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Cadix, March 2.

Sir Thomas Allen is yet here, but intends within 2 or 3 dayes for the *Streights*, and to take under his Convoy some ships considerably laden, and amongst others the *Bristol* bound for *Genoua*.

Two French men of War are lately arived from *Roche*, and more daily expected.

From *Sally* we are advised, that the Emperour of *Morocco*, has with much civility excused the Rop put upon the Lord *Howards* entrance into *Barbary*, by the danger himself was in, by reason of the insurrection and rebellion of his Nephews, he being unwilling to engage him in the Countrey; til he had rendred himself sufficiently powerful to protect him.

Since the reducing of the Rebels, the *English* which had been for some time under restraint, and imprisoned at *Sally*, were freed and are safely arrived at *Tangier*, and Mr *Warren* the Secretary of the Embassy, gone to attend the Emperour at *Fex*, about the mutual satisfaction which was desired to be given for all injuries done during the Truce owned by the Emperour.

Warsaw, Mart. 14. After an earnest contest between *Patz* and *Kadzevil* about the Election of a Marshal, the latter carried it for *Lythuania*, of which Province he was Vice-Chancellor, and accordingly His Majesty was acquainted with the choice. The next day was designed for their solemn kissing of His Majesties hand, which was put off till Monday, that the Queen might be present to see the Ceremony.

On Saturday Count *Schaffgotz*, the Emperours Ambassador Extraordinary made his publick Entry with great pomp and splendor, he has since performed the business of his Embassy, and congratulated the Marriage, and is already preparing for his return home.

The next day the Queen entred with Extraordinary Magnificence, the Citizens being drawn into Arms to receive her, and most of the Nobility attending her with their Coaches, or else on horseback; their Majesties entred in a rich Coach drawn by 8 excellent horses, followed by all the Guards.

On Monday, the King took his seat under a Canopy of State, to receive the Equestrian Order, the Senators being seated on each side of him, and the Queen with her Ladies placed in a Gallery to behold the Ceremony, which was long expected, several disputes between them and their Marshal, detaining them near Three hours, who at the last, so far complied with them, as to swear upoa his Word and Honour not to do any thing contrary to the publick resolution.

The Marshal in the name of the rest desired of his Majesty

1. That the Vacancies might be disposed of.
2. That if this Diet should happen to be broken off his Majesty would summon the Nobility to appear in their Arms.
3. That all publick Ministers might be dispatch.
4. That the Opinon of all the Senators might be taken upon his Majesties proposals.
5. That his Majesty would cause the *Pacta Conventa* to be openly read: his Majesty wilngly granted the former, but much scrupled the last; but finding them resolved not to proceed upon any other business till this were granted, them, the King called them back as they were going out, and promised it should be done on the morrow.

It has been since this Assembly resolved, that no single person should have the power to break up the Diet, but if any one found himself grieved, he should present his said grievance to his Majesty and the Senate, where it should be heard and determined.

The same Munday his Majesty invited all the publick Ministers, Senators, and Deputies to a great Banquet, the Popes Nuncio, and the Emperours Ambassador were placed at the same Table with their Majesties, the Nuncio taking the upper hand.

Here are now in Town some Ambassadors from *Doronsko*, who in their Audience, desired his Majesties assistance against *Hanigow*, the head of the Rebel Cossacks and the Turks, who have already seized some places belonging to the Cossacks: his Majesty was pleased to give them a favourable answer, expressing his inclination to take them under his especial care, and that he intended this Summer to come in person to their assistance.

Rome, Mart. 15. On Munday last Cardinal *Barbarino* discovered his interest in the Conclave, where upon a scrutiny in favour of Cardinal *Rospigliosi*, his party was found to amount to Thirty three Votes, besides four others who are at present out of the Conclave upon the account of their indisposition of body, which made no small impression upon Cardinal *Chigi*, especially, since amongst the number he found *Vidoni*, *Franzone*, and *Spinola*, whom he supposed to have been his Creatures and obliged to espouse his interest only.

