

any Party of the Enemy. It was believed the Palatine Troops which lay at Fiqueras, had, at the time of the Dispatch of these Letters, penetrated into the Rouffillon. Count Stampa, Ambassador-Extraordinary from his Catholic Majesty to the Court of Portugal, designed to embark with the first fair Wind for Lisbon.

Lisbon, August 4. N. S. On the 29th of the last Month the Dutch Squadron, under the Command of Monsieur de Sommerdyck, sailed for the Streights. On the 2d Instant three English Men of War sailed for Oporto and Havana, to convoy the Fleet of Merchant-men, which lyes in those Islands ready to sail for Great Britain. The Lord Barrimore and Brigadier Pearce are arrived here from Madrid on their Parole. The Spanish Fleet is not set sail this Day for Great Britain; his Excellency the Earl of Galway has been very much indisposed, but is now in perfect Health. Letters from Spain confirm the Account we had before received, that a Secretary and an Aid de Camp belonging to the Duke of Orleans were lately apprehended, and are accused of carrying on some design in favour of the House of Austria.

Penzance, August 2. This day the Resolution, a West-India Packet-boat, arrived here; she has met with much ill Weather, and Calms in her Voyage out, and also homeward; she sailed from Plymouth March 22, arrived at Barbadoes on the 6th of May following, from whence she sailed on the 10th, arrived at Antego on the 13th, she left Antego on the 15th, and came to Montserrat on the 16th; from thence she set sail on the 17th, and arrived at Nevis on the 18th. The next day she sailed, and came into Saint Christophers on the 21st; she left that Island on the 22d, and came to Jamaica on the 3d of June, and sailed for Great Britain on the 14th of the same Month; she brings Advice, that seventy eight Chests, valued at seventy five thousand Pounds, were found on Board the Coventry.

Dartmouth, August 5. On the third Instant sailed from hence her Majesty's Ship the Winchelsea to Cruise off of this Harbour, and made to the Westward, with two small French Privateers which she this Week took under the Land to the Eastward of Torbay; she gave chase at the same time to a Jersey Vessel, supposing her to be another Privateer coming out from the Land. Last Night Sir John Leake in the Russell, with four Sail more of her Majesty's Ships, came into Torbay, and this Morning sailed to the Westward. Rear-Admiral Baker with his Fleet is still in that Harbour. This Day came into this Port the Hopewell of Boston in New-England, a Brigantine, John Hume Master, from Carolina, but last from Virginia; she came thence forty Days since in Company of several Merchant-ships.

Cowes, August 6. Here is just come in the Stact of and from Rotterdam for Nants, Jacob Frank Master.
