To the QUEEN's most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the Duke of Ormand, High-Steward of Westminster, the Deputy-Steward. Justices of Peace, High-Bailiss, Burgesses and Burgesses Affistants, and other the Inhabitants of the City and Liberty of Westminster.

MADAM,

WE beg your Majesty to accept of the Foyful Congratulations of your People upon the compleat and glorious Victory obtained by your Majesty's Troops, and those of your Allies, at the late Bassel near Mons, under the Conduct of his Grace the Dake of Marlborough and Prince Eugene Savoy.

Every Year of your Majesty's Reign has been distinguish'd by fresh Blessings to your People, and new Glories to the British Name; but none greater than this, when (after taking so important a Fortress as that of Yournay) the same Army (ambitious of fresh Glory) attack if the whole Forces of the Eremy in the firongest Intreachments, and under the most advantageous Situation, that Art or Nature could contribe. Cracow, September 8. N. S. The Arrivel of his Majefty King Augustus in this City, on the 3d of this Month, pur the People into an unspeakable Joy, which they expressed by loud Cries and Acclamations as he passed throthe Streets. The chief of the Nobility who had talken in with the Measures and Interests of King Stanislauss fubmit themselves in great numbers to him; and we have had every Day fince the King came, new Crowds of People of all Qualities, to Congratulate his return into Poland. In the mean time the Followers of King Scanislaus leave that Court with the same precipitation, as the other Sub-jects of Poland hasten hither. It is reported King Stani-slaus is delivered into the Hands of a Parry of the Crown; and we have a Confirmation of those Letterss which faid that Prince had published a Manifesto, wherein he utterly refigned all Right and Title to the King-

Hamburgh, September 14. N. S. There is now a profpect, that the Differences between the Magistracy and Populace of this City will be speedily accommodated. The chief Officers of the Burgeofie have, in respect to the Inclination of his Imperial Majesty, received the Perion lately proposed to them for their Colonel. Montieur Burchardi, his Prussian Majesty's Minister residing in this City, hath declared to Monsieur Lilienster, the King of Sweden's Minister, that his Master required a General Diet to be held of the Circle of Lower Saxony, and demanded a pofitive Answer. That Minister engaged to consult Sweden for their Resolution in this Affair. The Neighbouring Countries are alarmed at the Warlike Preparations which. are making throughout the Dominions of the King of Denmark. The Regiment of Marines which is at Renfbourg in Holstein, have received Orders to Transport themfelves to Copenhagen; and it is reported, that the King deligned to affemble his Troops in the Island of Fuhnen. and the Dutchy of Jutland; and that his Majesty would appear in Person at the Rendezvous, to make the Review of his Troops. The Swedes being apprehensive of the King of Denmark's Defigns, have taken the necessary Measures for the Desence of their Country: For this end they are raifing new Levies throughout the Kingdom; and have given Instructions that a strong Fleet or Men of War be speedily provided at Carelscroon. Letters from Saxony imports that the Prince of Furthenburg, and General Pflug, having accompanied King Augustus to the Frontiers of Lusatia, were returned to Diction. Geneial I flug deligns to return speedily to the King, his Master, who was entred into Poland by Bombest on the Frontiers of Silelia. The Danish Regiments which were formerly in the Service or his Imperial Majesty in Hungary, are ordered to proceed through Saxony to Holitein, where they are to be compleated; and it is advised, that those Troops are already arrived in those Territories.
