St. James's, June 3. Yesterday Major General Higuen,

Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and conducted by

Private Audience of Her Majesty, to condole the Death
of his Royal Highness Prince George of Denmark.

Milan. May 28. N. S. Count Taun arrived here from Turin on the 24th Instant, having settled with his Royal Highness the Duke of Savoy the necessary Dispositions for the ensuing Campaign. Immediately after his Arrival, he gave Orders to all the Imperial Troops in these Parts to march with all Expedicion towards Piedmont. The Ministers of his Imperial Majesty have demanded of this Dutchy an additional Sulfidy of 50000 Pistoles, apport their ordinary Contribution, for the Substitute of the Troops. His Catholick Majesty has also signified to this State, that his Affairs require a Supply of Mony from hence. Letters from Turin advise, that all the Cavalry of his Royal Highness's Army were ordered to draw together at Staffarde on the 27th of this Month, and the Foot to march to the same Rendezvous with all Expedition. The Forces in the Valley of Susa, Perouse and Pignerol have already taken advanced Posts on the Frontiers of the Enemy. These Advices add, that the Horses, Mules and Oxen, which were necessary for the Service of the Artillery, were arrived at Turin, and that General Rhebinder was come to Susa, in order to observe the Motion of the Enemy.

Berne, June 1. N. S. The General Diet of the Cantons affembled at Baden have come to no Refolution in the Business of Tockenbourg, both Parties persisting in their Demands, and seeming resolved to abate nothing of their Pretensions. The Count de Luc, Ambassador from the Court of France, is gone thicker, and has presented a Memorial to the Diet, wherein he earnessly exhorts them to Union, and a speedy Accommodation of that Assirt, Letters from Savoy say, that the Duke of Berwick had visited all the Frontiers of Provence and Dauphine, and was gone towards Savoy, from whence he will return to Briangen, where, it is fails he designs to take his Headquarters, and form his Camp on the neighbouring Hills, but we are affered that this General hath as yet received and Mony, and that his Troops are in a very ill Condition. They were from Lyons, that the Payments relating to Trade (which were due last Month) have been deterred

to the 15th Inflant.

Hamburgh, Fane 7. N. S. Letters from Saxony fay, that his Majeffy of Deninark, who arrived at Drefden on the 27th of the last Month, design'd to stay at that Court 14 Days. We hear from Poland, that a Conterence, wherein many of the most entirent Polish Senators were present, has been held'at Oppelen in Silesia, wherein it was resolved to send a Depuration to King Augustus upon some extraordinary Affair. It is said, his Swedish Majesty is on his March directly towards Vollaynia, in order to join King Sranisaus. Those Letters add, that General Crassau, having been reinforced by the Army of Linhuania, has gained several Advantages over the Troops commanded by the Crown General Sieniawski. According to those

Advices the Body of Muscovires under the Conduct of General Gold had not advanced beyond Kiow.

Celegue, Jame 7. N. S. Yesterday the Prince of Hessel-Hombourg, Major-General in the Service of the States-General, arrived here, and proceeded this Day to the Camp of the Confederate Army in Flanders. Several Vessel, with Recruits for the Troops of the Elector-Palatine, bave lately passed by this City from the Upper Rhine. Six hundred Men are levied in the Datchies of Bergues and Juliers to complex those Reinscreements. The Palatine Troops which were encaused on this side of the Rhine near Dusseldorp, after having been reviewed by his Flectoral Highness, received Orders to march towards Brabaet. We hear that their Cavalry is already advanced as far as Ruremond. Letters from the Upper Rhin advise, that the Imperial Troops continue to assemble at Erlingen, and that the whole Army would be formed within sew days. These Letters add, that the Marcschalde Harcourt arrived at Strasbourg on the 1st Instant, and applied himself with all possible Diligence to assemble the French Forces near Haguenau.

Bruffels, June 10. N. S. Our Advices from the Frontiers 19, that the French Army under the Command of the Matshal de Villars, which lyes between Lens, la Basse and Douay, is augmented by late Reinforcements to 60 Battalions and 10000 Horse; and 'ris said the neighbouring Garrisons have also received Orders to march into the Field: All Accounts agree, that the want of Corn and Forage in that Army is 10 great, that it appears impracticable for them to keep the Field. The greater part of the Consederate Forces are arrived at the Place of Rendezvous between the Scheld and the Lys. The rest of the Troops are on their march in order to join the Army on the 12th, which is the Day appointed for Encampment. All necessary Provisions for the Subsistence of the Troops will be conveyed thither; and a store of dry Forage, sufficient for the Subsistence of the Cavalry to the end of this Month, is already provided. His Grace the Duke of Marshorough is expected here this Evening, in order to j, in the Army within f.w Days. The Elector of Cologne arrived at Nions from Valenciennes on the 6th Instant.

Hague, June 11. N. S. The Prefident Rouillé lett this Place on the 6 h Instant in the Morning; and his Grace the Duke of Marlborough set out in the Afternoon for His Grace lay that Night at Rosterdam, and proceeded the next Morning at four of the Clock, in order to reach Antwerp at Noon; and this day he deligned to be at Ghenf. The States invited all the Ministers of the Allies to a Conference in the Chamber of Treves on the fame Day that the President Rouillé lest the Hague; and the Pentionary having communicated to them all the Transactions of the Treaty, and the Resolutions of the States on the prefent Posture of Affairs, they were all extreamly farished with those Proceedings, and highly refeated the difingenuous Conduct of the Court of France. Our Advices from the Low Countries confirm the Accounts we had before received, that the Army will be tormed between the Schelde and the Lys on the 12th Instant, an l'are to advance towards the Enemy's Frontiers on the 14th. The Exchange of Prisoners has been at left fetcled. at Soignies. Major General How lately arrived here from the Court of Hannover, and fet our yesterday, in order to embark on the Willam and Mary Yach, with the Convey bound for England.
