Whitehall, September 22. On Tuesday the 20th Instant the humble Address, on the Occasion of the last Victory, was presented to Her Majesty from the Borough of Southwark by Charles Cox, Esq; one of the Representatives in Parliament for that Borough, introduced by his Grace the Duke of Somerset. Her Majesty received this Address very graciously, and was pleased to confer the Honour of Knighthood on Mr. Cox, for his known Loyalty and Zeal for Her Majesty's Service.

The humble Address of the Mayor, Bailiffs and Burgesses, Gentlemen and other Inhabitants of the Town and Borough of New Windsor, was presented to Her Majesty by his Grace the Duke of Northumberland.

Which Address her Majesty received very graciously.

Rome, September 4. N. S. Great Difficulties arise at the Court of Vienna concerning the Reception of Don Annibal Alban, who is to be sent to his Imperial Majesty in Quality of Nuncio-Extraordinary from this Court. The Marquis de Prié is to be consulted about certain Circumstances relating to the Differences between the Courts of Vienna and Rome, before that Minister can be admitted by the Emperor. Advices from Dalmatia say, that there are very severe Edicts published against such as shall conceal the Assassines who Murdered the Archbishop of Anivari, and considerable Rewards offered to such as shall discover any of the Criminals.

Vienna, September 11. N. S. The Ambassadors-Extraordinary from the Republick of Venice to this Court have had their Audience of Leave of their Imperial Majesties, and intend speedily to return to Italy. Advices from Hungary say, that Count Thaur having taken Simonthuna, the Regency of the City of Vesperin submitted themselves also to that General. The Price of Corn being highly advanced, his Imperial Majesty hath given Orders, that all such as are possessed of greater Quantities of that Commodity than are sufficient for the Subsistence of their own Families, shall sell it openly in the Market, on pain of torturing such their Stores to the Publick: He hath also laid severe Penalties on such as shall sell Corn to Merchants, before the Poor are supplied with Necessaries at reasonable Rates. Letters from Transilvania advise, that

General Kriechbaum, who commands in that Principality, hath brought a great Convoy of Meal and other Provisions into the Castle of Great Waradin. This Court hath examined into the Occasion of the late ill Success of the Detachment commanded by Count Mercl, and hath ordered, that such Troops as have failed in their Duty in that Action, should be punished by Decimation.

Frankfort, September 19. N. S. Letters from the Imperial Camp at Spire, of the 17th Instant, advise, that his Electoral Highness of Hanover hath detached some Regiments from Pribourg towards the Forest Towns, to reinforce Count Mercl, and prevent the Enemy from making Incursions, or attempting any Enterprize of Importance in those Parts. These Letters add, that the Militia of Upper Austria and Swabia would be ordered to march, and join that General, who is encamped at Todtans in the Black Forest. The Diet of the four associated Circles assembled on the 17th Instant. Count Lecuwentstein assisted at this Assembly on the part of his Imperial Majesty, and Count Rechteren on behalf of the States-General. Since we have received the News of the late Victory obtained by the Allies at Blaugries, it is reported that great Reinforcements will be sent from Alsace to join Marshal Viars; and we are informed that some Detachments are already on the March towards Flanders. The Enemy are still encamped behind the Lines of Lauter; but a Body of five thousand Men are posted on the Rhine near Hunningen, in order to oblige the Motions of Count Mercl. Letters from Basil say, that the General Diet of the Cantons assembled at Baden have sent a Deputation of four Persons to Count Bourg at Hunningen, to adjust some Differences concerning the Defence of the River Birs. That General would have posted some of his Troops at St. Jacques, to prevent any Attempt of the Imperialists to pass it; but the Helvetick Body have already ordered some of the Troops belonging to the Cantons to possess themselves of that Post. We hear that Mr. Stanyan, Envoy-Extraordinary from her Britannick Majesty, arrived at Zurich on the 10th Instant; the next Day he received the Compliments of the Regency of that Place; and on the 12th proceeded on his Journey to Baden, from whence he will hasten to Berne.

Falmouth, September 17. Yesterday arrived the Neptune Privateer, and brought in with her the Swift Man of War, which had been taken by seven French Privateers. A Dutch Dugger came in Yesterday from Rochel; and the Master reports, that the French have sustained a great Loss of a Fleet of Corn Ships from Barbary, taken by a Squadron of English Men of War.

Plimouth, September 20. This Day sailed a Dutch Man of War, with six Merchant-ships under her Convoy, to the Eastward. Sailed also the John and Elizabeth, and Betty, both of Dartmouth, with five hundred Prisoners for France. This Day came in the York and Salisbury from Lisbon, being part of Sir John Jennings's Squadron, who is passed by to the Eastward. Arrived also her Majesty's Ship the Medway, with a French Privateer of six Guns, and the Betty of Bristol from Antegoa, which she had taken from the French.

Dartmouth, September 20. Yesterday put in here two Dutch Privateers of thirty Guns each from Cruising to the Westward; and as they came by the Ster, took a small French Privateer of six Guns, and forty six Men, as she lay at Anchor, and brought her with them into Torbay.

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Chesler, September 21. On Monday Evening last arrived in this Port the Speedwell Man of War, Capt. Carmock Commander, who brought over his Excellency the Earl of Wharton, and his Lady. The same time came in the Charlott Yacht, and Wolf-Sloop; and last Night arrived the Seaford, Captain Rogers Commander. His Excellency comes up from Pargate this Day, and intends to Morrow Morning to set out for his Seat at Winchester.

Yarmouth, September 21. This Day came into our Road a Fleet of laden Colliers from Newcastle, under Convoy of several Men of War. Her Majesty's Ship the Lively is come into our Road from the Southward, being appointed a Convoy to the Herring Fishery.

Portsmouth, September 22. Yesterday Commodore Cooper on Board her Majesty's Ship the Swiftsure, with the Canterbury, Woolwich, Poel, Tyger, Nonfuch and Aldborough, sailed from Spithead for the Downs, with the homeward bound Lisbon and Turkey Fleets under their Convoy. There is at Spithead her Majesty's Ship the Ipswich. This Day Sir John Jennings arrived here from the Straights on Board the St. George, with the Breda, Charles Galley and Suffolk Hag boat. They have no Merchant-men under their Convoy.

Deale, September 22. This Day came in here the Homeward bound Turkey and Lisbon Fleets, with their Convoy; last from Spithead.

Whereas Henry Bishop of the Borough of Devizes in Wiltshire, being for a notorious Riot, committed to the Prison of the said Borough; two Persons in Vizards, did, on the Night between the third and fourth of August last, assault the Watch near the said Prison, break open the Prison Door, and rescue the Prisoner; her Majesty does hereby strictly charge and command all Persons who shall have any knowledge who the two Men in Vizards were, (as they will answer the contrary at their utmost Peril,) to discover the same to one of her Majesty's Secretaries of State, or to the Mayor and Bailiffs of the said Town, so the end the said Offenders may be prosecuted according to Law, and brought to condign Punishment. And as an Encouragement to such Discovery, her Majesty has ordered a Reward of 20*l.* to be paid by the Sheriff of the County of Wilts, who is hereby required to pay the same to any Person or Persons that shall make such Discovery, for one or both of the Offenders by him or them discovered, so as he or they may be apprehended, in order to be proceeded against according to Law.