The Cardinals *di Medicis*, *Francisco Barba ini*, and *Chigi*, the heads of the several factions have lately had some conference in order to the putting an end to the Conclave, of whose long continuance they begin to be very sensible, and tis said it has been moved, that Six Cardinals may be nominated out of the whole College, out of which number they intend to make choice of one to be preferred to the Papsy.

The persons who are most discoursed of at present as standing fair for the Election are the Cardinals *Carpegna* and *Branaccio*. Cardinal *Barbarino* is said to have dispatch a Courier to the French Court in favour of *Facchinetti*, but the Squadron seem rather inclined to *Odescalchi*, a person not wedded to any faction.

There is lately much discourse of a famous Girl of *Rimini*, who either by pretended Divine power, or Diabolical Arts, has done many wondrous things and amongst others, fell 300 times in one night into trances or extasies, in which she frequently seemed to foretell that Cardinal *Barbarino* should succeed in the Papsy.

On Saturday last the Constable *Colonna* gave an Extraordinary entertainment at his Countrey house *Pamfilia*, to the Duchesses *Marzarini*, *Sforza*, and *Bassanello*, and to the Dukes of *Brunswick*, *Roano*, and *Nevers*, with the Earl of *Northumberland*, and many other persons of the greatest Eminency, who were afterward diverted with several Recreations by the Prince *Pamfilio*, and Treated with an excellent Banquet.

The Duke of *Brunswick* is since departed on his way to *Venice*.

Legorn, Mart. 17. The 12th instant departed hence Sir *John Harman*, with Captain *Darcy*, and the *Tunizians* for *Tunis*, intending to return by *Messina* to this place and to take under his Convoy the Merchant ships, expected from *Puglia* and *Zante*. The 12th instant arrived here the *Mary Pink* from *Ireland*, and yesterday the *William* and *Ralph Ketch* from *Naples*, intending to re-

turn homewards in company of the Dutch Convoy of 14 sail of great ships, bound for *Spain* and *Holland*.

The Great Duke is with his Court expected here this week from *Pisa*, but the young Prince *Francisco* is to return immediately for *Florence*.

Madrid, March 18. Yesterday in the morning dyed the Marquis of *Aytona* in the Pallace, where he was principally Major *Damo* to the Queen Regent, a great favorite, formerly by the late Kings will named a member of the Council for the Government, and lately made Colonel of the new Regiment of *Guards*.

The Arch-Bishop of *Thoulose* the French Ambassadour, who arrived here the first instant, expects not his publick Audience before *Easter*.

The Conde de *las Arcas*, is made Captain of the Spanish Guard, in the room of the deceased Marquis de *Salinas*, the only Son to the Duke de *Cardona*; who dyed above 2 Months since, is also lately deceased.

Genova, Mars. 19. The 16th instant departed hence the French Envoy, accompanied by several Gentlemen of this place, instructed for the adjouthing the differences upon the Confines about *Trivola*, between the Savoyards and the subjects of this Republick, a Gally being appointed to conduct them to *St Kimo*, and there to attend them; but little effect can be expected from all the endeavors which shall be used in this affair, unless the Duke of *Savoy* be pleased to concur heartily toward the establishment of the peace.

Yesterday arrived two Gallies, belonging to the squadron of the Duke of *Tursi*; two others of the same squadron being left at *Finale* on Saturday last, where they landed the Duke of *Offuna*, the New Governor of *Milun*, in which place great preparations are made for his reception, but tis believed, some disputes may arise between him and the Marquis de *los Bañes Spinola*, the latter, being obliged by his Character of Ambassador Extraordinary to the Emperour, to insist upon precedency, which the Duke is not inclined to give him.

Venice, March 21. Several ships are lately arrived here from *orsu* and *Zant*, telling us that the Captain General *Morofusi*, and Monsieur de *St Andre Montbrun* intended very suddenly to Embark themselves in Order to their Voyage for this place.

