

1st Night, our Men began to work again upon the Approaches to the Citadel: Count Lotrum continues in the Command of his Attack, and has under him four Lieutenants-General, four Majors-General, and as many Brigadiers, with thirty Battalions and ten Squadrons, including the Garrison of the Town; and the Dispositions are making for a second Attack. Upon the Enemies retiring into the Citadel a great number of their Men concealed themselves in the Town, among whom were two Captains, four Lieutenants, and one hundred and fifty private Soldiers, who appeared this Morning at the Duke of Marlborough's Quarters. The new Lines of Circumvallation about the Citadel are almost finished, and Orders given for levelling those about the Town. This Morning a Detachment of two hundred Imperial Hussars, and a hundred Dragoons, were sent out to get Intelligence of the Enemy, with which four hundred of their Horse, and a hundred Grenadiers, commanded by a Brigadier, being part of the Guard appointed to cover their Forage, whom they entirely defeated, killed a great number, and took a Major, thirteen other Officers, one hundred and twenty private Men, who with a hundred and four score Horses, are all brought into the Camp. The Enemy continue to work in their Lines, to cover Condé and Valenciennes; but we hear the Marschal de Villars sent back yesterday part of his Troops to those of la Bassée.

From the Camp before Tournay, August 5. N. S. The Troops appointed for the Siege of the Citadel have taken their Post within the new Lines of Circumvallation, and our Attack is carried on with very good Success, and little Loss. Two Days since a Bomb from our Battery blew up one of the Enemies Magazines, and last Night we carried our Trenches to the Palisades of the Salient Angle of the Counterfort of the Queen's Bastion. Great numbers of Deserters come over to us daily from the Enemy, and all agree their Army suffers much for want both of Money and Provisions. To-morrow the Army marches to Orchies nearer to the Scarpe, behind which River the Enemy have finished their Lines, and mounted several Pieces of Cannon upon them. This Afternoon the Enemy made a Sally upon our Trenches, but were immediately beaten back again.

Hague, August 6. N. S. His Excellency Monsieur de Marceot has caused an Account of a signal Victory obtained by his Czars Majesty to be published in this Place: according to which Advices the Forces of the King of Sweden are entirely Dejected, and several General Officers taken Prisoners.

Dartmouth, July 28. This Day Rear Admiral Baker, with the whole outward-bound Fleet, sailed from Torbay with a fair Wind; as also the Southampton and Lizard, with fifty Sail of Colliers and Coasters.

Bristol, July 30. This Day came in the Resolution of this Place, James Stevens Commander in five Weeks from Antigua; and the Richard and Mary, John Chapman Commander, in six Weeks from Barbadoes; both Ships of great burthen; together with the several other Ships lately arrived from the Plantations. There are now in this Port above four thousand Hogheads of Sugar.
