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Pendennis, Mart. 28.

THis last week sailed hence several vessels bound to the Westward. On Friday it blowing hard a great storm, put in here one Dutch ship from *Middlebourg*, bound for *Lisbonne*, and one French vessel from *Havre de Grace*, bound for the Bank. On Tuesday came in a vessel of *Topsam* from *Mary-land*, laden with Tobacco, and some Collifers from *Wales*.

Malaga, Mart. 4. This last week put in here a Dutch man of war in his way from *Marseilles*, telling us, that a Dutch Flyboat was stopped in the Port for refusing to deliver up two French men which had been long entertained by them on board the ship.

Eleven French Saichs are said to be now at *Algiers*, carrying thither the Turks and Moors, which had been taken upon several occasions, upon the late peace concluded between *France* and *Algier*.

Here is now in Port the *Pearl* Fregat, who some days since left the *Portsmouth*, *Forefight*, and *Orange*, with two Merchants ships off from *Alicant*, who tis supposed have been since detained by contrary winds.

Yesterday a Turks man of war put three Portugueses on shoar, about three Leagues distant from this place. Several ships are arming out to sea from *Algier*.

Madrid, March 13. Since the Decease of the Marquis & *Ayona*, the Queen Regent has been pleased to confer the Charge of Great Master or Major domo upon the Duke de *Infantados*; and the vacant Charge in the Council upon the Constable of *Castile*; his third Employment as Colonel of the late established Guards is not yet disposed of, no person appearing over solicitous for that Charge, which is not over pleasing to the Generallity, some Endeavours being used for the Reforming of that Regiment.

The Count de *Miranda* the Portuguesse Ambassadour has at the last after much solicitation prevailed for leave to return home again to *Lisbonne*, having been continued here contrary to his Expectation, above 6 Months after he had taken his leave and dismiss his Trayn: He leaves behind him one Gentleman under the Character of Envoye.

The French Ambassadour, Monsieur de *Bourz* Arch-Bishop of *Thoulouse* is Honourably treated here by his Catholick Majesties Officers in the Palace furnish and alotted for him by the Queen, but makes not his publick Entry till the arrival of his baggage which came by sea, and is landed at *Alicant*.

The Count *Herman de Nunez* designed for the Court of *Poland*, to Compliment their Majesties upon their Marriage, attends only for the present of Jewels, which the Queen Regent has designed for the Queen of *Poland*, to the value of 200 thousand Crowns.

The Cardinal de *Porto Carrero* is supposed to be now well advanced on his journey for *Rome*, which he for some time retarded till he had received 10000. Crowns, in money, bills of Exchange for the like sums, and assignations upon the *Farmes of Naples* for the sum of 36000. Eivers more, which he might as he should find occasion expend for the Interest of this Crown.

Copenhagen, March 13. Great preparations are here making for the Funeral of the deceased King, whose body is to be solemnly Entered in the Church of *Rotschildt*, where is the usual Sepulture of the Kings of *Denmark*.

The differences between this Crown and the Duke of *Holstein Plun* for the secession to the County of *Oldenbourg*, being of too great difficulty to be easily determined by the Commissioners for that purpose at *Hamburg*, may be referred to the determination of the Imperial Chamber at *Spire*.

The Deputies from the Councel of *Holstein* have complained to the King of *Denmark* of the Sieur *Gabel*, and attributed to him the want of agreement (as to the disputed County.) The Deputies from *Ditmarshem* also to direct their complaints against the said *Gabel*, for violating the privileges granted them by King *Frederick II.* in preferring Officers to govern them which were not Natives.

The King has been pleased to confirm all those persons in their employments which were sent to foreign Princes by the King his Father, and has ordered new instructions to be sent them.

Legorn, Mart. 17. The *Nostre Dame de Bon Port*, arriving here from *Alexandria*, *Messina*, and the Island *Tavelora* in four weeks, left behind him at *Alexandria*, two French ships intended for this place, three for *Messina*, and one Polach for *Marseilles*, besides 12 Merchants ships and three armed Vessels, all of them Turks, which were lading there for several parts of the Turkish dominions; affirming, that some days before, there happened a violent storm, by which perished on those coas is five Turkish Srichs, and two other ships which came from *Constantinople*, and on Petach of *Ancona*, with all the men that were aboard them. By the same vessel we are told, that the Basha of *Grand Caire* was dead, and that the Basha of *Alexandria* had dispatched a Genoese ship to *Candia* to inform the Viceroy of the news.

Hamburg, April 11. The Danish Commissioners are returned again from *Copenhagen*, but have not yet made any further progress in the Conference with the rest of the Commissioners concerned in the dispute about the succession to the County of *Oldenburg*, the Duke of *Holsteins* answer being first expected upon some new propositions which have been made to him.

From *Ratisbonne* we are told, that the Duke of *Bavaria* has recalled with some dissatisfaction his plenipotentiary in that Assembly the Sieur *Meyer*, but that the said Assembly is resolved to proceed upon their Resolutions for raising forces for the security of the Empire, although several arguments have been used, and some protestations made against it.

The Elector of *Bavaria* is not satisfied about the Article concerning Leaves for Foreign Printers; not thinking it convenient that the Emperours consent should be desired before any such liberty should be given to Foreign Princes, desiring that each Prince and State of the Empire, may have the power to permit or refuse as they shall find convenient.

From *Vienna* they tell us that the recruits for the Infantry are generally compleated, and that they are now raising horse to reinforce the Cavalry.