They farther confirm to us, the report of the Great pains the Grand Visier has taken to invite the *Greeks* to come over and inhabit the City and Kingdom of *Candia*, by granting them habitations and priviledges, which have already drawn great numbers thither: He has also ordered the profits and revenues of the Kingdom, in reference to the Grand Segnior, to the yearly tribute of four hundred thousand Reals, with which are to be maintained 8 Gallies, 3000 foot, and 1000 horse for the Emperors service. The Visier is preparing for his journey to *Salonich*, and has informed Seigneur *Cavalier Molino* of his Intentions, that he may be in readinels to Embark with him.

The Gally *Bracciana* will in few dayes be ready to put to sea, with the presents designed for the Ottoman Court, which are to be delivered to the Charge of Seigneur *Antonio Zen* an Officer of the Arsenal.

The Senate having considered how much the Arsenal has been disfurnisht of its Armes during the last war, has given Order for the making of 14 thousand Musquets in *Brescia*, half of them firelocks, with a proportionable quantity of other weapons, for the supply of the Arsenal.

Hague, April 1. The 29th past the States of *Holland* adjourned till the 15th instant, and the same day the States Deputies had a long conference with the Council of State, about the recruits of the Army, which tis believed will be suddenly undertaken.

The Marquis de *Risancours* Envoy from the Duke of *Torrain*, seems not to drive at any other negotiation, then only to sollicit the States, to interpose in the Composure in the differences between his Master, and the Prince *Elector Palatine*, to which they had offered their Mediations

The Forces which the Bishop of *Munster* is to have in readinels, according to the Resolution of the States of the Empire at *Ratisbonne*, as his proportion to be employed for the defence and security of the Empire, are in readinels to march upon the first Orders they shall receive. The Bishop seems not to have any intention of raising any others in their room, having refused the proposed service of several Officers, and resolved to dismiss 20 others, to whom he has allowed pensions to retain them.

Vice Admiral *Van Ghent* is at *Amsterdam*, and intends within less then a Moneth, to put to sea with his Squadron designed for the *Streights*.

Paris, April 2. The 12 Companies of the Regiment of *Guards* which were sent into *Flanders* are arrived at *Lille*, and are to be placed in Garrison in the new Citadel there, in the room of 12 hundred other soldiers which are to return home, and to encamp at *St Sebastien*, where his Majesty intends to have in Arms and daily exercise during this next Summer, a body of about ten thousand men.

So soon as his Majesty has made his intended visit to his new Conquests, he designs another progress into *Languedoc*, to take a view of the new Channel for the intercourse between both seas, which is so far advanced, and so many men employed about it, that tis believed that great work may arrive at some perfection within Fifteen Moneths.

From *Bayonne* we are informed, that part of the Conde de *Molina*'s Train, with his Secretary, is there arrived, himself intending suddenly to follow, as Ambassador from the Crown of *Spain*, bringing with him considerable Presents from the Queen Regent, for the Dauphin, Duke of *Anjou*, and Marquis of *France*.

Monsieur de *Gravelle*, the French Envoy is lately arrived at *Metz*, endeavouring to prevent the Conclusion of a Treaty with *Holland* for the free transportation of Wines from *Franconia*.

The disturbances in *Hungary* are not yet composed, many of the Grandees of that Kingdom, being, contrary to the Emperors Order, assembled at *Cassovia*, with a design of selling to the Turks to considerable Towns bordering upon *Transylvania*; but General *Montecuculi* and the Count de *Nadasti* have drawn together 8000 men, intending to reduce them to obedience. A Grandson of *Bethlem Gabor*, formerly Prince of *Transylvania*, who was wrought upon by the Visier of *Offen*, to espouse the Ottoman interest and has had no small influence upon the Hungarian Nobility, lately dyed suddenly at *Cassovia*, nor without a suspicion of poison.

Tis confidently said, that the Constable of *Castille*, Governour of the Spanish *Netherlands*, has Treated of a Marriage with the Prince de *Ligne*'s Daughter.
