This day arrived the Charles, and Catherine, the first from Chester with Lead Oar, the other from Dublin, both of them belonging to London, and intended for Venice. About the same time came in the Barchelor of London bound for Guiny, which came out of the Downs in company with about 30 fail, intended for the South-

Warfaw, Mart. 7. The Diet has since their meeting made little progress in any affairs of concernment, having spent most of the time hitherto in several petty disputes

among & themselves.

The Entry of the Queen is like to be magnificent, but the adverse party is not yet reconciled to the Marrisge. The Arch-bishop, and the Crowns General Subsesky, who were the principal heads of that opposing party, are not yet arrived at the Diet, being willing, as is conceived, 20 take their measures from the inclination of the rest of the Nobilicy

The Coffickshave lent to the King, declaring their readiness to submit themselves to him upon condition they may be declared a free people, and enjoy the same priviledges with the Poles, and be Governed by their own

Count Schaffgorz, Ambassador Extraordinary from the Emperour is arrived here incognito, and intends in sew days to make his publick Entry with extraordinary splen-

dor-

Rome, March 8. The Factions in the Conclave have hitherto gained so little advantages of one another a that the Election feems a matter of as great, if not greater difficulty now, then at the first meeting of the Cardinals in the Conclave. Cardinal Chigy with the Creatures of Alexander the VII. feem resolved if not fworn , never to quit the interest they have 3 and to use their utmost Endeavours, to raise a person of their own Faction to the Papacy.

The Duke de Chaulnes the French Ambassadour, seems much displeased at the Cardinals of the Squadron, that fince he had upon their accounts and defires, Excluded Cardinal d' Elcy, they not only refused to concur with him for the Election of Cardinal Benviff, but possitively declared their inability to ferve him , yet it was bee. lieved he would have prevayled, the Sanish Cardinals anclining to favour him, but the Consideration of the Opposition he was like to meet with from the Rospigliosi, and Berbarini . so much discouraged him , that he thought it not fit to attempt the Scrutiny.

Cardinal Chigy who leaves so stone unturned for the ad-vantage of his faction, sent lately some dispatches to the Great Duke of Tuscany at Pisa, desi ing the Duke to endeavour by his Letters to procute from his most Christian Majesty a revocation of the exclusion of Cardinal d' Elcy, and is using the best methods likewise to parswade the Duke of Chaulnes to savour him-

The Ambaffadors from the two Crowns of France and Spain, endeavor the promotion of their particular interest, and dispatch away frequ n ly their Couriers to give an account of h procee i gs of the Conclave. Their two Ministe s I ely meeting, the French Ambassador was pleased to ask the other, why he had not yet made a Pope, who answered, that his concernment in the choice semed the greater, fince he came Post for that purpose ; to which the Duke replyed, that if his Master had so many Subjects in the Conclave es spain, he would quickly bring them to a resolution; to which the Spanish Ambassador rejoyned, that Spain knew no other method, then by defiring them to halten the Election of fuch a Pope as would best fuit with the interest of the Universal Church.

Cologne, Mars. 14. The Disputes amongst the Counts of Hanau, are like to be peaceably composed, by versue of the Commission sent by the Emperour to the Prince Elector valutin, and the Dukes of Wirtemberg: and the Landgrave of Hessen, has been perswaded to withdraw his forces, which for fome time had taken up their posts near the City of Hanau.

The Treaty between the Prince Elector of Cologn, and that City, is broken off, without that good fuccels which was defined, so that tis feared, the Elector will proceed to tharper Methods.

Dantzig, Mart 15. The 4th instant the King of Poland arrived in post at Warfaw from Czenstochow, to be present at the opening of the Det, which b gan the next day, and on the 7th concluded the Election of their Marthat or Speaker, confirming the Honour upon one Kirket of Lythuania.

During his Majesties continuance at Czenstochow, the Archbishop of Gnesae sent his brother the Pala ine of Plotske to compliment his Majesty, and to excee him from a personal at endance; the Marestral Sobiesky ided also the same Ceremony, which gives the Court some reason to hope that they are in great measure reconciled to the Marriage.

About the same time His Majesty received Letters from Derofensko, humbly defiring that His Majefly would pleafe to nominate Commissioners for the composure of all differences, wherein himfelf or those under his Command could

any ways be concerned. The next day after the Martiage, His Majesties Stables at Gzenstachow took fire, in which were burnt many horles, amongst the rest, a fett of horses of great value, which were presented by the Emperours Ambassador to his Majesty, which loss was afterwards repaired by a like Present made to his Majesty by soveral Noble persons of Austria.

The Joth instant ber Majesty intended to make a solema Entry in Warfam, with extraordinary Magnificence,

From the frontiers it is adviled, that four Ballas are passed over the Danube with their forces, and are marching on towards Ukrania; and that the Tartars are again. in the field, a party of whom had met with the Deputics from the Cossacks lately returning from Peland, and cut them in pieces, upon fuspicion that they were endeavouring to withdraw themselves from the protection of the Turks.

Vienna, Mart. 15. His Imperial Mojeffi.s Leavies are carried on with much diligence for the rectults of the old Regiments, whose Companies are like to be in little time complexed; great numbers of old foldiers offering themselves to the service ! besides the Foot, Order is given for the railing a Regiment of Horfe to be Commanded by Collonel Pelching for the Emperors Guard.
