Florence, August 20. N. S.

HIS Court hath lately received Advices that another Plenipotentiary will fuld nly be tent by his Imperial Majefly into Iraly, to demand new Contribu ions. Letters from Rome fay, that the Envoy-Extraor linary from his Maj fty of Portugal refi ing in that Court exerts himfelt with much Zeel, in supporting the Protestations of the Marquis de Prié against the Cardinal Orgioni, who had accepted of the Character of Protector of France. The Imperial Minister hath lavely demanded an Audience of the Pope, wherein he threatned that if the Cardinal Ottoboni did not forthwith refign that Character, his Revenues in the Milaneze should be immedia rly fe zad for the use of King Charles. The Duke d'Arry died lately in that City; his Body was interred with great Ceremony, but will be taken up again, in order to be transported to Niples, and deposited among his Anceltors. Prince Alexander Sobieski, a younger Son of her Downger Majesty of Polane, is to take his Leave or Rome, and return to that Kingdom within few Days. Don Alexander Albani, Nephew to the Pope, is lately made Captain of the Canafflers. On the 15th Infant his Holi nels efficiated in the Church of St. Mary Major, in the presence of the Sacred College, and a great number of the Nobility.

Venice, Aug. 23. N. S. The Procurator Foscarini has received his Infractions, and is within eight. Days to regin his Journey for Holland, where he is appointed for fide with the Character of Envoy-Extraordinary from this Repullick. The Senate has lately ordered that all ships which shall take in any Lading of Corn at any of their Ports within the Gulph, shall shift bring it into this Port, where that Commodity is at present very dear. They add, that they had received a Constitution of the Report that the Grand Signior had fent into the Black Sea the Captain Basia with many Vessels of War, with a cessing to gather Troops in Asia for the Succoar of the Tartars against the Muscovites, and retake several Fortresses of which they are possibled at the Mouth of the Tanais.

Berne, August 28. N. S. The General Diet of the Cantons continues their Seffion at Baden. Our last Letters from Sivoy brought an Account, that the Confedera e Troops which lately entred into Anneci, had attacked the Castle of that Place; and that the Garriton, confishing of one hundred and fix Men, was obliged to introduce at Dif-cretion. The Allies loft but four Men in this Action. The Garrison was conducted into Fiedmons, but the Chevalier de Valliere, who commanded it, was permitted to stay at Anneci on his Parole. These Letters add, that the Cavalry, and all the other Troops, with the Artillery from Piedmon, had joined his Royal Highness's Army, which was marched towards Chambery, where the Duke of Berwick had posted five Battalions and thirteen Squadrons of Dragoons, under the Conduct of Lieutenant General Silly. On the 20th Infant at Night tour Regiments of Curafters, and two of Buffars, confishing of fix thousand four hundred Men, under the Command of Count Merci, leaving Augst, in the Territory of Basil, on their Right, marched with great diligence towards Upper Alface, and having passed the Rhine at Rheinfeld, they took the Rout

towards Nieubourg, where they expected to be joined by a Detachment of Infantry confishing of feven thou-fand Men, under the Command of the General de la Tour. On the 22d the Imperial its finished a Bridge of Boats over the Rhine near that Place, and applied themselves with diligence to build For s at each end of the Bridge, to fecure a Communication between them and his slectoral Highnes's Army. On the approach of the Imperial Troops to Nicubourg, several Parries of the Enemy, who guarded that Town, and some neighbouring Redoubts along the River, quirted their Posts; but a French Colonel and about their private Men were taken Prisoners.

Frankfort, September 1. N. S. Letters from the Ele-Cor of Hanover's Camp fay, that his Electoral Highnels having received advice that the Marihal d'hiarcourt had made great Detachments to oppose Counc Merci, who had penetrated into Upper-Alfana with twolve thoutand Men, passed the Rhine at Daxland on the 28 h of the last Month, in order to fustain him: But his Electoral Highness received advice on his March, that General Merci being informed that the Count du Bourg, who was deached from the Army of the Marshald Harcourt, and reinforced from the Garrisons of Brilac and other neighbouring Places, was advancing to attack him, took a Re-feintion to meet the Enemy, leaving four flattalions to guard a Bridge of Boats which he had made at Nicubourg; accordingly on the 26th he came up with the Count du Bourg, whom he attacked with so much Bravery, that he utterly routed the lest Wing of his Forces; but the Enemy being very much Superior in Number, returned to the Charge with fresh Troops, and the Regiment of Nieubourg having given way, put the whole hody of the Imperialitis in Diforder. Count Breuner, regenter with the Lieutenant-Colonel and Major or his R. gracent, were killed in this Action, and Coun Merci himler was wound-His Electoral Highness received surther Advices that Count Merci, with fome Battalio s, I ad repatled the Rhine over his heldge of hoa sat Ni ultrung, and was retired towards Fri ourg; upon worth Intelligrace his Electoral Highness rollined to his Lines at Ellingen with his Army.

From the Camp at Havre, September 6. N. S. On Tueid y the 3d Inflant the Heredisary Prince of Hefle marched at four in the Atternoon from the Camp at Orchies with a Detachment of fixty Squadrons of Horfe and four thousand Foot, and passed the schelde at alorrague; the two Armies followed before Midnight, and being joined the next Day by the Duke of Marloorough and the Prince of Savoy on the March, encamped at Briffocult. The Prince of Hesse, after a finall half at some distance before us, continued his March, and the Army followed again at four yesterday Morning. Our March was some-what retarded by the Rains that fell two Days together. However, the Prince marched on with all the Diligence he could towards the Haine, which River he passed in the Afternoon, and the Armies encamped at Sirault, with the Lett about a League from the liaine, and marched again early this Morning. Upon the March we had an Account, that the Prince of U-fle having made a disposition to attack the Enemy's Lines between the Haine and the Sambre, three Regiments of Dragoons which were left for their Guard, immediately abundoned them, and retired. A great Body of those Treops that lay about Valenciennes, commanded by the Chevaller de Luxembourg, were advanced within little more than one Lesgue, in order to fusiain them; but upon the Retreat of those Regiments the whole marched back.
