Within a few days of his arrival in Northern Ireland in July last year Warrant Officer Class I Wood, of the Corps of Royal Military Police, was detailed for duty during operations in the Lower Falls area of Belfast. Heedless of danger, he carried out his military duties with great courage and determination. determination.

Subsequently, after the severe Shankill riots in September, 1970, and again in January 1971, he was able to bring a number of difficult and important military police matters to a successful conclusion.

During his period of service in Northern Ireland W.O. Wood has never flinched from work under fire or from entering areas where his life could have been in danger, and has set a splendid example of sustained courage and resolution which deserves the highest recognition.

The QUEEN has been graciously pleased to approve the award of the British Empire Medal for Gallantry (Military Division) to the undermentioned:

23710955 Sergeant Islay Christopher John Menzies Carrier, Royal Army Ordnance Corps.

In three months in Northern Ireland, Sergeant Carrier dealt with more than 120 explosive devices. On one occasion he encountered a bomb of a new type and, rather than explode it where it lay, he decided to dismantle it for the benefit of colleagues who might have to deal with similar bombs. It was fitted with an anti-handling device and would have ntted with an anti-handling device and would have exploded at the slightest movement but Sergeant Carrier, disregarding his own safety, took 30 minutes to strip it down. During the next three days he dealt similarly with two other bombs fitted with different anti-handling devices.

From these three bombs, Sergeant Carrier obtained introduction of the

invaluable information about the construction of the deadly devices. In doing so he was always in a great danger. In all his actions, he displayed extreme skill and his cool manner was an inspiration to all.

23921377 Sergeant Robert Leo Lockwood, Royal Army Ordnance Corps.

During a four month period in Northern Ireland earlier this year, Sergeant Lockwood personally dealt with 148 terrorist explosive devices of varying ingenuity, 14 of them on one day. In many instances he faced hostility from the mob as well as danger from unexploded bombs and was often struck by missiles.

Throughout he maintained the highest state of coolness and concentration which enabled him to deal efficiently with every device encountered and he was always concerned for the safety of others: he ensured the danger area was cleared of all personnel save himself. At all times he displayed great personal courage and never hesitated to tackle bombs he knew could explode at any time.

In his task he endeared himself to officers and men of every branch of the Service by his cheerfulness, humour and selfless disregard for his own safety. Never did he allow himself to be discouraged by the events occurring around him.
