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Whitehall, August 17.

**W**Hereas several Parishes in the Cities of London and Westminster, and Bills of Mortality, have received several Families of the Palatines, at Five Pound per Head; and other Parishes signified their willingness to receive others of them upon the same Terms: By Order of the Right Honourable the Lords and others, her Majesty's Commissioners for receiving and disposing of the Money to be collected for the Subsistence and Settlement of the said Palatines, Notice is hereby given, That any Parishes that are willing to receive one or more Families of the said Palatines, shall be allowed Five Pound per Head for every Person in such Family, besides the Charges of conveying them to such Parish.

And whereas several private Persons in and about the Cities of London and Westminster, and in other Parts, have received and provided for several Families of the said Palatines; Notice is hereby likewise given, that any Persons who are willing to receive and provide for one or more Families of the said Palatines, shall have the same Allowance of Five Pound per Head for every Person in such Family, together with the Charges of conveying them to the Place where they are to be so received: And that any such Parishes or Persons may apply themselves, by Letter or otherwise, to the said Commissioners at their Committee, which meets every Day at the Council-Chamber in Guildhall, London.

The following Address from the Commons of Ireland has been Transmitted by his Excellency the Earl of Wharton, Lord-Lieutenant of that Kingdom, and presented by Mr. Secretary Boyle to her Majesty, who received it very graciously.

To the QUEEN's most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the Knights, Citizens and Burgesses in Parliament Assembled.

May it please your Majesty,

**Y**our Majesty's loyal and faithful Commons, with great Delight and Satisfaction, return their unfeigned Thanks to your Majesty for your most gracious Answer to their humble Address, in which they beseech you, Majesty, that the Outlawries of Persons guilty of the Rebellions in One thousand six hundred forty one, and One thousand six hundred eighty eight, which are of Force, may so remain.

They no longer apprehend that any Solicitations can be successful to obtain the Reversal of such Outlawries, when they consider the Protection they have hitherto enjoyed under your Majesty's most auspicious Government, and have your Royal Promise that your Majesty will always have a great Regard to the Titles and Interests of your Protestant Subjects, and particularly to such as depend upon the Forfeitures and Outlawries of Persons guilty of the Rebellions in One thousand six hundred forty one, and One thousand six hundred eighty eight.

And are happy in this Opportunity of assuring your Majesty, that as they have from the beginning of this Parliament, acted with the deepest Sense of Duty and Gratitude towards the best of Queens, they will, by their future Behaviour, endeavour to deserve the Continuance of your Majesty's Favour and good Opinion of your Majesty's most dutiful Subjects.

Lisbon, August 6. N. S. His Excellency the Earl of Galway has been very dangerously ill of the Gout, but is now recovered. The Turkey Fleet, and the Trade from hence,

failed yesterday Morning under Convoy of eight Men of War for Great Britain.

*Coningberg, August 13. N. S.* Three Expresses are arrived here since Friday last from the Czar's Army, they all agree that the Army of the King of Sweden is entirely defeated. The Muscovites had taken from the Swedes fifty seven pieces of Cannon, seventeen Mortars, one hundred and twelve Colours and Standards, and above three thousand Waggons laden with Baggage, warlike Stores and Provisions; they took also above a Million of Ducats of the Pay of the Swedish Army. The Czar was marched with the greater part of his Troops towards Livonia, and had detached twenty five thousand Men toward the Weyssell, to reinforce the Confederate Army in Poland. Six thousand Russian Horse were marching with a great number of Swedish Prisoners towards Moscow. It is said, that of the whole Swedish Army not above six thousand had made their Escape.

*Brussels, August 21. N. S.* Baron Heems, Envoy-Extraordinary from his Imperial Majesty to the States General, is preparing to set out from the Army towards Vienna. Count Bergeick returned to Mons from Versailles on the 18th Instant; but we hear that he hath obtained but very inconsiderable Sums of Money from the French Court, in respect of what is due for the Service of the Walloon Troops. The late Elector of Bavaria hath disposed all things for his Departure from Mons, if the Allies make a Movement that way after the taking of the Cittadel of Tournay.

