*Potsdam, July 6. N. S.* The Grand Marechal arrived here on Tuesday last, to acquaint his Majesty that he had left the King of Denmark and King Augustus at Dinner at Cloister-Zeina, and that they would be at this Place within an Hour. The King's three Brothers, attended by the greater part of the Court on Horseback, set out immediately to meet them on the Road; and about seven in the Evening the Kings came hither, both in the same Chariot, his Danish Majesty sitting on the Right. Upon their Arrival they were saluted by the Discharge of Cannon, and when they alighted, a Battalion of Granadiers and a Battalion of Guards complimented them with three Volleys. The King himself received them at the Chariot, and conducted them to the King of Denmark's Apartment; after which his Majesty took leave of the King of Denmark, and led King Augustus to the Apartment allotted for him. His Majesty left him there, and retired to his own Lodgings. Two Hours after their arrival the two Kings went together to wait on the Queen; her Majesty met them half-way of her Anti-chamber, the King of Denmark led her in, and soon after his Prussian Majesty came to them. They went from thence to Supper, the Queen being led by his Majesty of Denmark, and the two other Kings walking just before them. The great Hall was adorned on this occasion with great magnificence, four armed Chairs were placed at the Table, both the Kings offered Place to the Queen, which being refused, the King of Denmark sat on the Right Hand of King Augustus, and his Prussian Majesty on the Right of the King of Denmark. The next Morning his Excellency the British Ambassador went to make his Compliments to his Danish Majesty; but it being too early for admittance, his Excellency went to the Apartment of King Augustus, who was to take Place that Day. As soon as his Grand Marshal, Monsieur Flug, had told him the British Ambassador was come to wait on his Majesty, the King received his Excellency at the Door of his Bed-chamber, and conferred with him for a considerable time. When the Ambassador had taken his Leave of that Prince, he was met by Monsieur Rosencrans, Marshal of the Court of the King of Denmark, who acquainted him, that the King his Master waited with impatience to see him, having heard he had been at his Apartment. The Marshal conducted his Excellency to the King, by whom he was received with great Distinction. His Majesty of Prussia received News that Morning, that the Princess Royal was delivered.
