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Weymouth, March, 26.

A Vessel of London arriving here in 21 days from Malaga, informs us, that the *Streights* Fleet of Merchants ships were all ready in Cadix to sail with their Convoys, to whom this vessel would also have joynd, had not the wind kept her out at sea, and refused her that opportunity. By the same ship we are informed that the Turks have a Fleet of about 23 men of war, most of them lying about the *Streights* mouth. The 25th instant arrived here a small Bark of this Port from *Morlaix*, telling us, that the 18th instant, three Turks men of war of 40 Guns apiece, were at anchor in *Conquete Road*, and tis supposed were intended for the Channell.

Hull, March 26. This week sailed hence five ships of this place for *Holland*, one for *Dort*, one for *Bourdeaux*, and two for *Norway*, all of them laden with the Commodities of this Country; here arrived one ship of this place from *Hambourgh* laden with Oyl, Iron, and other Commodities of those parts; one *Swede* from *Stockholme* with Iron, one ship from *Holland*; many Ships are daily passing to and fro upon the Coast.

Lyme, March 26. This morning arrived the *Jane* of this place from *Morlaix*, the Master telling us, that about two days since they had news at *Morlaix* of the arrival of several of the *st Malos* Fregats in *Conquete Road*, homewards bound from *Cadix*, with the effects of their *Linnen Trade*, returned by the lately arrived *New Spain* Fleet, and that the said Fregats were accompanied from the *North Cape* as far as the *Soundings*, by three Turks men of war, each of them of 40 Guns.

The seamen appointed to serve aboard the French Fleet this Summer are ordered to repair forthwith to *Brest* there to receive farther Commands.

Cadix, March 2. Sir *Thomas Allen* may sail within two or three days for the *Streights*. My Lord *Henry Howard* intends to set forward for *Tangier* by way of *Tariffa*. The Emperour of *Morocco* has put to death his two Nephews which gave him the late disturbance, and seems very inclinable to live in peace, if he receive not a fresh trouble from a 3d Nephew, who is said to begin to raise Arms against him.

Naples, March 2. The weather being fair, and the wind favourable, the Marquis *Isambaldi* embarked himself upon the Gally which brought him hither, and put again to sea intending for *Messina*.

The Genouese ship is also sailed for *Spain*, having on board, the Library keeper to the Viceroy Don *Pedro d'Arrogon*, with dispatches for the Spanish Court, and about 60 Cordeliers who are hasting away for *Spain* to be present at a general Chapter, which is to be held there for this Order.

Five Gallies of the Squadron belonging to this place, have been lately upon the Stocks, and refitted at the Port of *Bars*, and are since put in here to take on board them four hundred soldiers, drawn out of the old Spanish Companies, to be sent away with as much speed as conveniently can be used to *Sardigna*, that Island being still under a disturbance, and the people of such unquiet minds, as nor to be easily kept in peace without a stronger force; the Nobility who were it seems too active in the assassination of the late Viceroy, fearing lest his blood might be required at their hands upon the inquisition of the pre-

sent Viceroy, have endeavoured to raise the people into a rebellion, by infusing several jealousies into their heads, but finding their Arts hitherto unsuccessful, and themselves too weak to keep the field, are fled into the Mountains of that Island, where they keep themselves upon their guard, waiting an opportunity of acting somewhat to the disturbance of the Viceroy.

We are even now advised, that Five Caravels of *Barbary* were discovered upon those coasts searching after prizes.

We are in daily expectation of the Duke *di Ferrandina* from *Sicily*, to take possession of the Charge lately conferred on him by the Queen Regent, of General of the Gallies belonging to this Kingdom.

The *Banditti* continue as formerly numerous and Insolent, and frequent complaints are brought hither of their violences; some dayes since they met with a Prize of Silks in *Calabria*, which was computed to be worth 14000 Ducats, which they had the confidence to make publick sale of in an open Market, not far from *Palermo*.

Venice, March 21. Several ships are lately arrived here from *Corfu* and *Zante*, telling us, that Captain General *Mosini*, and Monsieur *de St Andre Montevaux*, intended very suddenly to embark themselves in order to their voyage for this place.

They farther confirm to us the report of the great pains the Grand Visier has taken to invite the *Steeks* to come over and inhabit the City and Kingdom of *Candia*, by granting them habitations and priviledges, which have already drawn great numbers thither. He has also ordered the Profits and Revenues of the Kingdom, as well to reserve the Grand Segnior, the yearly Tribute of Four hundred thousand *Rials*, with which are to be maintained Eight Gallies, 3000 Foot and 1000 Horse for the Emperours service. The Visier is preparing for his journey to *Salgnich*, and has informed Segnior *Molina* of his intentions, that he may be in readiness to embark with him.

The Gally *Bracciana* will in few days be ready to put to sea, with the Prefents designed for the Ottoman Court, which are to be delivered to the Charge of Segnior *Antonio Zen*, an Officer of the Arsenal.

The Senate having considered how much the Arsenal has been disurprised of its Arms during the late war, has given Order for the making of 14 thousand Muskets in *Brescia*, half of them Firelocks, with a proportionable quantity of other weapons for the supply of the Arsenal.

Vienna, March 22. The 19th instant returned hither the *Imperial* Dowager, and the Arch-Duchess her Daughter from *Poland*, the Emperour being ready to receive them at their landing from the boat on which they crossed the *Danube*, with all his Court and a Train of above 40 Coaches and 6 Horses, conducting them to the Palace, the Bells, and Trumpets loudly proclaiming the good news of their safe return.

Upon the recommendation of the Elector of *Brandenburg* the Emperour has been pleased to bestow the Count *de Nostitz* his Regiment, upon Colonel *Duanevald*, and the Pension which was formerly allowed the Colonel, upon the Count *de Soys*.

