) To a vehicle waiting while any gate or other barrier at the entrance to premises to which the barrier at the entrance to premises to which the vehicle requires access or from which it has emerged is being opened or closed, if it is not reasonably practicable for the vehicle to wait elsewhere; and

(g) To a vehicle waiting in any case where the person in control of it:

(i) is required by law to stop;

(ii) is obliged to stop to avoid an accident; or

(iii) is prevented from proceeding by circumstances outside his control and cannot remove the vehicle from the main carriageway.
