from Ky murched out of their Intrenchments, and moved towards the Enemy; who, notwithflanding the Repulle they received in the Morning, advanced towards the Mui-covites in very good order. At nine in the Morning all things were thus disposed for a general Engagement, and the Armies being within Musker that of each other, a terrible Fire began on both fides. Tre Success of the Battel continued doubtful for a full Hour, when the Swedish Caval y began to give Ground, and the Infantry making bur livile opposition, the Muscovires fell in upon them with fuch fury, that they entirely broke the whole Arrry, and put them to the Rout with great D forder and Precipitation. Several General Officers were taken Prifoners in this Action, and we hear that Count Piper, and some other of the Chief Ministers, surrenered them alves Prisoners to the Enemy. The loss of the Swedes is computed to amount to about ren thousand Men, including both the Slain and these that were taken Pritoners. It is said the King of Sweden himself received a Wound in the fide, and having his Horse shot under him, made his Escape on another with which he was furplied by one of his General Officers. Letters from Poland fav, that the Accounts they have received of the posture of the King o Sweden's Army, and of the late Victory obtained over them by the Muscovites, do very much animare the Polish Nobility of that Kingdom, who are in the Interest of King Augustus; and that a great many have openly declared in tayour of that Prince, and promise o support him in his endeavours to restore him-felt to the possission of that Kingdom. There are also some Letters from the Court of Drelden, which advise, that his Majesty had declared his design to return into Poland; and had fent a Gentleman of his Bed chamber to the Czar, to Congratulate him on his late Victory obtain-

ed over the Swedes. Oftend, August 17. N. S. Letters from Hanover of the 6th lestant advite, that his Electoral Highness began his J-u-ney towards the Imperial Army on the Upper Rhine the Day before. They write from Straibourg, that it is experted the French army will repais the Rhine as foon as the Imperialists move out of their present Camp. They add, that the Forces of the Empire are much supein number to these of France, which makes the Marshal d'Harcourt very apprehensive that some great Attempt will be made in Alface upon the arrival of the Elector of Hanover to the Army. The French keep great Numbers at work on their Lines behind the Lauter, to prevent the Irreprions of the Enemy, and preserve the Corn of the adjacent Country for their own use When these Advices were disparched, the Marshald Harcourt was just arrived at Strasbourg, and had given the necessary Orders for his Infantry to be Transported to the Lines of Lau erbourg. It is reported from the Frontiers, that in the Acti n near Conflans the Enemy loft twelve bundred Men, after which the Confederate Forces marched on towards Chamberry; which Place not being in a condition for a Defence, the Garrison retired, and marched to the Camp near Barreaux. The Inhabitants of the Country are in a general Consternation, and fly in Crouds to Grenoi let All rersons of distinction in those l'arts are so much alarmed at the approach of the Imperial Forces, that they remove their Effects beyond the Rhone.
