Potsdam, July 6. N. S. The Grand Mareschal arrived here on Tuesday last, to acquaint his Majesty that he had left the King of Denmark and King Augustus at Dinner at Cloister-Zeina, and that they would be at this Place within an Hour. The King's three Brothers, attended by the greater part of the Court on Horseback, set out immediately to meet them on the Road; and about seven in the Evening the Kings came hither, both in the same Chariot, his Danish Majesty sitting on the Right. Upon their Arrival they were saluted by the Discharge of Cannon, and when they alighted, a Battalion of Granadiers and a Battalion of Guards complimented them with three Volleys. The King himself received them at the Chariot, and conducted them to the King of Denmark's Apartment; after which his Majesty took leave of the King of Denmark, and led King Augustus to the Apartment allotted for him. His Majesty left him there, and retired to his own Lodgings. Two Hours after their arrival the two Kings went together to wait on the Queen; her Majesty met them half-way of her Anti-chamber, the King of Denmark led her in, and soon after his Prussian Majesty came to them. They went from thence to Supper, the Queen being led by his Majesty of Denmark, and the two other Kings walking just before them. The great Hall was adorned on this occasion with great magnificence, four armed Chairs were placed at the Table, both the Kings offered Place to the Queen, which being refused, the King of Denmark sat on the Right Hand of King Augustus, and his Prussian Majesty on the Right of the King of Denmark. The next Morning his Excellency the British Ambassador went to make his Compliments to his Danish Majesty; but it being too early for admittance, his Excellency went to the Apartment of King Augustus, who was to take Place that Day. As soon as his Grand Marshal, Monsieur Flug, had told him the British Ambassador was come to wait on his Majesty, the King received his Excellency at the Door of his Bed-chamber, and conferred with him for a considerable time. When the Ambassador had taken his Leave of that Prince, he was met by Monsieur Rosencrans, Marshal of the Court of the King of Denmark, who acquainted him, that the King his Master waited with impatience to see him, having heard he had been at his Apartment. The Marshal conducted his Excellency to the King, by whom he was received with great Distinction. His Majesty of Prussia received News that Morning, that the Princess Royal was delivered.

ivered of a Princess; and the two Kings came to his Prussian Majesty's Apartment. King Augustus taking Place according to Agreement, to congratulate him on that Occasion. On Thursday next the three Kings design to go to Berlin, in order to stand as Godfathers to the Daughter of the Princess Royal.

Hague, July 12. N. S. His Excellency the Lord Townshend, Plenipotentiary from Her Majesty of Great Britain, and Baron Bothmar, who has the same Character from the Elector of Hanover, have lately had a Conference in the Chamber of Treves with the Deputies of their High Migh- tinesses. Mr. Cragg, the British Resident at the Court at Spain, arrived here lately from Barcelona, and is gone to the Confederate Army, to wait upon the Duke of Marlborough. They write from Turin, that the Imperial Foot was arrived in the Camp of Rivalta, and that the Horse which was not yet come up would be at Orbasian on the fourth of the next Month. These Advices add, that the Protestants of the Valley of Lucerne were joined by a great number of the Reformed of France; and that they are preparing to put themselves in a Condition to annoy the Enemy, when his Royal Highness's Army is in the Field. Letters from France, as well as those from Switzerland, give us an Account of the Insurrection in the Vivaraz, which they say is become very formidable; the Malecontents having engaged a Body of the King's Troops near Privas, and remained Masters of the Field. It is said, there were fifteen hundred Men killed on the spot, and among them a Swiss Colonel who commanded in Chief the King's Forces. They add, that the Duke of Berwick had detached ten Battalions into those Parts. There are also Advices, that there has been a Commotion at Rouen and Dijon, occasioned by the Scarcity of Corn, and that several Houses of the King's Officers were pulled down before the Tumult was appeased. They write from Mons, that on the 8th Instant one Albert le Grand was put to Death for attempting to deliver that Place into the Hands of the Governor of Aeth.

Yarmouth, July 6. Yesterday came into our Road her Majesty's Ships the Glasgow, Falkstone and Advice's-Prize, with divers Merchant-ships under their Convoy from Holland. Divers laden Colliers have lately passed through our Road from Newcastle to the Southward; and this Day several Light Colliers for Newcastle are passed through from the Southward.

Portsmouth, July 7. Yesterday Her Majesty's Ship the Pearl Man of War sailed from Spithead to Southampton, being the Convoy appointed from thence to the Guernsey and Jersey Islands. The same Day the Winchelsea sailed from Spithead to the Eastward; also in the Afternoon her Majesty's Ship the Lynn sailed out of the Harbour to Spithead. Admiral Baker continues still here on Board the Searling-castle, with the Somersset, Pembroke, Resolution, Lynn, and Griffin Fireship; and the Exeter lies at St. Helens.

The Holland Mail of the 16th of July N. S. is not yet arrived.
