be inspected at all reasonable hours at the Town Hall, Bournemouth.

Any person aggrieved by the Order and desiring to question the validity thereof, or of any provision contained therein, on the ground that it is not within the powers of the above Act or that any requirement of that Act or of any regulation made thereunder has not been complied with in relation to the Order, may, within 6 weeks of the 23rd January 1973 apply to the High Court for the suspension or quashing of the Order or of any provision contained therein.

 The Easton-in-Gordano-East Brent Special Road Scheme 1965 (S.I. 1965 No. 1384).

The Trunk Road (Warrington Road, Rainhill) (Prohibition and Restriction of Waiting) Order 1973

The Secretary of State for the Environment has made an Order under sections 1 and 84D of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1967 as amended by Part IX of the Transport Act 1968.

The effect of the Order is to extend the existing restrictions on waiting of vehicles which apply to that length of the Liverpool-Warrington-Stockport-Sheffield-Lincoln-Skegness Trunk Road (A57), known as Warrington Road in the Rural District of Whiston in the County of Lancaster.

The extension of waiting restrictions in Warrington Road is as follows:

Waiting Prohibited at all times

From a point 80 yards north-west of its junction with Dragon Lane to a point 100 yards north-west of its junction with Holt Lane.

Exceptions have been provided in the Order to enable a vehicle to wait for so long as may be necessary for a person to board or alight from the vehicle, to enable goods to be loaded on to or unloaded from the vehicle, or to enable the vehicle to be used in connection with any building operation or demolition, the removal of any obstruction to traffic, the maintenance of the road or the services therein.

Any person who desires to question the validity of, or of any provision contained in, the Order, on the ground that it is not within the powers with respect to the Order conferred by the above Act, or on the ground that any requirement of, or of any instrument made under, any provision of that Act has not been complied with in relation to the Order, may within 6 weeks of the 12th January 1973 apply to the High Court for the suspension or quashing of the Order or of any provision contained therein.
