Weymouth, March, 26.

Veffel of London arriving here in 21 days from Malaga, informs us, that the Streights Fleet of Merchants fhips were all ready in Cadia to fail with their Convoys, to whom this veffel would alfo have joyned, had not the wind kept her out at fea, and refufed her that opportunity By the fame fhip we are informed that the Turks have a Fleet of about 23 men of war, most of them lying about the

streights mouth. The 25th inftant arrived here a fmall Bark of this Port from *Mortaix*, telling us, that the 18th inftant, three Lurks men of war of 40 Guns apiece, were at anchor in *Conquete Road*, and tis supposed were intended for the Channel.

Hull, March 26. This week failed hence five fhips of this place for Holland, one for Dort, one for Bourdeanx, and two for Norway, all of them laden with the Commodities of this Country; here arrived one fhip of this place from Hambourgh laden with Oyl, Iron, and other Commodities of those parts; one Swedt from Stockholme with I on, one fhip from Holland; many Ships are daily paffing to and fro upon the c Coasis.

Lyme, March 26. This morning arrived the Jane of this place from Morlaix, the Matter telling us, that about two days fince they had news at Morlaix of the arrival of feveral of the *st Malos* Fregars in Conquete Roads homewards bound from Gadis, with the effects of their Linnen TradeArsturned by the lately atrived New Spain Fleet, and that the faid Fregars were accompanied from the North Cape as far as the Soundings, by three Turks men of way, each of them of 40 Guns.

The feamen appointed to ferve aboard the French Fleet this Summer are ordered to repair forthwith to Breft there to receive farther Commands.

Cadis, March 2. Sit Thomas Allen may fail within two or three days for the Streights. My Lord Henry Homard. Intends to fet forward for Tangier by way of Tariffa. The Emperour of Morocco has put to death his two Nephews which gave him the late diffurbance, and feems very inclinable to live in peace, if he receive not a fresh trouble from a 3d Nephew, who is said to begin to raife Arms against him.

Raples, March 2. The weather being fair, and the wind favourable, the Marquis Ifambaldi embatked himfelf upon the Gally which brought him hither, and put again to feat intending for Melfina.

The Genouele thip is also fuiled for spain, having on board, the Library keeper to the Viceroy Don Pedro d'Arragoz, with dispatches for the Spanish Court, and about to Cordeliers who are hafting away for Spain to be prefent at a general Chapter, which is to be held there for that O der. 3 1

Five Gallies of the iquadron belonging to this place, have been lately upon the Stocks, and refitted at the Fort of $Ba \sim a_3$ and wire fince put in here to take on board them Fout hundred foldiers, drawn out of the old Spanifth Companies, to be fant a way with a smuch fpeed as conveniently can be used to *Sardigna*, that Ifland being fill under a diffurbance, and the people of fuch unquiet it is as not to be cafily kept in peace without a ft onger force zthe Nobility who were it feems too active in the affafnate of the late Viceroy, fearing left his blood might be required at their hands upon the inquilition of the prefent Viceroy, have endeavoured to raife the people into a rebellion, by infufing feveral jealoufies into their heads, but finding their Arts bitherto unfuccessful, and themseleter too weak to keep the field, are fled into the Mountains of that Illand, where they keep themselves upon their guard, waiting an opportunity of acting somewhat to the diffurbance of the Viceroy.

We are even now adviled, that Five Caravels of Barbary were discovered upon those coasts fearching after prizes.

We are in daily expectation of the Duke di Ferrandina from Sicily, to take poffession of the Charge lately conferred on him by the Queen Regent, of General of the Gallies belonging to this Kingdom.

The Banditi continue as formerly numerous and Infolent, and frequent complaints are brought hither of their violences, fome dayes fince they met with a Prize of Silks in Calabria, which was computed to be worth 14000 Ducats, which they had the confidence to make public fale of in an open Market, not fart from Palermo.

Venice, March 21. Several thips are lawly arrived here from Corfu and Zante, telling us, that Captain General Motofini, and Monsieur de St Andre Monsbeum, intended very fuddenly to embark themselves in order to their voyage for this place.

They farther confirm to us the report of the great pains the Grand Vifier has taken to invite the Greeks to come over and inhabit the City and Kingdom af Candia, by granting them habitations and priviledges, which have already drawn great numbers thither. Herbas allo fo ordered the Profits and Revenues of the Kingdom, as in to referve the Grand Segnior, the yearly Tribue af Four hundred thousand R alsa with which are to be maintained Eight Gallies, 3000 Foot and 1000 Horfe for the Emperours fervice. The Vifier is preparing for his journey to Salgnich, and has informed Segnior Moline of his intentions, that he may be in readines to embark with him.

