Empire t and had allotted each Prince and State of the Empire their proportion of the foid Leavy, and their rate at which they are chargeable for their quota's, for ammunition, Provision, and Artillery.

The Archbilhop of Strigenium, the Count Forgat, and the Baron de Zitsky, Prefident of the Chamber of Hungary, are departed from Vienna to be prefent at the Aftembly of the States of that kingdom at Neufol, where its believed the Emperour will receive full fatisfaction of the good intentions of the Proteftants, and that all their defigns tended only to preferve themfelves in their juft liberties, and to defend themfelves sgainft the violencies of the Turks.

The Emperours forces which were formerly quartered in and neer Vienna, are ordered to march to Gaurine, Comorra, and Leopeld, for the fecurity of the peace of that kingdom.

The Visier of Buda has made great complaints against the Hussians, and amongst other discourses he had with the Emperours Interpreter, was pleased to tell him, that anless greater care were taken to prevent their incursions upon the Ottoman territorics, the Grand Segnior would suddenly be obliged to reduce them by force of Arms.

The Grand Segnior has fent his Commands to the Baffis of Afia, Africa, and Egypt, to give him in a Lift of what forces they are able to draw out into the field for his fervice, but for what employment he intends them, is not yet difcovered.

The Empreis Dowager is returned home from Poland. Hambourg, Mart. 21. The Count do Hanau has lately removed (everal of his Counfellors, and put others in their room, and changed the Governour of the place, but the affairs of the Count in relation to the neighbor Princes continue in the fame pofture as formerly; all perfons concerned expecting the iffue of the Emperours Commiffion, which is to be opened at Spire. In the mean while the forces of the Landgrave of Heffen Caffel are continued about Nambourg, and the Electors of Mentz upon the forniers near Hanau.

From Sweden we are told, that Monlieur Lutzan the Mareshal of that Court having married a Lady of a con-Aderable fortune, the 17th past entertained the Great persons of the Court.

Lieutenant General Arensfield is lately dead. The 20th paft was appointed for a day of folemn Prayers through the whole kingdom, to humble themfelves amongft other things for the great forceries and witchcrafts which they fancy has been uled among them neer the Copper mountains, to the defirultion of many perfons, effectially Children's the people of thole parts being fulfpected to be notorioufly guilty of fuch lite diabolics! Arts, although thole perfons who feem to fearch more clofely into the caufes of thole diftempers which have befallen the people of thole parts, attribute them rather to the fumes which arile from the Mines which they much frequent, then to any extraordinary practices of witches or evil fpirits.

Bruffels, Mart. 28. On Friday last the Heers Vander Tacht and Vrybergen, Envoyes Extraordinary from the States of the United Provinces, had an Audience from the Constable of Cassille, in which they complained of the delays they had met with in the business for which they were principally employed hither, with for the composite of the disputes with the Admirately of Oftend; his Excellencies Commissioners not having furficient power and instructions given them to make any pleased to hear them tavoatably, and to promile them that they should be fuddenly armed with powers to 23 ro give them full fasisfaction in that particular.

The Constable has for the fecurity of the frontiers, ordered a confiderable part of the Army to be disposed of for the reinforcement of the Garilons of *Aire*, SI Omer, *Bres*, Dixmuidh and Neuport, and fent three Boats beden with Ammunition to supply the defects of the faid Garrifons, and on Monday last Count Marsia wint hence by his Excellencies Order to visit the leveral Garifons upon the trontiers, and to give Orders for all things which he shall judge necessary for their fecurity. Hague, Mars. 28. The States of Holland may continue their Sefficient all this Lent, having many affairs before them of great confideration, and particularly, the complaints of the City of Leyden; of the injury they have long received from Amflerdam, by letting the Salt waters into their Channel and spoiling their waters.

Amfterdam having frequently prevented the redrefs of this great inconveniency by their Acts in the Affembly; those of Leyden the 24th or 25th inflant such 150 boats laden with shores and other materials in the Channel between Amsterdam and Gonde to stop up the passages and set a guara to prevent the opening of it again, which has been sharply complained of by the Deputies of Amftersam, and occasioned a long debate in the Affembly.

fterdam, and occasioned a long debate in the Affembly. The Provinces of Friefland and Groningue have refolved upon the Separation of the two Charges of Governour and Caprain General, but have fignify d their defires, that the Prince of Orange may be admitted into the Council of State.

The diffutes between the Elector of Cologne and the City, admit not as yet of any compole e. infomuch as the fail Bleftor has thoughts of entertaining fome foreign force for the reduction thereof, which gives no little Jealoufie to the neighbour Princes.

His most Chuiltian Mijefly is faid to have fome intention of coming to Aix to make use of the Baths, and to take that opportunity of canfetence with the Elector of Cologne, the Bilhop of Munster and others.

The States have thought it conv. alent to reinforce the Garrifon of Maeffricht.

Paris, Mars. 29 The flips which are fitted up at Rochelle, may in little time tail for Madagafear and the Indies as idefigned. Letters from Suratt tell us, that Monfieur Garon, the principal Director of the affiirs of Commerce in those parts, had given credit for the whole Cargo of a thip lately arrived there, but not being able to keep exactly to his time of fatisfying a debt which he had. contracted upon that account, with an Armenian Merchant, who was concerned there with him & the guarrel grew high between them, infomuch as Monfieur Garon pre 🛶 tending to the greatest power, had lent him away priloner to Madagafear, but the Director of the French Company there, being dillatisfyd with his proceedings, had fent back the Armenian with full power to continue at Swr425 in the fame employment and au hority as before; they tell us that ther, are not remaining at Madagaftar above so French, but that they expect a confiderable lupply from France, without which, they shall not be able to maintain. the Trade expected from those parts.
