**Vienna, June 26. N. S.** Since the Execution of the Treaty of Alt-Ranfart, many of the Inhabitants of that Dutchy, who had gone over to the Roman Church, are returned to the Protestant Communion. But the Emperor not allowing new Converts to come within the Intention of that Treaty, and there being great numbers of such, it has occasioned an Order to be sent from hence to the Governor of Silesia, requiring him to publish a Proclamation signifying his Imperial Majesty's great Displeasure, to hear that the Crime of Apostacy is grown so common among his Subjects, and to require all the Inhabitants of what Quality or Condition soever, who, having been born or bred in the Roman Faith, have gone over to the Protestant Communion, or who having been brought up in the Protestant Faith, had embraced the Roman Worship, and are since fallen away from it, to return to the Roman Communion within the space of six Weeks, upon Penalty, in case of Disobedience, of being banished for ever, and of having all their Goods confiscated. Which Proclamation was accordingly published at Breslaw on the third Instant. A Courier is arrived here from Turin, who left that Place six days ago: He brings advice, that the Duke of Savoy's whole Army was to be assembled at Rivoli on the twenty seventh of this Month, and that they would begin their March towards the Enemy on the first of July.

**Hague, July 9. N. S.** On the first Instant the Disposition for the Siege or Tournay was settled in the following manner: There are to be three Attacks commanded by General Officers, Generals, Schulenburgh, Count Lotum and Fagel; Lieutenant-Generals, Dedem, Oxenstern, Spar, Vinck, Withers, Woek, Heyden, Argyle; Major-Ge-

nerals, d'Onhoffe, Vanderbeek, Amama, Hamilton, Wafsenaeer, Keppel; Brigadiers, Gauvin, Gromeau, Borck, Primrose, Sabin, Sturler, Chambrier, Maldbourgh, Borkhoffer, Werderen. Each Battalion of the whole Army is ordered to bring three thousand six hundred Fascines or Faggots, and each Squadron eleven hundred and twenty. There are to be employed in this Service one hundred and twenty Pieces of Cannon, forty Mortars, and sixty Hauwitz. The Battalions appointed for the Siege are to consist of, one of Dutch Guards, two of Sturler; one of Dana, one of Wolderen, one of Souteland, one of Juay, one of Fournier, one of Hegden, one of Vegelin, one of Keppel, one of Woudenborgh, one of Beveren, one of Hufrel, one of Oxenstern, one of Vanderbeek, one of Berckhoffer, one of Pallandt: Of Prince Eugene's Army, one of Hercules, one of Castel, one of Elberfeldt, one of Wolfenbützel, one of Caris: Of British, one of Evans, one of Temple, one of Meredith, one of Pendergrafs, two of Orkney, one of Argyle: Of Prussians, two of Leibregim, one of Croonprins, one of Prince Albert, one of the Prince of Hesse, one of Jongdana, one of Schewerin: Of Hannoverians, one of Deheur, one of Tecklenburg, one of Gauvin, one of de Breuil, and one of Goor: Of Imperialists, Danes and Hessians, eighteen. The whole consisting of sixty Battalions. Of the Squadrons of the States are ordered two of Obdam, two of Tilly, two of Eastfrise, two of Dompré, one of Ofen, two of Laleck, four of Vander-Nath, two of Sancy Heilburg: The whole of the States, seventeen Squadrons. Forty three Squadrons are composed of other Nations, which included, the whole will consist of sixty Squadrons. The Garrison of the Place is said to be composed of two Battalions of Vesdomie, two of St. Valier, two of Vexin, two of Bourgogne, one of Artagnan, one of Villemaur, and one of la Faille: The whole, eleven Battalions. Of the Squadrons, two of Peurriere, one of Parpelle, one of the three Independent Troops. The whole, four Squadrons; besides six hundred Invalides. Monsieur de Surville Governor.

**Londonderry, June 25.** Her Majesty's Ship the Speedwell, Captain Cammock Commander, has brought in a French Privateer of twelve Guns and ninety Men, which was upon the point of Boarding three Merchant-men when the Speedwell came to their Rescue.

**Falmouth, June 30.** Yesterday failed the Expedition and Mercury Packet-boats, Capt. Clies and Capt. Green Commanders, for Lisbon, with the remainder of the Soldiers that were here. The same Evening arrived the Neptune Privateer of Middleburg, Capt. Cornile Garatson Commander, who in his Cruise took two French Privateers, one of thirty six Guns, and the other of ten Guns. Arrived also a Brigantine from Bilbao laden with Wooll.

**Plimouth, July 1.** On the twenty ninth past was sent in, by a Dutch Privateer, a French Privateer of fourteen Guns. Yesterday failed the Chester, and under her Convoy the Albion Galley from the Canaries, three Ships from Oporto, Five Sisters from Lisbon, and several Coasters, all for London. Came in a Dutch Man of War from Torbay, with about ten Sail for Ireland.

**Portsmouth, July 3.** On Thursday last in the Afternoon her Majesty's Ships the Southampton and Lizzard failed from St. Hellens to Cruize. The same Day the Chester and Pearl Men of War arrived at Spithead, the former from the Sreighlts. On Friday her Majesty's Ships the Exeter and Lynn, with about twenty five Sail of Transport and Merchantmen, failed from Spithead, bound for Plimouth, in order to get the Forces there on Board; but the Wind proving contrary, were put back again to Saint Hellens, where they still continue. Admiral Baker is still at Spithead on Board the Sterling-cattle, with her Majesty's Ships the Somerset, Pembroke, Resolution, Chester, Pearl, and Griffin Fire-ship.

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
