To the *QUEEN's* most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the Duke of Ormond, High-Steward of Westminster, the Deputy-Steward, Justices of Peace, High-Bailiff, Burgesses and Burgesses Assistants, and other the Inhabitants of the City and Liberty of Westminster.

MADAM,

WE beg your Majesty to accept of the Joyful Congratulations of your People upon the complex and glorious Victory obtained by your Majesty's Troops, and those of your Allies, at the late Battle near Mons, under the Conduct of his Grace the Duke of Marlborough and Prince Eugene of Savoy.

Every Year of your Majesty's Reign has been distinguished by fresh Blessings to your People, and new Glories to the British Name; but none greater than this, when (after taking so important a Fortress as that of Tournay) the same Army (ambitious of fresh Glory) attack'd the whole Forces of the Enemy in the strongest Inrenchments, and under the most advantageous Situation, that Art or Nature could contrive. But nothing is too difficult for your Experienced General in so good a Cause, and for such a Queen, whose constant Piety and Goodness has bespoke her the Favour of Heaven, as well as made her the Darling and the Admiration of Mankind; for the Strength of their Lines served only to give them Courage enough to stand, to increase the Honour of the Action, and your Majesty's Glory in their Defeat.

May your Majesty ever succeed in the great Cause you have undertaken, till you have finish'd all in an honourable and lasting Peace, to the Immortal Glory of your Name, the Prosperity of your People, the Security of the Church of England, and Protestant Succession as Established by Law. And we, your loyal Subj. etc. presume to assure your Majesty, that we shall be ready to hazard our Lives, as well

as Estates, to enable you to improve these Advantages to those great and pious Ends.

Cracow, September 8. N. S. The Arrival of his Majesty King Augustus in this City, on the 3d of this Month, put the People into an unspeakable Joy, which they expressed by loud Cries and Acclamations as he passed thro' the Streets. The chief of the Nobility who had fallen in with the Measures and Interests of King Stanislaus submit themselves in great numbers to him; and we have had every Day since the King came, new Crowds of People of all Qualities, to Congratulate his return into Poland. In the mean time the Followers of King Stanislaus leave that Court with the same precipitation, as the other Subjects of Poland hasten hither. It is reported King Stanislaus is delivered into the Hands of a Party of the Crown; and we have a Confirmation of those Letters which said that Prince had published a Manifesto, wherein he utterly resigned all Right and Title to the Kingdom.

Hamburg, September 14. N. S. There is now a prospect, that the Differences between the Magistracy and Populace of this City will be speedily accommodated. The chief Officers of the Burgesie have, in respect to the Inclination of his Imperial Majesty, received the Person lately proposed to them for their Colonel. Monsieur Burchardi, his Prussian Majesty's Minister residing in this City, hath declared to Monsieur Lilienster, the King of Sweden's Minister, that his Master required a General Diet to be held of the Circle of Lower Saxony, and demanded a positive Answer. That Minister engaged to consult Sweden for their Resolution in this Affair. The Neighbouring Countries are alarmed at the Warlike Preparations which are making throughout the Dominions of the King of Denmark. The Regiment of Marines which is at Rensbourg in Holstein, have received Orders to transport themselves to Copenhagen; and it is reported, that the King designed to assemble his Troops in the Island of Fuhnen, and the Duchy of Jutland; and that his Majesty would appear in Person at the Rendezvous, to make the Review of his Troops. The Swedes being apprehensive of the King of Denmark's Designs, have taken the necessary Measures for the Defence of their Country: For this end they are raising new Levies throughout the Kingdom; and have given Instructions that a strong Fleet or Men of War be speedily provided at Carlskron. Letters from Saxony import, that the Prince of Furstenburg, and General Plug, having accompanied King Augustus to the Frontiers of Lusatia, were returned to Dresden. General Plug designs to return speedily to the King, his Master, who was entered into Poland by Bombest on the Frontiers of Silesia. The Danish Regiments which were formerly in the Service of his Imperial Majesty in Hungary, are ordered to proceed through Saxony to Holstein, where they are to be compleated; and it is advised, that those Troops are already arrived in those Territories.

Hague, September 24. N. S. Letters from Maastricht of the 20th of September say, that the Prince of Hesse, Brother to the Prince Hereditary, passed through that Place on the 18th, in his way to Aix la Chapelle, from whence he will return to the Army after a short stay at that Place. On the 19th Monsieur de Wassnaer and Monsieur Geldermassen had dispatched those Affairs for which they went into those Parts, and left Maastricht under a triple Duty Charge