The recruits of Foot are raised, and most of them already incorporated as was designed, in the Old Regiments, the same care will be taken for the Cavalry.

From *Hungary* we are informed that Count *Peter Serini* has been treating with the Turks, and has made an agreement

agreement to pay a yearly Tribute to the Grand Segnior, in lieu of the protection which is promised him, for which, if occasion should require, the whole Otoman force is to be engaged, The Count is also to be put into the possession of the Sovereignty of *Groacia*, and some other of the neighbouring Provinces; for which purpose, 18 thousand Turks are drawn together to march as the Count shall give them Orders; but however confidently this is related, divers persons as yet suspend the belief thereof.

It is not believed the Turks will be easily induced to break the peace between the two Empires, unless invited to it by some manifest and great advantages, which it was much feared would have been given them by the great inclinations of some discontented persons in *Hungary* and *Transylvania*, who supposed the Emperour could not have suddenly sent a force amongst them to oblige them to obedience and quiet, which they are now sufficiently convinced of by the appearance of several Companies of new raised forces, which are marched to *Raab*, *Gomorra*, and *Leopoldstadt*, for the compleating of the old Regiments.

The Arch-bishop of *Gran*, with the Count *de Forgatz*, and several other of the *Grandeas* having been present at the Assembly at *Presbourg*, are departed thence to assist at the more general meeting of the States at *Neusol*, to make use of the Emperours authority so far as may best consist with the peace of the kingdom, and the maintenance of the Imperial Interest.

It is believed the Count *de Swartenbourg* will be preferred to the vacant charge of President of the Emperours Council.

Hambourg, April 1. The Danish Envoyes are returned hither from *Copenhagen*, (tis believed) with fresh instructions from the new King for the carrying on of the Treaty with the Duke of *Holstein Pleun* about the pretensions to the County of *Oldenbourg*.

The deceased King of *Denmark*s body is publicly exposed in State, till care can be taken and provision made for the solemn funeral intended.

From *T. Ent* they write, that on the 4th past, arrived thence the sad remainder of the Lunenbourg forces returning from *Candia*, being about 600 men, with 16 *Engines*, and several *Carts* laden with the sick and wounded, all of them except the Officers in ill equipage, sickly, and reduced almost to walking *Skeletons*; their courage only enabling them to bear their Arms.

Paris, April 3. His Majesty being informed that the *Spaniards* had put in extraordinary numbers of Men into *Ipres* and *Ofsend*, and drawn a considerable force into *Alost*, *Conde*, and *St. Gillaine*, has thought fit in a Letter to the Queen of *Spain*, to complain of it as a great distrust of his Royal Word, he having been so far from any design of Warr, that he had remitted his Pretensions to the Arbitration of the Kings of *England* and *Sweden*.

Monsieur *de Turrel* designed Ambassador to the Great *Magot*, is amongst other things to desire leave to raise two Forts for the *French* upon the Coasts of *Suratte*, who are in the mean time to possess themselves of two places which are to be delivered to them by the *Portuguis*.

The *Bassa* of *Sidon* having lately discovered the sum of 140 thousand *Livers* in false *Crown* pieces, has condemned the *French* which live under his power to make satisfaction for the whole Summ, of which they have made their Complaints to the *Caymakan*, but are not able as yet to divert the Sentence.

From *Rome* they Write, That the *Factions* are higher then ever in the *Conclave*, but that the Prince *Savelli*, Governour of the *Conclave*, has threatened them, That if they proceed not suddenly to Election, he shall be obliged to shorten their Provisions.

The King begins his journey towards *Flanders* the 20th instant.

Hague, April 4. The States of *Holland* being adjourned till the 15th instant, the several Members are retired

to their particular Cities, where they intend to acquaint their Corporations of what has passed in the Assembly; in the mean time, several of the States Deputies are in conference with the Council of State about the proposal made by the States General for the recruiting of the old Regiments.

The Members of the States of *Holland* are not yet agreed upon the manner of introducing the Prince of *Orange* into the Council of State, but tis believed, after communication had with their respective Cities, will return fully instructed as to that affair.

The differences between the Citizens of *Amsterdam* and *Leyden* about the stopping up of the Channel between *Amsterdam* and *Tergow* are still managed with much heat; those of *Amsterdam* have applied themselves to the supreme Council for reparation, against those of *Leyden*, who with as much earnestness continue to justify their action, but the Council has ordered two of their Members to take the Informations from both parties, to examine the matter of fact, and to make report, that so they may proceed according to justice, in the composition of the business.

Mr. *Blaspil*, a Member of the Council at *Cleves*, to the Elector of *Brandenbourg* is arrived here as Envoy Extraordinary to the States of these *United Provinces*, to whom he has communicated his credential Letters, endeavouring to persuade the States of his Masters hearty inclination to maintain a good correspondence with them.

We daily expect here the arrival of the Ratification of the Treaty of Warranty upon the Triple-Alliance from *Sweden*, that so the several Ratifications may be mutually exchanged, that from *England* being already come.

Prince *Maurice* of *Nassau*, who has been long expected here, has deferred his return till after *Easter*.

The *Spanish* Ambassador has been for some time much indisposed, but is again upon recovery.

Plymouth, March 27. This day arrived the *Mercy* of this place from *Virginia*, without any other advice besides that of the thriving condition of that place; here put in also the Diligence of *Haure de Grace* bound for *Barbary*, and the Hope of *Hamborough* for *Eourdeaux*.

Dover, March 28. The 25 Instant sailed by this place a ship in eight weeks from the *Barbados*, having aboard her some persons of this place, who inform us, That they left all things at their departure in peace and quietness. Yesterday sailed by a Ship for *Sevillo* laden with Fruit.
