

From the Camp at Havre, October 7. N. S. On the 3d Instant Orders were given for attacking a small Redoubt on the Right of the Port of Havre, which accommodated our Men in the Trenches; as soon as the Detachment appointed for this Service approached the Fort, the Enemy retired in so great haste, that our Men entered without any Opposition; they took only two Prisoners, the rest having made their Escape into the Town. The next Day we raised a new Battery of four pieces of Cannon at the same Attack, within five and twenty paces of the Counterscarp, which commanding the Hornwork, and the Causey from thence to the Gate, have very much annoyed the Enemy, and contributed to the advancing our Works on that side. Our Approaches at both Attacks are now carried on within less than ten Faces of the Counterscarps of the Hornworks, and the necessary Preparations are making in order to beat the Enemy out, and make Lodgments there. Another Convoy of thirty Pieces of Cannon, eight Mortars, and six Hawitzers set out yesterday Morning from Brussels; they came in the Evening to Brain le Comte, towards which Place twelve Squadrons of Horse were sent from the Army to strengthen their Convoy, and to conduct them this Day to the Camp.
