Berne, July 6. N. S. The Comotions in the Cevennes and the Vevais increase daily, and the Reformed have lately been joined by great Numbers of the Roman Catholic Persuasion; so that it at present appears, that these Disturbances arise as well from the general Dissatisfaction of the People, as from the Persecution in Point of Religion. Our late Advices concerning an Action between the King's Troops and these Malecontents are confirmed. Letters from Lyons of the thirtieth of the last Month tell us, that there were sixteen hundred Men killed in the Field of Bartel, but do not say whether the King's Forces or the Malecontents had the Victory: What makes us conclude the latter had the Advantage, is, that the Duke of Berwick, upon advice of this Engagement, had detached eleven Battalions to join the Duke of Roquelaure, who was likewise to be reinforced by twenty seven Squadrons from Spain. It is said, that the Duke of Berwick's Army, after this Detachment, consisted of seventy Battalions and fifty Squadrons. There are Letters which say the Malecontents, since this Action, consisted of a Body of five thousand Men; and that some Swiss Regiments not only refused to Charge, but fired upon their own Officers, who urged them to obey their Orders. These Advices add, that the French King had commanded all his Troops, except twenty four Battalions, to retire out of Spain; and that those Troops, as they return into his own Dominions, are to be dispersed to several Parts of the Kingdom, in which the Court is apprehensive of Tumults. The Army commanded by the Duke of Berwick is still intrenched near Brancon. The Diet of the thirteen Cantons is to meet at Baden on the eighth Instant, and it is not doubted but the Affair of Tockenbourg will soon be wholly adjusted.

Frankfort, July 11. N. S. Yesterday Count de Zobor, Adjutant-General to his Imperial Majesty, set out from this Place for the Army in Flanders. Count Rechteren is expected here every moment; and it is supposed that as soon as he hath held a Conference with the Deputies of the Neighbouring Circles, he will return to the Hague. Letters from the Imperial Camp at Etingen advise, that General Thungen was arrived there from the Baths of Embs, and that they were making the necessary Dispositions for passing the Rhine. These Letters add, that a Party of the Troops of the Elector-Palatine lately engaged a Body of French near Hombourg, and entirely defeated them. Advices from the Enemy's Army say, that they were

were still encamped at Werth. A thousand Horse belonging to the French Army had pushed the Rhine near Sterling, but marched back again without attempting any Enterprize. The great Dutchness which the Marshal de Harcourt sent into Flanders to reinforce Marshal Villars, it is believed, will make it impossible to undertake any thing considerable this Campaign. These Advices add, that the French Soldiers desert in great Numbers, as well for want of their Pay, as because of the extraordinary Scarcity of Provisions in all the Province of the Netherlands; the Inhabitants are afraid, that when the time of Harvest is come, the greater part of their Grain will be transported into the Provinces of France.

From the Camp before Tournay, July 15 N. S. On the thirteenth Instant, six in the Morning, two Batteries, each of twelve Pieces of Cannon, began to Fire from Count Lotum's Attack against the Citadel, and within few Hours dismounted the Enemy's Guns on that side, and beat down a Windmill, from whence they incommoded our Men in the Trenches. Yesterday Morning another Battery of six Pieces began to play from the Line Attack upon the Stuices, in order to open a Passage for the Waters out of the Enemy's Works into the Schelde. The Cannon of General Fagel's Attack began likewise to fire yesterday Morning, as those at General Schullenburg's did this day; and the rest of the Cannon and Mortars which are to be employed in ruining the Defences are now all mounted, and will begin to play to Morrow Morning. The Approaches are carried on with all imaginable Vigour at the several Attacks, and are already advanced in some Places within eight or ten Paces of the Palisadoes of the Counterscarp. The Enemy give our Men but little Disturbance in their Works; what Fire they make with their small Shot being chiefly from the Ramparts; and the Bombs which they have thrown for two Nights past have had no manner of Effect. On Saturday an Accident happened at the Place where our Men were filling the Bombs, one of which taking fire, blew up about fifty more, and killed four Fire-workers, and ten or twelve Men more; but did no Damage to the Magazines of Powder tho' they were very near. The Marschal de Villars continues in his former Camp, but has sent a Detachment of fifteen thousand Men to post themselves between Douay and Marchienne, with the Scarp before them; and it is said, they design to make Lines from Douay to Condé.

Hague, July 16. N. S. The Chevalier de Luxembourg is still encamped at Crépin. The States of Holland are to re-assemble to Morrow, and the Officers of the Admiralty have received Instructions to be here. Monsieur Duker, who lately resided here as Envoy from the New Bishop of Munster, has been in this Place some Days, and intends suddenly to embark for Great Britain. Advices from Spain say, That the Dutchess of Anjou was delivered of a Son on the fourth Instant.

Flimouth, July 8. Yesterday came in the Tuscan-Galley or London, bound for Leghorn. This Day a Dutch Privateer, who has taken a French Privateer of twenty four Guns, arrived here.
