Molco, July 31. N. S. There has been already given in general an Account, that the Army of his Czarish Ma-

jehy had entirely routed that of the King of Sweden. We have fince received the following Particulars:
Such of the Swedish Horse and Foot as could make their Retreat from the Place of Battel, were the same Day pursued by the Lieutenants-General Galliczin and Baver, at the Head of a strong Detachment. The next Day Prince Menzikoff himself followed with more Troops, but could not join the other Generals 'till two Days after, when he found them very advantageously posted at the foot of a rifing Ground between the Nieperand the Worksla; and having raken a Quarter-Master with some Wallachs Prisoners, he was informed, that the King of Sweden, with a Detachment of his best Horse, passed the Nieper about three Hours before, but left General Lewenhaupt with the rest behind, who probably would surrender them-selves, it summoned. On this Advice, the Prince immedistely advanced with his Forces, who were not above noinethousand strong, and sent an Officer to let them know, that fince all hopes of a Retreat were cut off, they must lay down their Arms, or otherwise expect no Quarter. On this Menage Major-General Creu: Z. Colonel Ducker, Lieutenant-Colonel Trautfetter, and Adjutant-General Bouglass, came to treat of a Capitulation, which was prefently agreed on, and figned by the Prince, and General Lewenhaupt: Whereupon the Swedes, confifting of fifteen thousand Men, choice Troops, and most Horse, were obliged to furrender themselves as Prisoners of War, and the fame Day delivered over all their Arms, Artillery, Ammunition. Cheft of War, Chancery, Kettle Drums. Standards and Colours, to Lieutenant. General Baver. Most of the Cossacks also came in and submitted; but General Mazeppa with some few of his Followers, passed the Nieper before the King of Sweden. When these Letters were dispatched, it was not known which way he had taken, but it was believed he could not Escape. Several thousand Men are ordered to take distinct and proper Routs in pursuit of him. This Detachment hath already fallen on the Rear Guard, killed two hundred on the Place. and fent in about one hundred Prisoners. In this manner the whole Swedish Army is entirely routed and disperfed, nonehaving escaped except one thousand Horse, who fled with the King. On the 30th of June the Czir had lest his Camp near Pultawa, to tollow the Enemy in Perion, and just arrived as the Surrender was made. On the Mulcovice fide were only killed in the Battel one Brigadier, one Colonel, two Lieutenant-Colonels, two Majors,

and other Officers and Soldiers, to the number of one thousand three hundred forty four Men. There were wounded Lieutenant-General Renne, five Colonels, five five Col nant-Colonels, eight Majors, with other Officers and Soidiers. The whole number of the wounded, including Horfe and Foor, amounts to three thousand two hundred ninety two; the whole of both the killed and wounded, four thousand fix hundred thirty fix. These Adults are dated the 9th Inftant, O. S. from Pultawa, and all the Circumstances have been confirmed by a Courier from General Baver, and another from Monsieur Sileman, the King of Pruffia's Refident, who was taken Prilener with Count Piper. We have no certain News from the King of Sweden; some Adv. -s say, he is retired to Tekin, a Turkish Town on the River Niester on the Frontiers of Wallachia; and others, to Oczakow, a Tarrarian Town on the Euxine; and here is a Report, that the Cair had demanded him of the Governor of the Province. His Czarish Majesty is supposed to be at this time at Chioss. but his Army is to divide it felf, one part is to March under General Baver into Poland, and another with Felt-Marshal Sheremetoff towards Livonia. The Rejoycings here have been extraordinary on this Occasion for several Days together. Morficur Rayferling, the Prussian Envoy, will fet out within three Days for the Army, with some Proposals relating to the present situation of Poland and Sweden.

Letters from Echical of the 28th of the last Month advise, that the Cair of Musicovy was expected there that Day; and that Field Marshal Goitz had received a Reinforcement of ten thousand Musicovite Horse, with Orders from his Cairish Majesty to March with all possible Expedition, and endeavour to cut off the retreat of General Crassau, who was on his March towards the Frontiers of Ponterania. We have received repeated Advices from the Musicovite Army, of the Death of the King of Sweden; but some Letters say that he died at Oczakow, and others that it was at Bender.