*From the Camp at Orchies, August 22. N. S.* On Tuesday the twentieth Instant the Duke of Marlborough and the Prince of Savoy began the Review of the Troops, with that of the first Line of the Army under his Grace's Command; Yesterday they reviewed in like manner the second Line; and this Day both Lines of the Prince of Savoy's Army; their Highnesses had the Satisfaction to find all the Troops compleat, and in very good Order. We have an Account from Tournay, that a new Battery of fifteen Mortars began to fire Yesterday from General Schulenburg's Attack; our Miners having had the good Fortune the day before to discover the Enemies Mine under the said Battery, out of which they took eighteen Barrels of Powder, the Enemy having deferred springing that Mine till such time as our Battery should begin to fire. The Besieged sprung another of their Mines the same Afternoon, by which we lost a Captain and a Lieutenant of Lieutenant-General Ingoldesby's Regiment, and had near thirty private Soldiers killed and wounded. We have since repaired the Damage done to our Works by the Enemies Mines and Bombs, and finished, last Night, a second Parallel at General Schulenburg's Attack.

*From the Camp at Orchies, August 26. N. S.* This Day arrived here from Muscovy Monsieur de Sudendunck, Major of Prince Menzikow's Regiment, with Letters of the ninth of July, O. S. from the Prince to the Duke of Marlborough, giving an account of the Victory obtained by the Czar over the Swedish Army the 27th of June; and of the Troops that surrendered themselves Prisoners at Discretion on the 30th following, to the number of more than sixteen thousand Men. These Letters mention, that the King of Sweden retired with great difficulty, and a very small Retinue, over the Eoriffences, having received a Wound by a small Shot in his Heel. By the Account we have from Tournay, several Mines the Besieged have sprung for three Days past have done us very little Damage. Our Sap is carried on so far, that in two or three Days we may be ready to spring our Mines under the Counterscarp, in order to make a Lodgment there. The Enemy continue in their former Camp, from whence great numbers of Deserters come daily over to us.

*Dover, August 16.* This Day the Right Honourable the Earl of Dorset and Middlesex, Constable of Dover-Castle, and Lord-Warden of the Cinque Ports, went to St. Mary's Church, where his Lordship heard a Sermon, preached by his Chaplain to the Ports; after which he was attended to the Castle by several Barons of the Ports, and the principal Gentry of the Country, where he was received with a triple Discharge of the Cannon. His Lordship was conducted from thence to a Place called Bradenstone-hill in the following manner: The Out-guard Men belonging to the Castle of Dover marching two and two, with their Swords drawn, and led by one of the Captains of the Ports, began the Procession; after them came the Governors and Deputy-Governors of the several Forts and Castles within the Cinque Ports; in the next place the Mayors, Bailiffs, Jurates and Members of their respective Ports, in their Gowns; the Marshal of Dover-Castle, with the Truncheon, bare-headed, marched alone; after him the Serjeant of the Admiralty with the Silver Oaf, and Serjeant at Arms with the Mace, bare-headed; the Proctors in their Gowns; the Register in his Gown, with his Lordship's Secretary; the Judge of the Courts of Chancery and Admiralty in his Robes; the Deputy-Lieutenant of Dover-Castle, the Gentleman of the Horse to the Lieutenant of Dover-Castle, and led Horses; the Lieutenant of Dover-Castle, with his Footmen, attending him; the Gentleman of the Horse to the Lord Warden, and led Horses; the Trumpets and Haut-Boys; then the Lord Warden, with his Footmen, on each side; then followed the Gentlemen and others who came to attend his Lordship at this Solemnity, all on Horse-back. His Lordship being come to the Place where he was to be sworn, he went into a Tent set up for this purpose; and the Court of Shipwey being set, his Lordship took the Oath of Lord-Warden; after which the Speaker of the Ports made a Present to his Lordship, with the accustomed Ceremonies; then the Judge of the Chancery and Admiralty Courts made a Speech, congratulating his Lordship, expressing the great Satisfaction of the Ports at his Lordship's being made Lord-Warden, opening to his Lordship the Antiquity, Rights and Privileges of the Ports, and concluding with recommending them to his Lordship's Care and Protection: That done, the Court was adjourned in the usual Form; and his Lordship having invited the Company to the Castle, they returned in the same order thither, where his Lordship gave them a splendid Entertainment; and her Majesty's Health was drank, with a Discharge of the Cannon, and all Demonstrations of Joy suitable to the Occasion; there being a numerous Appearance of Persons of all Ranks, who expressed their Satisfaction in her Majesty's Choice.