The Count *Peter Serini*'s Treaty with the Turks is not yet confirmed: the reports from *Hungary* are various: the States of *Hungary* profess their obedience to his Imperial Majesty; and that they have not entertained any order of secession, but that of the defence of their Country against the Turks; professing, that if his Imperial Majesty please to protect them, they are ready not only to dismiss their Militia, but to obey any Orders he shall send them: but

In the mean time demand leave to raise 4000 men out of their own nation, upon the expences of the Emperour and the States of Hungary, to be placed in Garrison in the frontier Towns in the room of the Germans & that the Polish Money, and all other of mixt metals be called in: that their grievances in point of Religion be redressed: and that the Levant Company establish in Germany be suppress'd, as ruinous to the Trade of Hungary.

Brussell's, April 4. This Countrey is not yet cured of their fears and apprehensions of the French upon the intended visit of his most Christian Majesty to his late Conquests, although the submission of his pretensions to the dependencies to the Arbitration of England and Sweden, seems to ensure our present peace.

We have had a warm rumour of some treasonable practices discovered at *Ayre* in *Artois*, but we suspend the belief thereof till farther confirmation.

Count *Marsin* was expected here on Monday last, but his return is now prevented, fresh Orders being sent to him to leave *Ayre*, and to visit our several Garrisons in *Artois*, and to put them into a posture of defence.

On Sunday last an Express was sent into *Flanders* with Orders for the march of the Duke de *Houres* and de *Morsy's* Regiments to *Ayre*, to reinforce that Garrison which was of late become weak, and the Companies thin.

Orders were a so dispatch'd to the Spanish Regiments under the Command of Don *Fernandez Valladares*, and Don *Pedro d' Aldado* to march, the first to *Louvain*, and the second by *Malines* towards *Mons*, which was accordingly put in execution, but the later marching out of *Malines*, a soldier of the said Regiment firing his Musket, unhappily killed three of the Townsmen, which occasioned so great a Tumult and disorder in the Town, that the whole Regiment might have ran much hazard, had not the Officers and Magistrates used extraordinary prudence to prevent it.

Another Spanish Regiment is to be sent away to reinforce the Garrison at *Valencienne*.

On Wednesday last arrived here an Express from *Spain* with Letters to the Constable of *Castille* from the Queen Regent, by which she is pleas'd in acknowledgement of his good services, to confer on him the place in the Council for the Government, lately vacant by the death of the Marquis d' *Aytona*, which tis believed will occasion his sudden departure for *Spain*, but not till some other person be sent to succeed him in this Government. Don *Juan* of *Austria* is press'd to undertake this charge, but if no arguments can prevail with him to accept thereof, tis believed may be confer'd on *Charles*, Prince of *Lorraine*.

The first instant was determined in the Court Feodal of *Brabant*, the Cause depending between the Count d' *Egmont*, and the Count de *Ronnebourg*, for the Lands and Barony of *Gaesbeck*, which was by sentence of the said Court, given to the later.

His Excellency having been for some days indisposed, on Wednesday appeared again in publick, but refuses as yet to give Audience, insomuch, as the Deputies of *Hainault* having attended it for 7 or 8 days, are this morning departed without it.

Hague, April 8. The Rhinegrave is yet here, but intends immediately after *Easter* to repair to his Government. Orders are already issued out for the speedy marching of several Companies to reinforce the Garrison at *Maesrichs*.

Several conferences have been held between the States Deputies and Marshal *Wurtz*, with other principal Officers of the Army about the recruits: *Holland* intends to raise forthwith 6 or 7000 men for the strengthening the Garrisons upon the *Rhine*, and in *Flanders*.

The 2d instant, some Commissioners appointed by the States, had a conference with Monsieur *Blaspil*, the Elector of *Brandenbourg's* Envoye, who intends suddenly for *Cleves*, but to return again presently after *Easter*.

The Commissioners appointed for the examination of

the differences between the Cities of *Amsterdam* and *Leyden*, have been lately at *Amsterdam*, and may in few days be able to give the States an account of that affair.

Vice-Admiral *Van Ghent* was this day resolv'd to leave *Amsterdam*, having in his company, a son of the Count de *Stirum*, to embark at the *Texel* aboard the man of war on which he intends to sail, with 11 others to the *Streights*, to secure our Trade against the Pirates of *Algiers*.

All Officers and Soldiers belonging to the States of *Holland* and *West-Friesland*, are order'd upon pain of cashiering, to be present at their several charges and employments by the 15th of this month.

Paris, April 9. Yesterday His Majesty arriv'd here from *St Germain's*, visited several places, and afterwards was pleas'd to be present at the Christning of *Madams* younger Daughter the Dutchess of *Valois* at the *Carmelites* Church in *Rue de Boulogne*.

The King hath alter'd his Resolution and will not begin his journey towards *Flanders*, till the second of *May*.

The last Courier from *Rome* tells us, that the Divisions and Factions in the Conclave continue as high as ever, but that our Ambassadour the Duke de *Chaulnes*, has by his frequent addresses to the Queen of *Sweden* prevail'd with her to use her interest with the Squadroneers which is very considerable, to make choice of such a person as may not have any unkindness for the interest of *France*.

Truro, Marr. 28. Letters from *Barbados* bearing date the 18 *January* last, assure us of the peaceable and thriving condition of that place, and consequently of the falsity of the report, which had gotten credit in several parts, of the insurrection of the slaves.
