Session all this Lens, having many assairs before them of great consideration, and particularly, the complaints of the City of Leyden; of the injury they have long received from Amsterdam, by letting the Salt waters into their Channel and spoiling their waters.

Amsterdam having frequently prevented the redress of this great inconveniency by their Atts in the Assembly 3 those of Leyden the 24th or 25th instant sunk 150 boars laden with stones and other materials in the Channel between Amsterdam and Gonde to stop up the passages and set a guara to prevent the opening of it again, which has been sharply complained of by the Deputies of Amsterdam, and occasioned a long debate in the Assembly.

Paris, Mart. 29 The ships which are fitted up at Rochelle, may in little time tail for Madagafeur and the Indies as defigned. Letters from Suratt tell us, that Monsieur Garon, the principal Director of the affiirs of Commerce in those parts, had given credit for the whole Cargo of a ship lately arrived there, but not being able to keep exactly to his time of fatisfying a debt which he had. contracted upon that account, with an Armenian Merchant, who was concerned there with him a the quartel grew high between them, infomuch as Monfieur Caron pre 👡 tending to the greatest power, had sent him away prisoner to Madagascar, but the Director of the French Company there, being diffacisfyd with his proceedings, had fent back the Armenian with full power to continue at Surats in the fame employment and au hority as before; they tell us that there are not remaining at Madagascar above 50 French, but that they expect a confiderable lupply from France, without which, they shall not be able to maintain the Trade expected from those parts.