The Gally *Bractiang* will in few days be ready to put to fee, with the Prefents defigned for the Ottoman Cours, which are to be delivered to the Charge of Segnior Antenzo Zen, an Officer of the Arlenal.

The Senate having conficered how much the Arlenal hos been disfurgisht of its Arms during the late war, has given Order for the making of 14 thousand Musquets in Brefeisz half of them Firelocks, with a proportionable quantity of other weapons for the fupply of the Arlenal. Vienna, Mars 22. The 19th instant returned bither

Vienna, Mars 22. The 19th initiant returned kither the Empress Dowager, and the Arch-Dutchels her Daughter from Poland, the Emperour being, ready to receive them as their landing from the boar on whith they croßled the Danube, with all his Court and a Train of above 40 Coaches and 6 Horfes, seenducting them to the Phlage, the Bells, and Trumpersloudly proclaiming the good news of their fale return,

Upon the recommendation of the Elector of Brandenbourg the Emperour hasbeen pleased to bestion the Court de Nastig his Regiment, upon Colonel Dunnevald, and the Pention-which was formerly allowed the Golonel, upon the Count de Soys.

The recruits of Foot ate tailed, and mak of them already incorporated as was defigned, in the Old Regiments, the lame care will be taken for the Cavalry.

From Hungary we are informed that Count Peter Serizi her been Treating with the Turks, and has made an greement sgreement to pay a yearly Tribute to the Grand Segnior, in lieu of the protection which is promifed him, for which, If occasion should require, the whole Ottoman force is to be engaged, The Count is allo to be put into the pofferfion of the Soveraignty of Grostia, and fome other of the neighbouring Provinces; for which purpole, 18 thousand Turks are drawn together to march as the Count shall give them Orders ; but however-confidently this is re-

lated, divers perfons as yet fuspend the belief thereof. It is not believed the Turks will be eafily induced to break the peace between the two Empires, unlefs invited to it by fome manifest and great advantages, which it was much feared would have been given them by the great inclinations of fome difcontented perforts in Hungary and Tranfylvania, who supposed the Emperour could not have fuddenly lint a force amongst them to oblige them to obedience and quise, which they are now fufficiently convinced of by the appearance of leveral Companies of new railed forces, which are marched to Raab, Gomorra, and Liopold fadt, for the compleating of the old Regiments.

The Arch-bifhop of Gran, with the Count de Forgatz, and feveral other of the Grandees having been prelent at the Affembly at Presbourg, are departed thence to affift at the more general meeting of the States at Neufol, to make use of the Emperors authority to far as may beft confift with the peace of the kingdom, and the maintainance of the Imperial Interest.

Tis believed the Goust de Swartenbourg will be preferred to the vacant charge of Prefident of the Emperours Conncil

Hambourg, April 1. The Danish Envoyes are returned hinher from Copenhagen, (tis believed) with fresh instru-Ations from the new King for the carrying on of the Trea-ty with the Duke of Holftein Pleun about the pretentions to the County of Oldenbourge

The deceased King of Denmarks body is publickly expoled in State, till care can be taken and provision made for the folemn funeral intended.

Brom T. Ent they write, that on the 4th paft, arrived there the fad remainder of the Lunenbourg forces returning from Candia, being about 600 men, with 16 Enfignes, and leveral Carts laden with their fick and wound--ed, all of them except the Officers in ill equipage, fickly, and reduced almost to walking Skeletons; their courage only enabling them to bear their Arms.

Paris, April 3. His Majeky being informed that the Spaniards had put in extraordinary numbers of Men into Ipres and Oftend, and drawn a confiderable force into Aloft, Conde, and St. Gillaine, has thought fit in a Letter to the Queen of Spain, to complain of it as a great difrust of his Royal Word, he having been so farr from any delign of Warr, that he had remitted his Pretensions the Arbitration of the Kings of England and Swein.

Monfieur de Turelle defigned Ambsiliador to the Great Magar, is amongft other things to defire leave to raife two Forts for the French upon the Coafts of Suratte, who are in the mean time to poffels themlelves of two places which are to be delivered to them by the Portu-Lucis.

The Baffa of Sidon having letely discovered the fumm of 140 thouland Livers in falle Crown pieces, has condemned the French which live under his power to make fatisfaction for the whole Summ, of which they have made their Complaints to the Caymakan, but are not able as your divert the Sentence.

From Rome they Write, That the Faction's ate higher, then ever in he Conclave, but that the vrince Savelli, Governour of the Conclave, has threatned them, That If they proceed not fuddenly to Election, he thall be obliged to thorten their Provisions.

The King begins his journey rowards Flanders the 20th instant.

Hague, April 4. The Stares of Holland being adjourntill the 15th inflant, the feveral Members are retired.

Prince Maurice of Naffan, who has been long expected here, has deferred his return till after Eafter.

The Spanifb Ambaffadour has been for fome time much
